

Barca destroy Sporting

Barcelona coasted to a 5-2 victory over 10-man hosts Sporting Lisbon on Wednesday to win Champions League Group C after running riot at the Jose Alvalade stadium in Lisbon on Wednesday.

Both sides had already ensured their passage to the last 16 inside their first four games, leaving makeweights Shakhtar Donetsk and Basel trailing in their wake.

But Barca wanted group bragging rights and roared into a three-goal lead before a spell of complacency saw the Portuguese pull two goals back inside a minute.

The Catalan club, champions in 1992 and 2006, quickly produced a fourth goal when Marco Caneira put through his own net and teen striker Bojan Krkic scored the fifth from the penalty spot having replaced Henry at the break.

Henry, starting out as a lone spearhead with fellow former Arsenal man Alex Hleb and Messi foraging wide, put them ahead on the quarter-hour.

Most of the spade work was done by Argentine star Messi, back on song after a thigh injury forced him out of Sunday's disappoint-

ing draw with Getafe.

Messi, a candidate for the prestigious Ballon d'Or awarded by French magazine France Football in December, tore down the right flank and set Henry up on a plate barely three metres out.

Three minutes later Gerard Pique bundled in the second after Eidur Godjohnsen unwittingly deflected a loose ball to him in a melee.

Four minutes after the restart Messi poached the third, gliding in to score unmarked following a Daniel Alves freekick to all but end the contest.

Barca then endured a sloppy few moments as Miguel Veloso smacked home a ferocious freekick in the 65th minute and Liedson then netted almost straight after the restart.

But within a minute Caneira screwed the ball into his own net under pressure and the roof then fell in on Sporting as Rui Patricio was red-carded for fouling Krkic, who coolly dispatched the resulting penalty in the 73rd minute.

For Guardiola, the impressive win was all the more rewarding after he elected to rest defender and skipper Carles Puyol as well as Ivory Coast midfielder Yaya Toure and Cameroon striker Samuel Eto'o, who looked on from the bench.

Cesc targets EPL title

Cesc Fabregas, Arsenal's newly-appointed captain, has insisted the Gunners still haven't given up hope of winning the English Premier League title this season.

Arsenal travel to leaders and London rivals Chelsea on Sunday knowing they are 10 points off top spot following five league defeats already this season.

But they will be buoyed by a 1-0 Champions League win over Dynamo Kiev at the Emirates Stadium here Tuesday - Fabregas's first match as Arsenal captain.

Victory over the Ukrainians, secured by Nicklas Bendtner's late goal, saw Arsenal into the last 16 of European football's leading club competition with a

match to spare.

It was a welcome result for Arsenal following the negative headlines generated by William Gallas's public criticisms of his teammates, remarks which saw the France defender stripped of the club captaincy by compatriot and Gunners manager Arsene Wenger.

Arsenal's title aspirations may have been written off by many pundits but not by 21-year-old Spain midfielder Fabregas.

"The aim is to lift a trophy. We are in the last 16 of the Champions League and are in contention in every competition."

"We have played only 14 league games this season and it is not over yet. Nothing is done and we will fight until the end."

"Our target is to go there and win, because we could get some points back. The

other teams at the top have some difficult games as well, so we will see."

Fabregas added he felt no extra pressure now he was captain. "It was a normal game for me and I don't really think about it. I am committed to the game and I do not realise if I am wearing the armband or not. I just try to play for Arsenal and my teammates and give my best."

Looking ahead, Fabregas said he expected an open game at Stamford Bridge. "We have to play as a team and when we play good and quick passing, we can play against anybody and win."

"Arsenal never go for a draw, we always go for a win and I am sure a club like Chelsea will do the same as well because every time I have played against them they have always gone forwards, to go for the victory."

Fergie fed up with C'Ron fouling

Cristiano Ronaldo may as well peel off the No. 7 fixed to the back of his Manchester United jersey and replace it with a giant "X."

Ronaldo is the most targeted player in Europe right now, as opposing teams wake up to the fact that an aggressive approach is the best way to unsettle one of the world's finest players.

If you listen to United manager Sir Alex Ferguson, his man is the victim of an epidemic of "systematic fouling" designed to curtail his productivity or, worse, cause him injury.

Yet what Ferguson has failed to grasp himself is that the most compelling reason to take a heavy-handed approach with Ronaldo is the mental effect it has on the 23-year-old and his boss.

Ronaldo looks fragile of mind at present, seemingly ready to explode with an outburst of fury at the sight of an outstretched leg or a tug on his shirt. Lately, he has shown himself susceptible to the taunts of rival fans, gesturing towards the stands twice in English Premier League games over the last few weeks.

In the UEFA Champions League on Tuesday, he was left bruised again following United's 0-0 draw away to Villarreal. The defending European champions moved safely through to the last 16, but Ronaldo's night didn't go so smoothly as the Spanish side's defenders welcomed him to El Madrigal with tough tackling and close marking.

Greek tragedy for Inter

Inter Milan scraped through to the Champions League knock-out stages despite a shock 1-0 home defeat to Panathinaikos at the San Siro on Wednesday.

José Sarriegi scored the winner for the Greeks on 69 minutes to give them a Champions League lifeline.

Panathinaikos only need a point at home to Anorthosis Famagusta in two weeks time to join Inter in the second round, although the Italians now need a result, possibly even a victory, away to Werder Bremen or they risk failing to top Group B.

Inter coach Jose Mourinho made no excuses for the defeat but suggested that there would be no difference between finishing first or second in the group.

"We deserve to go to the last game with Werder under pressure to finish first," he said.

"We're lucky to have qualified for the last 16 after a deserved defeat, well done to our opponents."

"The coach is always responsible for a defeat and I have to listen to and accept all criticism aimed at me. It seems to me that there is no difference between finishing first or second."

"If Roma beat Bordeaux, Chelsea will finish second. If Juventus draw with Borisov, Real Madrid will finish second."

"There is no difference between finishing first or second but my thinking is to go to Werder to win."

Panathinaikos's Dutch coach Henk Ten Cate admitted he didn't expect to be in this position after his team lost their first two group games.

"Surprised, yes of course. If you start the qualification group with two defeats, normally it's game over," he said.

"But we kept believing and I said there are still four games to play. My team is improving a lot. We came this summer and we are building a new team."

"The biggest success is that we made Greek players believe they can win away from home. Normally their self-belief away is not so big but they proved they can learn quickly. If you are well organised like we were today, you can surprise a lot of people."

Kaka fancies Premiership

Milan star Kaka has revealed his desire to play in the Premier League - and speaks with Brazil teammate Robinho about Manchester City on a regular basis.

The midfielder, who on Thursday evening will feature for the Serie A giants in the UEFA Cup against Portsmouth at Fratton Park, said the English competition is the best on the planet.

"I know it is the best league in the world," he said. "So one day, maybe (I can play there). I don't know when - but it would be great to play in the Premier League."

City have become one of the most high-profile clubs following their summer takeover and subsequent capture of Robinho. Kaka said he has since taken an interest in matters at Eastlands.

"I have a lot of friends who are playing there so I have watched some games," he continued. "I speak with Robinho sometimes about Manchester City."

Kaka won the 2007 World Footballer of the Year award and is regarded as one of the best players in the world.

City also have Brazil internationals Elano and Jo on their books.

Heinze blow for Real

Spanish champions Real Madrid must do without Argentine international defender Gabriel Heinze for three weeks due to a leg injury, the club said on Wednesday.

Heinze sustained the injury to his left leg during Real's 1-0 Champions League win over BATE Borisov on Tuesday which helped them qualify for the last 16 of the competition.

It is the latest injury setback for Real who already have Ruud van Nistelrooy, Arjen Robben and Gonzalo Higuain on the treatment table while Ruben de la Red is out of contention due to health reasons.

Marseille face disciplinary action

Marseille face potential disciplinary action from UEFA after their Champions League defeat by Liverpool here on Wednesday was marred by the throwing of missiles onto the pitch from the section of the ground reserved for away supporters.

Coins and at least one cigarette lighter were directed at Liverpool captain Steven Gerrard as he took first-half corners in front of the large contingent of travelling fans.

The England midfielder did not react to the onslaught and said afterwards: "That is something for the police to deal with, not me."

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Liverpool in last 16

Atletico Madrid, Liverpool and Inter Milan reached into the Champions League second round on Wednesday night while 10-man Chelsea and minnows Anorthosis Famagusta must wait and see.

Steven Gerrard's goal shot Liverpool through in a 1-0 home victory over Marseille, Atletico beat PSV Eindhoven 2-1, while Inter Milan still went through after losing at home to complete 13-pieces of the 16-team knockout stage jigsaw.

Anorthosis must be kicking themselves after throwing away a 2-0 lead at home to Werder Bremen, drawing 2-2, and Panathinaikos shocked Inter Milan 1-0 in Italy in Group B.

Group A is wide open after Chelsea drew 1-1 at Bordeaux with Nicolas Anelka on the scoresheet and Frank Lampard suspended for their final match at home to Romanians Cluj after a second yellow card. Roma won 3-1 at Cluj and host Bordeaux in their final match.

Barcelona topped Group C with a 5-2 victory at Sporting Lisbon as Spain got a Grand Slam of all four clubs - Real Madrid and Villarreal are the others - through to the next phase.

Atletico fans had to celebrate goals from Simao and Maxi Rodriguez outside their Vicente Calderon stadium after UEFA punished the club for disturbances and reported racist remarks by its fans during the group match against Marseille on October 1.

As for Anorthosis Famagusta, they threw away vital points as they let slip a two-goal lead at home to eliminated Werder Bremen to leave their hopes of further progress hanging by a thread.

A Diego penalty and Hugo Almeida's last-gasp volley cancelled out goals from Nikos Nikolaou and Savio and Temuri Ketsbaia's surprise package now need a result in Athens against Panathinaikos to reach the knockout phase. Rank outsiders Anorthosis

slid down to third place on six points - one behind the Greeks, who bagged their win at the San Siro courtesy of Josu Sarriegi's second-half strike.

"We are disappointed because we led 2-0 but couldn't hold on, we made mistakes and at this level you get punished for mistakes," Anorthosis manager Temuri Ketsbaia said.

Anorthosis can only dream of enjoying the multimillion budget of English big-spenders Chelsea - but Luis Felipe Scolari's men are in the same boat with one match to go after they also let slip a lead to push qualification down to the wire and the last match.

Nicolas Anelka's cool finish on the hour looked set to claim full points but Alou Diarra headed the equaliser seven minutes from time and then Chelsea had England star Frank Lampard sent off for a second yellow card in the closing stages.

In the other Anglo-French contest, Gerrard's first half header from Xabi Alonso's cross saw off Marseille - but the French club now face potential disciplinary action from UEFA after missiles were thrown in the England midfielder's direction from the away end.
