RE-DEMARCATION Hearingon

writ petitions continues

The High Court (HC) continued the hearing of the writ petitions against the Election Commission's (EC) redemarcation of parliamentary constituencies for the fourth day vesterday.

The bench of justices Mir Hasmat Ali and Shamim Hasnain adjourned the hearing until today.

Eleven writ petitions were filed with the HC after the EC published a gazette notification redrawing the constituencies.

Making his case, advocate TH Khan, counsel for petitioner Abdul Mannan, said the constitution requires the EC to redraw the parliamentary constituencies before finalising the voters' list which has not been the case this time.

Indian minister due Oct 31 for transit talks

India's Minister of State for Commerce Jairam Ramesh Sunday said New Delhi will seek permission to cut across Bangladesh for transporting equipment for a mega power project in Tripura from West Bengal.

Ramesh is scheduled to visit Bangladesh from October 31.

The 726MW power plant, expected to be fully commissioned in 2012, will be set up at Palatana, 60km from Agartala.

Ramesh however told reporters at Palatana that he was not hopeful that Bangladesh would agree to the Indian proposal as Dhaka had earlier rejected a similar request, adding that an alternative route through Assam has been okayed keeping that in mind.

Indian officials said distance to the project site from the West Bengal port of Haldia will come down to 979km using transit through Bangladesh.

The alternative route through Badarpur/Karimganj of Assam is 2090km long, they said.

Ex-MP Lobi gets HC bail

The High Court (HC) yesterday granted ad interim bail for four months to former BNP lawmaker and ex-president of Bangladesh Cricket Board Ali Asghar Lobi in two cases filed by the police.

The HC bench of justices AKM Fazlur Rahman and ATM Fazle Kabir also issued separate rulings upon the government to explain within four weeks why the petitioner should not be granted regular bail in the cases after hearing two bail petitions filed by Lobi.

The joint forces arrested Lobi on February 6 last year.

Two criminal cases were filed against him with Gulshan and Motijheel police stations last year on charges of making attacks and vandalism.

Intelligence focused only on accused JMB men

Over 250 trained JMB operatives still at large, trying to regroup

Despite a number of major arrests during crackdowns on Islamist militants in the last few years, over 250 trained operatives of outlawed Jama'atul Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB) are still at large and many of them are reportedly trying to

The fugitive JMB operatives now remain a matter of grave concern for the law-enforcement agencies, who have no clue to their whereabouts or activities. Their concern has recently intensified as they have scattered intelligence reports these fugitives, who were directly

involved in several terror attacks in different times, are holding secret meetings under a new leadership.

There are reports Saidur Rahman has taken over as the new chief of JMB, but investigators have failed to track him though they gathered information about him and managed his photograph over a year ago.

Huge amount of explosives, which were under JMB's possession, also remain a major concern for the law enforcers.

A top official of a lawenforcement agency claims they

have already torn down the JMB network. He however said they have some "scattered" information about reorganisation attempts of the militants, especially of the charge-sheeted ones, who are still out of their dragnet.

But the law enforcers involved in the investigations into militancy don't have any specific number of trained JMB activists except those who were charge-sheeted in the blasts cases.

The law-enforcement agencies and different quarters now suspect the militants under the name JMB or any other outfit may strike again during the next national polls.

296 local NGOs apply for poll monitoring

Body to safeguard policewomen

For the first time in the history of Bangladesh Police an internal organisation is being created to safeguard women personnel's

The law enforcement agency is forming Police Women's Network with a 23-member executive committee, the leaders of which will be elected for two years through direct votes of the women personnel.

The inaugural committee however will be selected from senior women police personnel. Inspector General of Police

(IGP) Nur Mohammad confirmed The Daily Star about the formation of the new police organisation and said its inauguration is at the preparatory stage.

The new organisation is scheduled to be inaugurated in the third week of November in a ceremony

where the chief adviser to the caretaker government is expected to make his appearance as the chief

Bangladesh Police first introduced women members to its ranks in 1974, with recruitment of 12 women, and now the total number of women police stands at

Police sources said recruitment of an additional 2,000 women is also underway.

NBK Tripura, additional IGP (administration), told The Daily Star, "Police Women's Network will promote empowerment of women personnel in an effort to create gender equality in the force."

According to official sources, among the women police, there are a deputy inspector general (DIG), four additional DIGs, 19 additional superintendents of police (SP), 10



Suspected US strike kills 20 in Pakistan

Clashes across northwest leave 41 dead, car bomb kills 2

A suspected US missile strike killed up to 20 people in northwestern Pakistan on Monday, officials said, the latest salvo in an intensifying assault on militant hide-outs near the Afghan border.

The reported strike occurred in the South Waziristan region, part of Pakistan's wild border zone that is considered a possible hiding place for Osama bin Laden and al-Qaeda No 2 Ayman al-Zawahri. Officials said the strike in the lawless South Waziristan area on

Khan was active in attacks on US-led and Nato troops across the border in Afghanistan, local residents and security officials said. He was a cousin of late Taliban

was killed in 2004 in one of the first apparent US missile strikes in the "Omar was sending fighters into Afghanistan and commanded them in several outings. He did not have any political affiliations and was linked to Haqqani," a security

official said on condition of anonymity. In other violence in Pakistan's frontier zone, a car bomb killed two people in Quetta and a suicide attacker demolished a checkpoint, injuring eight police and troops. The blast at a busy road in the

government offices area in Quetta, the capital of gas-rich Baluchistan province, also destroyed several rickshaws, cars and a pick-up truck. "The bomb was planted in a car

which went off with a big bang during rush hour. Initial reports say two people were killed, including a policeman," local police chief Rehmatullah Niazi told AFP. Tribesmen assailed Taliban

militants who beheaded a local militiaman in public and tried to abduct their chief, as clashes across northwest Pakistan left 41 people dead yesterday, officials said. The government has hailed the

US forces launch attack inside Syria: 8 killed Damascus slams it as war crimes

US military helicopters launched an extremely rare attack Sunday on Syrian territory close to the border with Iraq, killing eight people in a strike the government in Damascus condemned as "serious aggression."

A US military official said the raid by special forces targeted the network of al-Qaeda-linked foreign fighters moving through Syria into Iraq. The Americans have been unable to shut the network down in the area struck because Syria was out of the military's reach. "We are taking matters into our

own hands," the official told The

Associated Press in Washington, speaking on condition of anonymity because of the political sensitivity of cross-border raids.

The attack came just days after the commander of US forces in western Iraq said American troops were redoubling efforts to secure the Syrian border, which he called an "uncontrolled" gateway for fighters entering Iraq. A Syrian government statement

said the helicopters attacked the Sukkariyeh Farm near the town of Abu Kamal, five miles inside the Syrian border. Four helicopters attacked a civilian building under construction shortly before SEE PAGE 15 COL 7
