The Election Commission (EC) will announce fresh schedules for the parliamentary and upazila elections today in efforts to break the deadlock over

Zillur over talks failure remark Legally Tac can act, morally should not

Observe intellectuals, legal experts

The moral right of the government to move along the Truth and Accountability Commission (Tac) has great weakened by obtaining stay on a High Court (HC) verdict that declared Tac illegal and unconstitutional, say intellectuals and civil society members.

Legal experts have meanwhile observed that though there is no legal bar for Tac to function now, its activities would not be smooth due to the stayed HC order.

"Although there is no legal bar for the Truth resumption of Tac functioning. Commission to act, I doubt whether anybody would go to the commission after knowing that it has become a lame horse after the High Court judgment," observed eminent jurist Dr M

Though uncertain about the fate of the commission and what is going to happen to the people confessing graft, TAC Chairman Justice Habibur Rahman Khan has however said, "Current functioning of the Truth Commission

is right both legally and morally."

On the other hand, Prof Muzaffer Ahmad, convener of Shujan, a civil society initiative to promote good governance, said, "I've told many times from the very beginning that there

can't be two laws for the same offence." He added Tac even violates the country's constitution.

"The Truth Commission must wind up under the current circumstances. Its functioning is not viable morally at present," said Prof Serajul Islam Choudhury in his reaction to

Earlier on November 13, Tac stopped functioning following the HC order but resumed its activities after the Supreme Court stayed the HC order for a month on November 16.

The HC order even didn't come as something new as it was obvious to intellectuals, civil society members and legal experts that Tac was formed ignoring moral and legal restrictions, say eminent citizens and people involved with SEE PAGE 2 COL 5

Transparency International Bangladesh (TIB) thinks that Section 91(e) of the Representation of the People Order (RPO) 2008 empowering the Election Commission (EC) to take measures against the candidates for violating the code of conduct should not be cancelled.


He said the government is considering the matter as part of its policy to review the oil prices every three months.




