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Oath in a day or two

Lawmakers-elect are likely to take oath on Saturday or Sunday as the Election Commission (EC) published results of Monday's polls in official gazettes yesterday.

According to the constitution, Speaker Jamiruddin Sircar, elected speaker of the last parliament, will administer the oath taking by Sunday.

The MPs-elect will have to take oath within three days of the publication of the results in official gazettes, says the constitution.

The BNP, which suffered a huge defeat Monday, included this provision in the constitution in 2004. The party has yet to decide whether its lawmakers-elect will take oath or not.

Rigging claim binned to rule AL cabinet


CEC says people never make any mistake in giving verdict if environment is right; hopes poll standard be upheld in future

Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) ATM Shamsul Huda has termed the ninth parliamentary election credible, saying no-one should disrespect the people's verdict as reflected in the polls.

"People are a very important factor. None of us should disregard or ignore their desire or verdict. We should show respect to it," the CEC said in his first post-polls briefing at the EC Secretariat vesterday. He said this when asked to comment on the BNP chief's reaction to polls results.

Congratulating the voters, especially the young and women, for exercising their franchise en masse, the CEC said, "People never make any mistake to give their verdict if we can create the opportunity and ensure they will return to their destinations unhindered after casting



votes.'

In response to a query about the comment of BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia on the results, Huda said, "The whole thing was visible. People will judge whether the election is acceptable and we have left

the matter for future."

He said an aged leader of the country made the comment and he does not want to say anything about it. Referring to the observer groups' reports, he however said the election has been appreciated at home and abroad.

Huda, who was appointed CEC in February 2007 after declaration of the state of emergency, also said they are by and large satisfied that they have presented the nation with a credible election.

"Overall, we're very happy that the election was held peacefully and in a disciplined manner," he said, adding a few incidents might take place in such a huge election which is usual.

Prominent old guards may be sidelined in charter for change

Awami League (AL) President Sheikh Hasina may pick younger, educated and deft leaders in the party as cabinet colleagues to implement her party's electoral pledges at the earliest.

Party sources said the AL chief might opt for a small cabinet comprised of 25-30 members including a few renowned professionals as technocrat ministers for finance and law, among others. A few leaders from among the allies may also be given the

cabinet portfolio, according to sources of parties in the alliance.

As of yesterday, however, Hasina did not say much about her

cabinet to be formed within next week. Meanwhile, a few senior party leaders anonymously expressed their views on the formation of the new cabinet.

Most of them have suggested not picking tendentious persons, especially those who earlier failed to show competence and quality, to avert further controversy. They said party men with clean image at home and abroad would be given priority for cabinet posts.

No impact of 'no' vote

The newly introduced option of casting 'no' vote failed to exert any impact on Monday's national election as only .55 percent voters went for the alternative ignoring the candidates.

Having been advised by the dignitaries of the NGOs and civil society members, the Election Commission (EC) provided voters with the option of casting 'no' vote amid strong opposition and uproar from the political parties.

BNP now alleges 'digital rigging'



BNP yesterday alleged that 'digital' vote rigging in Monday's national election led to its stunning defeat.

It was 'absolutely impossible' to cast 87 percent of total votes (EC estimate) in the stipulated time for casting vote, said Rizvi Ahmed, office secretary of the party.

"In every polling booth across the country, the number of votes cast was shown to be 398.5 on an average in the stipulated time (8:00am to magical trick," he said at a press briefing at the BNP chairperson's Gulshan office. Explaining this, Rizvi said,
