Pak greats hail sacking

AFP, Islamabad

Former Pakistan cricket greats Friday applauded the sacking of national coach Geoff Lawson and wasted no time in attacking the former Australian bowler.

The Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) sacked Lawson on Friday, just 15 months after the former paceman took up the position.

"Lawson's sacking was inevitable," former captain and master batsman Zaheer Abbas told AFP. "This comes as a popular decision because results were not there, we have had enough of the foreign coaches."

However, Abbas said Lawson was not totally to blame for Pakistan's poor results, saying the PCB had exercised bad judgement in hiring him.

"The PCB appointed him coach so the blame must be shared between the two parties but I think after having three foreign coaches we must realise that they do not belong to our culture and do not give it all."

The 50-year-old Lawson was appointed Pakistan coach in July last year after Pakistan's firstround defeat in the World Cup in the Caribbean in March.

Calls for his removal intensified when Pakistan lost to Sri Lanka in the final of the T20 four-nation event in Canada earlier this month.

Another former captain, chief selector Aamir Sohail, a persistent critic of Lawson, said the decision was the correct one given his lack of progress with the team. "I would term this as a popular decision," he said.

"I would not take into account results because they are part and parcel of the game. I would say it is a correct decision because the team was not showing any progress under him."

Sohail said he favoured former batting great Javed Miandad to take

Intikhab Alam, also one of the favourites to replace Lawson, said a clean-up was needed of Pakistan cricket and the Australian had failed to deliver.

"We need a clean-up for positive change in Pakistan cricket and I found Lawson as abrasive and unyielding," said Alam, a former coach and manager, who also led Pakistan in the 1970s.

Indian Grand Master Viswanathan Anand needs just one more point to retain the coveted World Chess Championship and will be looking to seal the fate of his opponent Vladimir Kramnik when the engrossing battle resumes on Sunday.

Anand is sitting pretty with a score of 5.5 points after the eighth game on Friday and the pressure will be on his Russian opponent who can hardly afford to commit any mistake at this stage.

Kramnik, who has 2.5 points to his credit, has been taken by surprise by the tactical moves by the Indian ace who appears to have done his home work well for the summit showdown which has generated considerable interest in the chess world.

What strategy Anand will adopt tomorrow remains to be seen but it should not come as a surprise if the Indian Grandmaster comes up with a new trick to unsettle his famed opponent and clinch the issue tomorrow itself in the 12game world chess championship.

The onus will be on Kramnik to prevent Anand from taking the honour and he will have to come up with something different with black pieces to stay afloat in the championship.

The eighth game between the two stalwarts ended in a 39-move draw from Queen's gambit declined as Anand chose the sharp Vienna variation.

ECB raises prize money

As England's one-day team began preparations for a match which could net players one million dollars each, the England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) announced a 150 per cent increase in domestic prize money.

The board is keen to safeguard the primacy of Test cricket and the first-class game that prepares players for what most English fans still regard as the pinnacle of the sport.

To that end the total sum on offer to the winners of the four-day first-class County Championship will rise from 100,000 pounds to 500,000 pounds.

Players in the winning county will receive 350,000 pounds in prize money and the county itself collecting 150,000 pounds as a reward payment.

The total prize money and reward payment for the Championship will rise to 1.06 million pounds. The runners up will receive 225,000 pounds of which 175,000 pounds will go to the players and 50,000 to the county. In 2008 the runners-up received 40,000.

There were also what the ECB said were "significant rises" in the prize money and reward payments for the winners of the final NatWest Pro40 competition and for the county which lifts the Friends Provident Trophy at the Lord's final in late July.
