

Pakistan ready to retaliate if India strikes

The Pakistan National Assembly has passed a unanimous resolution condemning the November 26 Mumbai terror attack but has also warned India against undertaking surgical strikes in any part of Pakistan.

Pakistan's army chief General Ashfaq Parvez Kayani has said Pakistani armed forces would give an "equal" response within few minutes if India carried out any surgical strike inside their territory.

Kayani said this at a meeting with President Asif Ali Zardari at the Awan-e-Sadr on Wednesday.

The Army chief apprised the President of operational preparedness of the armed

forces.

"The armed forces are fully prepared to meet any eventuality, as his men are ready to sacrifice for their country," Pakistan daily The News quoted Gen Kayani as telling the President.

Zardari believed in gearing up efforts for peace, which should otherwise not be taken as a sign of weakness, the paper said.

He said, "Pakistan wanted peaceful and cordial relations with all its neighbours, but the threatening statements of Indian leadership were creating an atmosphere of aggression and harming the regional environment."

The President added, "We are keeping a close watch on all the latest developments and threatening tones of Indian leader-

ship."

He said all the national security agencies, the army, political leadership and public were completely united to befittingly meet any aggression against Pakistan.

"Islamabad is in touch with all friendly countries, which were being briefed about Pakistan's peace efforts and the hostility shown by India."

"We do not want any war with India, as that would prove detrimental to both our nations," the President was quoted as saying.

Zardari, however, expressed his satisfaction over the preparedness of the Army and said all necessary resources would be provided to the armed forces. He said, "We have the right to defend our borders in case of any aggression."

Germans save Egyptian ship from Somali pirates

A German military helicopter rescued an Egyptian ship from pirates who shot and injured a crew member while trying to board the vessel off the coast of Somalia on Thursday, an official said.

The bulk carrier with 31 crew was passing through the Gulf of Aden on its way to Asia when it was chased by gun-toting pirates in a speedboat, said Noel Choong of the International Maritime Bureau's piracy reporting centre.

British soldier, 4 road workers killed in Afghanistan

A British soldier was shot dead in Afghanistan on Christmas Eve, the same day a US soldier died in a separate attack, officials said yesterday as international mortar fire killed four road workers.

The Royal Marine, whose identity was not released, was killed Wednesday while trying to drive "enemy forces" from a compound in the southern province of Helmand, the British defence ministry said in a statement.

"The death of this Royal Marine is a tragic loss and coming so close to Christmas, this is particularly poignant," said the British military's spokeswoman in Helmand, Commander Paula Rowe.

Ten killed in Muslim rebels' attacks in Philippines

Ten people were killed when Muslim separatist guerrillas launched attacks and occupied a village in the southern Philippines, military and police officials said yesterday.

Moro Islamic Liberation Front (MILF) rebels attacked Midungo village in the southern island of Mindanao with rocket-propelled grenades and assault rifles on Tuesday, said military spokesman Lieutenant Colonel Julieto Ando.

The militants killed nine residents and wounded another, he said, updating an earlier toll of six after three more deaths were discovered.

Pope calls for ME peace, African stability

Pope Benedict XVI called yesterday for peace in the Middle East and stability in Africa during his traditional Christmas speech in St Peter's Square.

"May the divine light of Bethlehem radiate throughout the Holy Land, (bringing) forth rich fruit from the efforts of all those who (shun) the twisted logic of conflict and violence," he said, addressing thousands of pilgrims gathered in the square and millions of viewers on television.

In the Middle East, "the horizon seems once again bleak for Israelis and Palestinians," said the 81-year-old pontiff after nearly four years on the papal throne.

Benedict also spoke strongly about greed, saying

"our world will certainly fall apart ... if people look only to their own interests."

"Wherever the selfishness of individuals and groups prevails over the common good ... may the light of Christmas shine forth and encourage all people to do their part in a spirit of authentic solidarity," the pope urged.

The German pope, looking somewhat tired, said "an increasingly uncertain future is regarded with apprehension, even in affluent nations."

The pontiff offered Christmas wishes in 64 languages to television viewers around the world.

In his comments on Africa, the pope said Zimbabweans have been "trapped for all too long in a political and social crisis which, sadly, keeps worsening."

UN condemns Myanmar rights violations

The UN General Assembly on Wednesday strongly condemned widespread human rights violations in Myanmar and called on the government to free political prisoners, including Nobel Peace Prize laureate Aung San Suu Kyi.

The sharply worded resolution, sponsored by the United States, Israel and many other countries, was approved by a vote of 80-25 with 45 abstentions.

Myanmar accused the assembly of "blatant interference" in its internal political process and said it will not be bound by the resolution. Unlike the more powerful Security Council, General

Assembly resolutions are not legally binding but carry weight because they reflect the views of the 192-member world body.

Myanmar's representative, who was not identified, told the assembly the country had made significant political strides and was now on track for a smooth transition to democracy, with a seven-step political process including multiparty elections in 2010.

But the resolution expressed "grave concern" at the failure to include members of pro-democracy leader Suu Kyi's party and other political parties and some ethnic groups "in a genuine process of transition to democracy."

Car bombing kills 4 at Baghdad restaurant

Three US soldiers die in accident

At least four Iraqis were killed when a car bomb exploded outside a popular restaurant in Baghdad yesterday, security officials said.

The attack took place in the predominantly Shia Muslim district of Shola in northeastern Baghdad, sources from the interior and defence ministries told AFP.

"Four people were killed and 13 wounded when a car bomb that was parked on the side of the road blew up," an interior ministry source said.

Women were among the

wounded, the officials said, warning that the number of casualties may rise.

Earlier three American soldiers were killed in a vehicle accident in southern Iraq on Wednesday, the US military said in a statement.

The statement gave no further details of the circumstances of the accident but said it was under investigation.

The latest deaths take to 4,216 the number of members of the US military who have died in Iraq since the 2003 invasion, according to an AFP tally based on the independent website www.icasualties.org.

Israel vows to end Hamas control of Gaza

Israeli Foreign Minister Tzipi Livni vowed yesterday to strike back at the Hamas rulers of Gaza after a sharp escalation of violence in the Palestinian territory dashed hopes of a new truce.

Earlier Defence Minister Ehud Barak warned yesterday that militants in Hamas-ruled Gaza would pay a "heavy price" if they continued to target Israel and the military finalised preparations for a possible large-scale assault on the coastal territory.

Israel's military said four mortars were fired Thursday into Israel, causing no injuries. According to Army Radio, a fifth mortar landed at Israel's passenger crossing with Gaza as Gaza Christians were cross-

ing en route to the West Bank town of Bethlehem for Christmas Day celebrations. Security officials had no additional information on that report.

"Enough is enough. The situation is going to change," Livni said in Cairo after meeting Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak to discuss the deteriorating situation in the Gaza Strip since a truce expired six days ago.

"Unfortunately there is one address to the situation of the people in the Gaza Strip, this is Hamas, Hamas controls them, Hamas decided to target Israel, this is something that has to be stopped and this is what we're going to do," she said in English.

"Yesterday's escalation was unbearable," Livni said after Gaza militants hit Israel with

their biggest rocket barrage in six months to avenge the killing of three fighters from the Islamist movement.

"Hamas needs to understand that our aspiration for peace does not mean that Israel will take this situation any longer," Livni said at a press conference with Egyptian Foreign Minister Ahmed Abul Gheit.

"Hamas's control of the Gaza Strip is not only Israel's problem... but what we are doing is an expression of the needs of the region."

"The situation in the Gaza Strip has become an obstacle on the way of the Palestinians toward a state," added Livni, who has vowed to topple Hamas if her Kadima party wins a general election in February.

Guinea coup leader declares himself new 'president'

A junior army officer declared himself the new president of Guinea at the head of a military junta and ordered the government and top military brass to give themselves up by the end of yesterday.

Moussa Dadis Camara, an army captain in his forties, appeared to be tightening his grip on the mineral-rich west African nation following the death of longtime Lansana Conte.

In a show of force, Camara paraded through the capital on Wednesday with hundreds of soldiers before announcing he was the new "president of

therepublic".

A crowd of thousands of coup supporters thronged the streets of Conakry, surround-


ing the presidential palace and the government ministries, before dispersing peacefully.

Among them were many young people from the suburbs of the capital, disaffected after years of dictatorial rule.

"We no longer want the Conte system in Guinea. And if you are cutting down a tree, you must tear out all its roots," said Edouard, a 22-year-old student.

Conte had ruled with an iron fist since 1984 and within hours of his passing late Monday at the age of 74, a group of soldiers took control of the airwaves and claimed to have seized power.

Georgia, US to sign strategic accord Jan 4: Tbilisi

Georgia and the United States will on January 4 sign a strategic partnership treaty that risks again provoking Russian wrath against Tbilisi, the Georgian foreign ministry said yesterday.


"Georgian Minister of Foreign Affairs Grigol Vashadze and the US Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice will sign a strategic partnership treaty on January 4 in Washington," foreign ministry spokes-

woman Khatuna Iosava told AFP.

The accord, similar to a strategic agreement Washington has recently signed with Ukraine, risks raising tensions with Russia, which earlier this year fought a brief war with Georgia over the breakaway region of South Ossetia.

The US signed similar strategic partnerships with Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania in 1998, when the three countries were seeking to join Nato in the face of fierce opposition from Moscow.
