# 78 dead in Mumbai GDP growth may dip to 4.8pc The polls assessment team from the United Nations team of the United Nation

Terrorists target luxury hotels, tourist spot, train station; 200 hurt

Teams of heavily armed gunmen stormed luxury hotels, a popular tourist attraction and a crowded train station in at least seven attacks in India's financial capital, killing at least 78 people and wounding at least 200, officials told AP last night.

The gunmen were specifically targeting Britons and Americans, media reports said, and may be holding hostages.

The Times of India reports that unknown outfit Deccan Mujahideen claimed responsibility of the attacks.

The gunmen also attacked police headquarters in south Mumbai, the area where most of the attacks, which began

late Wednesday and continued into Thursday morning, took place.

"We are under fire, there is shooting at the gate," said constable A. Shetti by

phone from police headquarters. Hours after the first attacks, A.N. Roy, a senior police officer, said police continued to battle the gunmen.

"The terrorists have used automatic weapons and in some places grenades have been lobbed, the encounters are still going on and we are trying to overpower them," Roy said.

Johnny Joseph, chief secretary for Maharashtra state, of which Mumbai is the capital, said 78 people had been killed and 200 had been injured.

The motive for the attacks was not immediately clear but Mumbai has frequently been targeted in terror attacks, often blamed on Muslim militants, including a series of blasts in July 2007 that killed 187 people.

Gunmen opened fire on two of the city's best known luxury hotels, the Taj Mahal and the Oberoi. They also attacked the crowded Chhatrapati Shivaji Terminus station in southern Mumbai and Leopold's restaurant, a Mumbai landmark.

A British restaurant-goer at the Oberoi told Sky News television that the attackers were singling out Britons and Americans. SEE PAGE 15 COL 8

WB fears global meltdown shockwave likely to hit in 3 months; Mirza Aziz rejects the forecast

The World Bank (WB) yesterday said GDP growth in Bangladesh might come down to 4.8 per cent in the current fiscal year from the government projected 6.5 per cent as readymade garments export and remittance inflow suffered due to the global financial crisis.

Impact of the crisis will be much more clear after the next three months, the WB says. may look very different. Bangladesh has to Contingency measures like providing government assistance need to be carefully thought out.

The WB expressed these views at a press briefing on Global Financial Crisis and its likely impact on Bangladesh at its Dhaka office. Country Director of the WB Xian Zhu

spoke at the briefing where lead economist of the bank Vinaya Swaroop made the keynote presentation.

Finance and Planning adviser AB Mirza Azizul Islam however rejected the WB projection on GDP, saying it might cross six per cent.

In his presentation, Vinaya Swaroop said, " We don't know what will happen in Christmas season. Three months from now, the picture remain watchful, particularly the government, civil society and the media."

Swaroop went on, "It is extremely important to ensure that the new elected government has SEE PAGE 15 COL 4
