straighten the feet, which has been successfully used in the US for over 45 years. The treatment manipulates the bones and stretches the contracted tissues of the foot. The foot is held in place with a plaster cast. The cast is left after five to seven days. This allows enough time for the muscles and ligaments to relax and for the bones to grow into the corrected position.

ICRC Mission Chief Finn Ruda addressed the inaugural session as the special guest, while Valerie A Tailor was in the chair.


