The young Black Cap star needs a mere 164 runs to surpass the record for most Test runs in a calendar year, currently held by John Reid, who scored 137 runs in 1965.

Currently playing in the second Test against the Australians in Adelaide, Taylor's run tally for 2008 sits at 708 in nine Tests for the time being. Should he not beat

Run-outs mark defeat

Running between the wickets has now emerged as a major headache for the Bangladesh team with three batsmen falling prey to unnecessary dismissals as South Africa cruised to an innings and 48-run win in the second Test at Centurion on Friday.

Mehrab Hossain, captain Mohammad Ashraful and Rokibul Hasan were all culpable as they fell to shocking run-outs during the second innings on the third day of the final Test at the SuperSport Park.

Another defeat inside three days was not entirely unexpected but the stupidity of the aforementioned three only added to the woes of an already brittle batting line-up.

The win meant, that despite some hiccups during their batting, South Africa kept up their one hundred percent record against the Tigers after they had swept the first Test by an innings and 129 runs.

Trailing by 179 runs, Bangladesh started their innings a few minutes ahead

of the lunch break and were bundled out with nearly two hours of the day's play remaining for a paltry 131.

It put paid to a strong bowling effort from Shakib Al Hasan who took six wickets to nail the Proteas down for 429.

The hesitation in running has been a salient feature in this series but while only Mashfiqur Rahim had fallen victim to it in the first Test, this time it exploded out of proportion.

The value that the Tigers put on their wickets while playing a top side like South Africa was laughable at times and their display of running only validated this fact.

Ashraful unnecessarily turned for second run after pushing Morne Morkel but Hashim Amla's direct hit down at the bowler's end saw Mehrab Hossain (0) fall short of his ground as Bangladesh were reduced to 57 for four.

On the second occasion the captain made another blunder, this time accounting for himself.

Looking well settled in the middle Ashraful yet again erred when a more resolute approach was required. Though it was an excellent direct hit from Dale Steyn down at long-leg, the right-hander could have easily avoided the debacle.

Finally it was Rokibul Hasan who went

for a frankly idiotic single and saw Ashwell Prince make no mistake to send him back for 28.

"It's really disappointing. I think we don't anticipate very well. The outfields here are very quick and ball travels faster to the fielder, so what can be an easy two on our grounds can get you run out over here," said frustrated Mohammad Salihuddin, the team's fielding coach.

"Generally we are not fast runners between wickets but we also have to know the fielders because someone like Dale Steyn has one of the most powerful throws in world cricket," he added.

On the other hand it seemed that Tamim Iqbal and Shakib Al Hasan hardly learnt anything from their previous mistakes as the left-handers once again went to chase balls well outside the off-stumps to throw away their wickets.

Tamim failed to carry on despite scoring 20, as the Chittagongian tried to cut Morkel to a backward where Neil McKenzie, who had dropped the same batsman on 16 off Jacques Kallis, took an excellent diving catch.

Bowling hero Shakib continued his poor showing with the bat as the left-hander chased a short and very wide

Smith sees no progress

It was hard to believe that we lost the match inside three days. We were in a very good position to push South Africa more in the Test but three bad runs outs spoiled everything," said a dejected Bangladesh skipper Mohammad Ashraful reflect-

ing on his side's an innings and 48-run defeat.

Understandably, coach Jamie Siddons was also disappointed by his charges' second-innings batting where they were bundled out for 131 after an impressive 250 in the first innings.

"At least we should have given them some runs to score. It could have been fine if we could managed 250 to 270 on the board. But there were three unnecessary run outs which is totally irresponsible," said Siddons.

"Falling victims to run outs in Test match is really a crime. Things could have been much better if three batsmen had not fall for run outs. It's very difficult to fight against such a good attack if three top order batsmen get out in this way," echoed Ashraful.

Bangladesh coach and captain both said that in the match, a couple of decisions went against them and pointed to some positive outcomes in a tough series ahead of their next home assignment against Sri Lanka.

"I must praise the effort in the first innings where we scored 250 against a very good bowling attack and I am happy the way the guys defended the captain's decision of batting first on this kind of track.

"Then our bowling was good, especially Shakib was excellent. There were, however, some bad decisions," said Siddons.

On the other hand, South African skipper Graeme Smith reiterated his claim that he has hardly seen any improvement in the performance of the Bangladesh team.

"It's a difficult question for me to answer because it's not my job. My job is to see South Africa playing good cricket," said Siddons.



Shakib, who also claimed five wickets in the first Test to enhance his reputation as a spinner and became the second bowler after Enamul Haque to take consecutive five-wicket hauls in Tests, was unlucky not to become second bowler for Bangladesh to make a hattrick after Alok Kapali.

The young left-arm spinner left the field before tea on the second day to treat a cut in his finger that gave Ashwell Prince and Mark Boucher, who made a record South African sixth wicket partnership,

some room to settle in the middle to take away the initiative.

"It was a very crucial stage of the match as we kept them under pressure. Another wicket could have changed everything but unfortunately I had to leave the field to treat my cut. If I could have continued the bowling with another paceman from the other side then you never know what could have happened," observed a positive Shakib.

But his next observation was more significant when he said that their opponents were lucky to ease the pressure.

"No doubt they batted well but I think they were a bit lucky also," said the all-rounder without elaborating.

But without any doubt he has raised the questions against the poor umpiring which apparently upset the whole Bangladesh team as they believe that they were just one wicket away to take the first innings lead against Graeme Smith's men for the second time.

The TV replays clearly showed that Mark Boucher, who hit 117, survived at least twice against confident leg-before appeals from the Bangladeshis while Prince, who made his career best 162 not out, had one reprieve.

The two overnight batsmen were on top against the pacers before Shakib

stopped their surge by removing Boucher, who pushed at the ball only to give a catch at short cover to Imrul Kayes.

It just opened the gate for Shakib as Morkel got an inside edge onto his pads to see his off-stump dismantled in the very first ball. The left-arm spinner was on a hattrick but Monde Zondeki frustrated him but in the next ball he got rid of him.

Shahadat Hossain picked up the remaining two wickets to warp up the South African innings but before that the home side confirmed a 179-run lead thanks to a good knock from Prince.

The Kingsmead is his favourite ground but the left-hander definitely considered SuperSport as a lucky ground as he got his first hundred against Zimbabwe at the same ground and also made another century against Pakistan last year before making this, his highest score in Tests.

"Bangladesh were bullish when Mark Boucher and I started batting. They said they needed just one wicket to get to the tail. However, batting became easier as the ball got older and softer," said Prince.

"In previous Tests I went to bat against them (Bangladesh) when we had accumulated around 500 runs and I did not find that stimulating," he added.

India on Friday took the first step towards resuming international cricket after the deadly Mumbai blasts by removing the terror-hit city from England's Test schedule.

The Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) shifted the second Test from Mumbai to the southern city of Chennai in the only change for next month's two-match series.

The first Test will be played as scheduled in the western city of Ahmedabad from December 11-15, while Chennai will host the second Test from December 19-23.

The series will be preceded by a three-day practice match
