Khaleda tells rallies on road to Jessore, seeks vote to foil conspiracies

Religion exploiting leaflets ask to vote against non-Muslims

A vested interest group is distributing three types of leaflets among villagers of Thakurgaon-1 constituency using religious sentiments to apparently persuade Muslim voters to vote against Awami League-led grand alliance candidate Ramesh Chandra Sen.

The leaflets--one containing verses from the Quran and their translation, another a parody of a popular song and the other a few short Bangla verses, bear the name of Bangladesh Muslim League presidium member M Shamsul Haque.

The leaflet titled "Al-Quraner Bani" (teachings of the Quran) quotes different verses and clearly asks Muslims not to cast votes for a non-Muslim candidate in the December 29 parliamentary elections.

The leaflet also says Islam does not accept the idea of secularism, which it says is a complete deviation from Islamic ideology. Another leaflet titled "Voter Panchali" urges people to elect the BNP-led four-party alliance candidate, Mirza Fakhrul Islam. When the leaflets were shown to Thakurgaon district Election

tions from the Quran printed in the leaflet are not false. "It is not a violation of electoral rules since no Muslim League candidate is participating in the election from this constitu-

ency," he said. Grand alliance candidate Ramesh Chandra Sen, however, claimed it to be a clear violation of the electoral rules as the Election Commission has strictly prohibited the use of religious sentiment in electoral campaigns.

HC hands over Humayra to British High Commission

The High Court (HC) yesterday handed over Humayra Abedin, 33, an expatriate trainee doctor in London, to the British High Commission in Bangladesh for sending her back to London as per her will.

Humayra was kept detained forcibly against her will by her parents for the last

five months. An HC bench comprising Justice Syed Mahmud Hossain and Justice Quamrul Islam Siddiqui sent Humayra to the British High Commission through the Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP) and requested the High Commission to arrange her safe custody until her departure for London.

The court annexed with its order a copy of a British court order directing her parents to disclose her whereabouts immediately and produce her to Ain O Shalish Kendra (ASK), a human rights organisation, or the British High Commission (HC) in Bangladesh.

As the two leaders met in Nuri al-Maliki's private office, a journalist sitting in the third row jumped up, shouting, "It is the farewell kiss, you dog," and threw his shoes one after the other towards Bush.

Maliki made a protective gesture towards the US president, who ducked and was not hit.

The British leader stressed that terrorism was a global problem and said three-quarters of the most serious terror plots investigated by British authorities had links to al-Qaeda in Pakistan.

Earlier in New Delhi, he met Indian Prime Minister Manmohan Singh to discuss security in the region after the Mumbai attacks, which New Delhi has blamed on "elements" in Pakistan.

Brown said his meeting with Zardari had reassured him of Pakistan's determination to act against those responsible for

whathe called a "human tragedy on a terrible scale." He also stressed that Pakistan was itself a victim of terrorism, having suffered 50 suicide attacks this year alone.
