# Hasina at terror risk Polls symbol allocation gets

#### Intelligences see extremist threat again, examine Indian media report; security beefed further up

Security and intelligence agencies last month warned Awami League (AL) President Sheikh Hasina of possible attempts on her life by extremist groups (Huji) and Jama'atul Mujahideen Bangladesh, said sources concerned.

It was at that time Special Security Force (SSF) assumed the responsibility of ensuring her security, they added.

Meanwhile, security measures for Hasina have been stepped up following news by an Indian television network that

Huji has unleashed a six-member suicide squad to kill the former prime minister.

SSF Director General (DG) Major General Ashraf Abdullah Yussuf told The Daily Star yesterday, "We often receive such leads and none of those is less including Harkat-ul-Jihad-al-Islami important to us. We have taken extra safety precautions for Sheikh Hasina like we do each time after we have such infor-

European Union (EU) election observation mission chief Alexander Graf Lamsdroff yesterday urged the political parties to refrain from making 'unsubstantiated' allegations against the election administration as it might harm the polls process.

He hoped that the parties would participate in the upcoming parliamentary election with a 'positive attitude' and accept the poll results.

Lamsdroff was giving a talk at Dhaka Reporters Unity follow ing a meeting with the chief adviser.

"If someone makes an allegation, it has to be substantiated with documents. Unsubstantiated allegations will not serve interest of the people, " the EU chef observer said in reply to a question about BNP's allegation of 'conspiracy' by the election administration.

# Be graceful losers to begin new culture

Political parties in polls race urged

Whoever loses the upcoming national election must accept the results to usher in a culture of tolerance and cooperation, said political analysts, economists and civil society members yesterday.

government will also be responsible for rendering the parliament effective, they said at a discussion on 'election and future Bangladesh' organised by the daily Prothom Alo in its office in the capital.

The next government should continue the drive against corruption and strengthen democratic institutions to maintain good governance, and to de-politicise the civil administra-

tion, they added. Stating that 'politics of blame' severely harms the society, the speakers suggested that the government and the opposition in parliament must come to a consensus on basic national issues and form a high-level committee to face the impacts of the global economic

recession. "The government should create an environ-

ment for the opposition to remain in the parliament. I want integrity of the national institutions, curbing of corruption and accountability of the government," said Anti-corruption Commission (ACC) Chairman Hasan Mashhud Chowdhury.

He said the opposition has to accept the poll The party that will form the next elected results, refrain themselves from destructive activities, pledge that they will not go into hartals, and make significant contribution to the issues of national importance.

"The winners take all mentality should be avoided...politicians should remain in the parliament, not on the streets. They should be tolerant," said Syed Manzur Elahi, former adviser to a caretaker government.

Bangladesh's economy might face a serious blow in February-March next year because of a possible drop in profit margins from export commodities and in their prices, he said adding, "If politics remain unstable, the country's economy will get a double blow."
