

Dec 18 polls come first to AL

Party not focused on Hasina-Khaleda talks STAFF CORRESPONDENT

Awami League (AL) will look into the issue of dialogue between party President Sheikh Hasina and BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia when it comes up later.

"We are now heading towards the December 18 election and we are busy with nomination process (for party candidates). When the question of dialogue (between the two top leaders) comes up next time, we will look into it," AL spokesman Syed Ashraful Islam told newsmen yesterday.

The party's nomination process is almost finalised, and candidates names will be declared in a day or two after a meeting of the AL-led 14-party alliance on sharing of seats, he said.

"There is a matter of give and take with the alliance partners, and when those will be coordinated, we will declare candidates' names, said Ashraf, joint general secretary of the AL.

He was briefing newsmen after Pakistan High Commissioner Alamgir Babar met Hasina at her Sudha Sadan residence in Dhanmondi. The AL chief and the Pakistan

envoy discussed the upcoming parliamentary poll, and they agreed that the present crisis could only be resolved through the election. Asked about his views about the

December 18 poll, the envoy said it is an internal affair of Bangladesh. If it becomes acceptable to the people of this country, it would also be acceptable to his country.

'Give highest priority to energy sector in election manifestos'

With the polls knocking at the door, experts yesterday urged the political parties to give the highest priority to the energy sector in their election manifestos.

"Resolving energy crisis will be a major challenge for the next elected government. If they fail to resolve the energy crisis, it'll be difficult for them to survive in power," said Prof Ijaz Hossain of reporters. Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology (Buet) at a seminar organised by the Energy Reporters' Forum at the National Press Club.

Political leaders at the meet spoke on their respective plans for future energy sufficiency and security.

The latest thinking by experts, politicians and stakeholders came especially against the backdrop of outcry on different occasions and recent near-confrontation over hydrocarbon exploration in the Bay of Bengal.

Roy said there is a need to take said. unified initiative to resolve the

crisis on the country's energy front. It is very unfortunate that the energy sector fell in serious crisis few days after the BNP government had left office, he lamented.

"We don't know why such a grim situation has arisen when the caretaker government is running the country," he told the energy

He observed that foreign investment would come in the energy sector only when the investors are convinced that they could get returns.

Awami League leader Lt Col (retd) Faruque Khan apprised the audience that his party is giving priority to the energy sector in its election manifesto, which is being crafted in a changed situation of the country.

"We have a plan to generate 5,000-MW electricity in the next 5 works "on our own", instead of power sector sometimes fail to get years if we are voted to power in the contracting out the hydrocarbon next election. Every year, we'll mines to international oil compa-

In this context, the former lawmaker assured that all the previous contracts in the energy sector would be honoured if those are not found to be against national inter-

He said Awami League would prepare a vision statement envisioned to ensure electricity for all by 2021.

About the coal extraction for meeting energy needs, Faruque said the coal sector would be developed keeping the environment

Workers' Party President Rashed Khan Menon said country's natural resources have to be protected from the hands of "foreign merchants".

He suggested that the stateowned exploration agency Bapex should be strengthened to conduct petroleum- exploration

"If we can strengthen Bapex, it will reduce our dependence on the foreign companies," he told the meet in support of his recommendation for going local on matters of such national wealth that also bears strategic importance.

Gas Transmission Company Managing Director Monjur Morshed, however, viewed that the country does not have enough funds for conducting exploration works with the Bapex.

Because, he observed, exploration works involve high business risks, which local banks cannot afford. "So, local banks do not feel interested to invest in the energyexploration sector."

President of Jatiyatabadi Sramik Dal Zafrul Hasan said energy sector is a very sensitive sector and political parties always try to avoid any sensitive issue.

"That's why the energy and proper attention of the political parties," he added.

50 shops burn down

UNB, Savar

About 50 shops burned down in a devastating fire that broke out at Zirani Bazar in Savar yesterday morning

Fire Brigade sources said an electrical short-circuit at a shop sparked off the fire at about 9:00am, which soon engulfed adjacent grocery, stationery and cloth shops.

On receiving information, firefighters from Dhaka Export Processing Zone (DEPZ), Savar and Gazipur rushed to the spot and brought the blaze under control at about 12:00 noon.

The affected shop owners estimated that cash and valuables worth about Tk one crore were destroyed in the fire.

However, no-one was injured in the incident.

8 shops gutted in N'ganj

In Narayanganj, eight shops of chemical and mosquito net burned down in a fire on Friday midnight.

The fire originated from an electrical short-circuit at Lucky Bedding Store at about 11:30pm and ripped through other shops at Pukur Par in Tanbazar area, Fire Brigade sources said.

Firefighters from Narayanganj station rushed in at about 12:30am and extinguished the blaze after two hours of hectic efforts.

The shop owners estimated the loss at Tk 60 lakh.

Police recovered the body of Joti who hanged herself from a ceiling fan in her bedroom at Gulbagh residence at 9:30am.


