MPs-elect take oath today, tomorrow

Members-elect of parliament belonging to Awami League (AL)-led grand alliance will take oath this afternoon at the Jatiya Sangsad Bhaban and the remaining MPs-elect will be sworn in tomorrow.

Outgoing Speaker Jamiruddin Sircar will administer the oath at the 'oath hall' completing all preparations in a hurry as the alliance is set to assume power on Monday or Tuesday.

The AL parliamentary party (ALPP) will convene as soon as possible to elect party chief Sheikh Hasina leader of the ALPP, and request the president to appoint her as prime minister.



The new elected government and the opposition should not feel like winners or losers, rather they should work together to strengthen the democratic institutions, said the UN panel on parliamentary elections in Bangladesh yesterday.

It also said dealing with the global economic crisis will be the biggest immediate challenge for the new government.

Terming the just concluded national polls fair, credible and of international standards, the panel said the authorities, however, must pay attention to all complaints BNP is making because there might be some validity to those.

constructive role in parliament

BNP will play a constructive role as the opposition in parliament if the treasury bench conducts itself properly, the party's Secretary General Khandaker Delwar Hossain said yesterday.

"Of course, they [Awami League] will have cooperation from us if they truly want the parliament to be effective and resolving all issues of national interest," he added.

He was talking to reporters at his Nam flat in the afternoon. Delwar however said his party has yet to decide when its lawmakers-elect would take oath.

His comments, which came three days after the BNP-led four-party alliance suffered a trouncing in the general election, suggest that BNP would join the ninth parliament.

He said, "We should replace the existing political culture with a fair one. I won't see your face just because you hold different political ideals or there's a difference of opinion....this attitude can never be helpful for democracy."

Asked about AL President Sheikh Hasina's call for cooperation in running the government, he said [addressing Hasina], "You have won the election, be it by rigging or any other means. It's always the elder brother who should tell the younger one, 'let's work together'.

Though BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia has described the December 29 election as 'stage-managed', her colleagues put the polls drubbing down to wrong strategies and waning organisational strength.

The party policymakers are now divided over what course of action they should take. While some favour accepting the results and playing a positive role in parliament, the others stay opposed to the idea.

Several mid-level leaders allege that a group of former bureaucrats who had misguided Khaleda Zia are now insisting that she take a hard-line stance.

Though most of its MPs-elect are back in the capital, the party was yet to announce officially whether to let them take oath.

A number of senior leaders have however hinted that the party would join the ninth parliament. Analysing possible reasons for the polls debacle, some BNP | new government." He added

leaders said the grassroots fell far behind the rivals in the preparatory work due to the leadership's indecision over participation even a couple of weeks before the polls.

Talking to The Daily Star, they also said controversial nominations gave a wrong signal to the people, especially when AL in

Sheikh Hasina's acid test

The first cabinet will give the clearest sign of her promised change

Two recent elections have been fought on the promise of 'change' -- Barack Obama's in the US and Sheikh Hasina's in Bangladesh -- and both of them received resounding endorsement from the electorate and both now have the potential of transforming the politics of their two countries. The similarity can go further if Sheikh Hasina chooses her cabinet with the same circumspection and in-depth thinking as Obama has done, putting premium on expertise, experience and integrity.

Even before Sheikh Hasina has had time to savour her historic victory, she is having to plunge herself into the difficult challenge of tries. picking her cabinet. It is normally a very hard task to choose between party loyalists and those who can provide an efficient government. Dulu freed on bail

Former BNP deputy minister for land Ruhul Kuddus Talukder Dulu was released yesterday from the prison cell of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University (BSMMU).

Dulu was freed from the prison cell at about 1:15pm, said Towhidul Islam, superintendent of Dhaka Central Jail, while talking to The Daily Star.

The BNP leader, who is sentenced to 20 years' rigorous imprisonment in two cases, had surrendered to a Dhaka court on February 20, 2007 and is now facing a total of 23 cases, including six for his alleged link with militancy. Of the cases, a tribunal

POLL PLEDGE TO LOWER FOOD PRICES

New govt's first task is to cut Boro output cost

The country has a record food stock now but the coming government will have to depend on Boro production in the next season to fulfil its election pledge to lower prices of essentials including rice.

And for this, immediately after taking over, the newly elected government has to take steps not only to increase Boro output but also to bring down its cost of production. Prices of farm inputs like fertiliser have to be decreased to reduce production cost.

According to Bangladesh Bank's latest report, food stock at the end of November last stood at 14.72 lakh tonnes compared to 6.11 lakh tonnes in November in the previous year.

Food ministry sources however said the much high. stock came down to less than 14 lakh tonnes due to food distribution through different

government channels.

Head of research wing of the Centre for Policy Dialogue (CPD) Uttam Kumar Deb said the stock situation is satisfactory now. Aus and Aman harvests were good last year.

The government will have to go for higher Boro production and lower prices of fertiliser and diesel at once, Deb said.

In the global market, price of urea fertiliser dropped by 68 per cent, that of DAP by 48 per cent and TSP by 19 per cent in November compared to May last.

But in Bangladesh, prices of all types of fertiliser are still quite high. TSP is now selling at Tk 75 per kg and Potash at Tk 45-48 a kg compared to Tk 34 and Tk 30 per kg in May last year. Rice price has decreased slightly but it is still

Military officials said Sri Lankan ground troops had punched through Tiger defences at two locations in the city and quickly taken full control of the area.


