Continued price rise of non-food items contributed to the increase of overall inflation rate by 0.08 percentage point in September to reach 10.19 percent on a point-to-

Although the country witnessed a bumper Boro and Aus production, and commodity prices fell globally, they had no impact on bringing down the inflation.

The government and in September. Bangladesh Bank (BB) had earlier predicted that the inflation rate might come down below 9 percent but the International Monetary Fund (IMF) in a recent report said the country's inflation rate would rise to 11 percent.

According to Bangladesh Bureau of Statistics (BBS), nonfood items witnessed increasing rate of inflation from July, which

stood at 7.19 percent in September. Inflation rate for non-food items was 6.55 percent in August, 5.93 percent in July and 3.54 per-

A high official of the BBS said inflation rate for non-food items is increasing due mainly to price hike of petroleum products by 35 percent in July. The inflation rate was higher in rural areas than in urban areas for the same reason, he added.

In June, inflation rate for nonfood items in both the rural and urban areas was around 3.6 percent, which rose to 7.76 percent in rural areas and 5.70 in urban areas

The official noted that as the prices of petroleum products increased, transport cost jumped sharply in urban areas, and for this non-food products experienced a high inflation rate.

Meanwhile, according to the BBS monthly inflation report, inflation rate for food items fell slightly in September but still it was 12.07 percent. The rate was 12.36 percent in August.

Obama holds or widens lead in key states

Early voting appears to favour Democrats

New polls out yesterday show Democrat Barack Obama holding or increasing his lead over Republican John McCain in key battleground states as undecided voters make up their minds just days before the presidential election. The CNN-Time magazine poll of states both candidates see as must-wins showed Obama expanding his lead among likely voters in Pennsylvania to 12 percent (55-43 percent) from nine percent in mid-September, and holding his four-point lead in Ohio (51-47 percent), where McCain will US POLLS 4 DAYS TO GO

campaign Thursday. In North Carolina, which the Republicans only a few months ago believed was solidly on their side, Obama's lead expanded to six points (52-46 percent) from four points nine days ago and a 49-49 percent tie at the beginning of October.

And in Nevada, another state formerly reliably Republican, the CNN/Time poll found likely voters backing Obama in the November 4 vote by a 52-45 percent spread, compared to 51-46 percent nine

days ago and 51-47 percent one month ago.

The only relatively good news for McCain was that in his home state of Arizona, he kept up his seven-point lead (53-46 percent).

The poll covered between 1,011 and 1,062 people in each state interviewed between October 23 and October 28.

Meanwhile, millions of Americans have lined up to vote early in the November 4 election -some waiting more than two hours -- with many appearing to favour Democratic presidential hopeful Barack Obama.

Poor nations most vulnerable from financial crisis

UN chief warns

UN Secretary General Ban Kimoon warned Thursday that poor nations could be hurt most by the global financial crisis and called for swift action to tackle the roots of

Ban issued the warning in a speech after arriving in New Delhi on his first official trip to South Asia during which he will also travel to Nepal and Bangladesh.

"The least developed countries, the poorest of the world's poor -children, older persons and others

-- stand to suffer most," he said in a lecture at the Rajiv Gandhi Memorial Foundation set up to honour the slain former Indian prime minister.

"I am very worried development assistance will suffer and that investors might pull back from emerging markets," Ban said. "People who have striven so hard to rise out of poverty could fall back into destitution." "We cannot know what twists

The death toll from a powerful earthquake in southwest Pakistan could climb above 300, officials said Thursday, as rescuers struggled to deliver aid to desperate survivors.

Multiple aftershocks continued to rock the impoverished Baluchistan region, creating fresh fears among survivors who prepared to spend a second night in the open in sub-zero temperatures.

Some travelled long distances on severely damaged roads to the provincial capital Quetta to plead for tents and emergency supplies as some villages still had not received any help 36 hours after the "The death toll may be 300 or
