# 195 killed in Isareli air strikes on Gaza

#### World powers call for peace, Hamas responds by firing rockets

AFP, Gaza City

At least 195 Palestinians were killed across the Gaza Strip on Saturday in massive Israeli air strikes on the Hamas-run enclave, said the head of Gaza emergency services Moawiya Hassanein.

Another 300 people were wounded, some 120 of them seriously in the attacks. An Israeli man died as Hamas swiftly

responded to the air raids by firing rockets

into the Jewish state. As Israel warned that the bombardment was "just the beginning," Hamas told Israelis living near their Gaza stronghold to "prepare the funeral shrouds."

In Gaza, thick clouds of smoke billowed into the sky and mangled, bloody, charred corpses littered the pavement around Hamas security structures in the coastal strip where the bombardment sowed panic in the streets, television images showed.

The deadly attacks came after days of both sides. escalating violence around the besieged coastal strip that the Islamist Hamas movement has run since June 2007, with militants firing rockets and Israel vowing a fiery response.

Palestinian President Mahmud Abbas

told AFP from Saudi Arabia that he was in "urgent contact" with numerous coun tries to stop "the cowardly aggressions and massacres in the Gaza Strip."

The bombardment sparked international calls for a stop to the violence, with Russia, France and the European Union calling for an end to the bloodletting by

The European Union, the bloc's current president France, Britain and Russia urged both sides to stop the fighting, the United States said Israel should avoid civilian casualties, while in the Middle SEE PAGE 15 COL 7

## Requisition, restriction to curtail city mobility

People may face a commuting problem in Dhaka from early today as many private bus and minibus owners have planned to halt or reduce the movement of vehicles, fearing forced requisition of their transports by the police.

Also, the Election Commission has banned movement of some modes of vehicles countrywide from the midnight of December 28 to the midnight of December 29 because of the elections.

The vehicles that came under such restrictions include autorickshaws, taxicabs, pickups, cars, buses, trucks and other human haulers -- and motorised river vessels.

However highways are not under the purview of such a ban. There are allegations from bus and minibus owners that police have taken away many of their vehicles without any notice for requisition or settling any payment, which the lawenforcement agency denied.

According to the Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP), around 562 bus and minibuses have been requisitioned during the election time.

DMP says it needs 70 buses and minibuses a day usually for patrolling and other purposes in the metropolis.

Contradicting the figure of the vehicles claimed to be requisitioned by the DMP, the transport owners association said as many as 2,300 vehicles, including bus, minibus, pickup and

truck, were taken for polling duty. As per the Requisition Act of DMP, any company owning more than 30 buses must keep a bus reserved for police every day and the DMP has an unwritten agreement with the owners in this regard.
