Army to be deployed in UZ polls

The Election Commission (EC) has decided to deploy army personnel to help ensure peaceful holding of election to 481 upazila parishads in the country on January 22, deviating from its earlier decision in this regard.

"A decision to deploy army has been taken," Election Commissioner Brig Gen (retd) M Shakhawat Hossain said when contacted yesterday.

EC sources said although the commission had earlier decided not to deploy members of the armed forces during upazila polls, it has changed its decision apprehending deterioration in law

The ninth parliament will convene at 3:00pm January 25. Président Iajuddin Ahmed has summoned the newly elected

legislature to meet as per article 72 (1) of the constitution, said a Parliament Secretariat handout Thursday.

The first sitting will see a speaker and a deputy speaker elected. It will also have to give legal cover to over 100 ordinances promulgated by the caretaker government. Meanwhile, the BNP lawmakers-elect have decided to take

oath and join the first session of parliament. The party won 29 seats and its rival Awami League (AL) 230 in the December 29 election.

"We'll join parliament for the sake of democracy and in national interest," Salauddin Quader Chowdhury, senior BNP leader and MP-elect, told reporters after a two-hour meeting at Chairperson Khaleda Zia's Gulshan office Wednesday.

Sheikh Hasina's cabinet: Gutsy but risky

She promised to surprise us with her choice of the cabinet, and she did. Though the media was able to get some predictions right but generally speaking she outwitted us all. Not only in choosing the individuals but equally in giving them portfolios, Prime Minister (PM) Sheikh Hasina showed a boldness and a spirit of moving away from the trodden path that is rare in our politics. However, in her 'thinking out of the box' she has also taken some very serious risks that can make or break her government's prospect for success.

Whatever be our reaction to the cabinet we will, and must, give it a reasonable time to perform before we make any conclusion as how correct the PM was in choosing the cabinet that she did. So today's comments therefore are preliminary ones, based more on our impression and existing reputations of the ministers concerned.

In terms of new faces one couldn't have asked for more. As to clean reputation, except for a few, she is well on target. She also scores very high on getting some grassroots based politicians, who are not well known in Dhaka circles, into the helm of affairs. It is in the area of experience that she runs her greatest risk. Though she brushed aside this point by saying that in her last cabinet (1996-2001) most people were first-time ministers and, in her view, they did well. So why can't it work again? Rice prices may surge again this year: Experts

Rice prices are likely to rise sharply for the second straight year in 2009 as the global economic slowdown hits farmers and consumers alike, the International Rice Research

The worldwide credit crunch will make it hard for farmers to secure cash to purchase essentials such as seeds and fertiliser, the Philippines-based body said in the latest edition of its quarterly journal "Rice Today".
