




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Another toxic ship set to get ministry nod for scrapping

Ignoring threats to public health, the shipping ministry is likely to permit scrapping of another toxic ship-- SA Helderberg-- one of the 50 blacklisted by environmental watch group Greenpeace.

Kabir Steel of Chittagong, a shipyard in Sitakunda, imported the ship now known as Asian Express. Built in 1977, the ship is believed to be riddled with asbestos, heavy and toxic metals like lead, mercury, cadmium, copper and zinc.

The ministry is now forming an investigation committee to check toxicity of the ship, now waiting at the outer anchorage of Chittagong port. It issued letters to different organisations on Thursday inviting them to be members of the committee, sources in the ministry said.

But sources in Chittagong, who work in this sector, said the owner of Kabir Steel has already beached the ship without taking permission

The Chittagongian Tamim took a breathtaking catch at the long-leg fence to send back Jacques Kallis, who scored the team highest 50 off 73 balls that featured two boundaries, to give Bangladesh the upperhand.

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Saifur visits Sylhet after 21 months

BNP leader and former finance minister M Saifur Rahman yesterday paid a brief visit to Sylhet after about 21 months.

While talking to journalists at Hotel Garden Inn in the city, he criticised the government for not clearing its position on lifting the state of emergency before the parliamentary elections.

"We still do not know whether the national election will be held on schedule," Saifur said.

He also held a meeting with local party leaders and activists at the hotel.

"We have placed a four-point demand including the lifting of emergency before the caretaker government and we are ready to contest the polls once the demands are met," Saifur said.

"If my party participates in the polls, I might contest the elections either from Sylhet or Moulvibazar

14 killed in suspected US missile strike in Pakistan

Pak jets kill 16 Taliban militants

Up to 14 militants were killed yesterday when a suspected US missile strike destroyed an al-Qaeda training camp in a tribal area of northwest Pakistan near the Afghan border, officials said.

Four missiles are thought to have been fired at the camp, in Kumsham village, some 35 kilometres (22 miles) south of Miranshah in North Waziristan province.

Security sources said the village is dominated by Wazir tribes and is near the border with South Waziristan, another hub of Taliban and al-Qaeda operatives.

"Between 11 to 14 militants, mainly foreigners, were killed in the strike," a senior military official said AFP on condition of anonymity.

hideouts in Pakistan's tribal badlands bordering Afghanistan -- all blamed on unmanned CIA drones -- have raised tensions between Washington and Islamabad.

On Monday, Pakistani President Asif Ali Zardari warned the new US commander for Iraq and Afghanistan, General David Petraeus, that the attacks were "counterproductive" and could harm the battle for hearts and minds there.

Prime Minister Yousuf Raza Gilani and the country's military top brass also told the visiting general that the United States should respect Pakistani sovereignty and territorial integrity.

High ammonia concentration poses severe health risk

Technology (Buet), Design Planning and Management Consultants Limited (DPM), the Institute of Water Management (IWM), and Aqua, a water resources related private consulting firm, found concentration of diluted ammonia in SWTP treated water reaching up to 5.7 milligram (mg) per litre compared to the 0.5 mg per litre safety limit set by WHO.

The studies concluded that the facilities in SWTP are inadequate for treating dangerously high concentration of ammonia and industrial wastes such as lead and cadmium, which may cause serious kidney, liver, lung, and stomach

ach diseases among consumers.

In 2004, a joint report by Buet and IWM also presented similar findings to Wasa, but with no result.

Each day, SWTP supplies 22.5 million litres of treated water to the capital's north-south pipeline that runs from Postogola Bridge to Farm Gate, and to the east-west pipeline which supplies water to the vast area from Goran through Old Dhaka to Dhanmondi.

The reports' findings reveal that 'conventional technologies' used by SWTP, commissioned in 2002, cannot remove high concentrations of ammonia, algae, and

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Edible oil, onion prices up

The prices of non-brand edible oil and onion have been increased whereas wheat and flour decreased in the city markets in a week.

Though various kinds of winter vegetables are coming in the city markets daily, the prices are still high.

The prices of palm oil and super palm oil have been increased significantly in a week.

At different city markets, super palm oil was seen to be selling between Tk 88 and Tk 95 per litre on

retail while non-brand palm oil between Tk 72 and Tk 80.

Shopkeepers said the prices of palm and super palm oil have been increased by Tk 15 in a week.

The prices of local and imported onion have been increased by Tk 5 during the period.

Imported onion retailed at Tk 24 to Tk 30 per kg yesterday while local onion at Tk 30 to 36.

Huge amounts of winter vegetables have been reaching daily to the city's three big vegetable wholesale markets--Kartan-

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Patia, Motijheel and Belpukur.
