Monfils stuns Nadal

Rafael Nadal made a miserable start to the first season he has ever begun as world number one, losing in the Qatar Open quarterfinals to Gael Monfils in less than an hour and a half on Thursday.

But although the Wimbledon, French Open and Olympic champion was not at his best, he certainly did enough to have survived against most other players apart from the superbly inform Monfils.

The 22-year-old Frenchman reminded everyone during his 6-4, 6-4 win that he was tipped as a future world number one himself and that he still has the speed of foot, the weight of shot, the passion, and enough time left to achieve that goal.

It did though raise questions as to whether or not Nadal-who was also beaten by Andy Murray in an exhibition tournament in Abu Dhabi on Sunday - might have had his off-season preparation affected by the troublesome knee injuries which caused him to miss the last two events of 2008.

But he insisted that he had no worries over his form.

"There's no damage to my confidence," said Nadal. "I knew before the match that the beginning of the season was not going to be easy because, although I have had more rest than other players, I have also had more time outside of compe-

tition than others. "So it is a little bit more difficult to come back fast to my rhythm. I have had two matches here and five altogether, so I leave here with positive feelings when I go to Australia.

Nadal began by trying to impose a few more attacking patterns on the rallies than usual, but was soon forced back into defence by Monfils's ability to make counter-attacks, often with sudden strident hits down the lines.

The Spaniard then settled into rhythms more similar to his clay court rallying from behind the baseline, mixed in with a few forays forward, and looked likely to prosper from the cumulative pressure as the scores remained level. But though he started to have some success with this, he was

often discomforted by the unexpectedness of Monfils' attacks, and played two indifferent games at the end of each set which cost him the match.

At the end, the world number 13 leapt with joy back on to the court to take the crowd's enthusiastic applause, while Nadal departed virtually unheralded.

"That feels fantastic," said Monfils, who now has a semifinal with Andy Roddick.

If he wins he will emulate his achievement of three years ago, when he reached the final here, playing a good match against Roger Federer.

Nadal's best moments came after he went a break down at 3-1 - the result of two outrageous down-the-line winners by Monfils - and was able to repair the damage with the help of an erratic game by Monfils.

The top seed then got to love-30 on Monfils service immediately afterwards and had he won either of the next two points might well have broken serve and gone on to win the first set. But Monfils produced good first serve to set up a wining forehand drive approach and then an ace.

He was then full of bounce and zest in the next game, finishing it with a powerful drive straight to Nadal's body as the Spaniard gambled at the net, eliciting a defensive volley into the

The second set saw Nadal played near to his best to avoid going 1-3 down again, but he never made headway against the forceful and well-placed Monfils serves, often choosing to receive the first serve from 12 feet back in order to get safely into the rallies.

A signal of the end came when, serving at 4-5, and with the court mostly open, Nadal put a drop shot into the net on the first point.

He then served a double fault on the second and made two forced errors from forehand topspin drives on the last two points, with Monfils attacking energetically.

Sri Lanka's national cricket team will tour Pakistan in two segments, playing three onedayers from January 18 and then returning in February for a two-Test series, a top official said Thursday.

Sri Lanka agreed to tour Pakistan after India cancelled a much-anticipated January-February series here due to simmering political tensions between the two countries over the Mumbai attacks.

"Sri Lanka Cricket has agreed to split the tour and they will be arriving on January 18 for three one-day internationals," Pakistan Cricket Board chief operating officer Salim Altaftold AFP.

The three one-dayers will be played in Karachi on January 21, in Lahore on January 24 and in Faisalabad on January 27.

Altaf said the Sri Lankan squad would then return to Pakistan in mid-February for two Tests in Karachi and Lahore. "The final dates for the

Tests will be announced later, Altafsaid.

Sri Lanka's tour had come into question after the country's sports minister Gamini Lokuge disbanded the interim national cricket board and sacked its chairman Arjuna Ranatunga.

But Sri Lankan president Mahinda Rajapakse later gave the green light for the tour, making the team the first to play a Test in Pakistan since South Africa played here in October 2007.

Australia postponed a tour of Pakistan in March last year citing security fears due to a wave of suicide attacks across the country.

Lanka to split Pakistan tour Smith puts off elbow surgery

Graeme Smith, the South African captain, has decided to delay surgery for a tennis elbow injury until after the home series against Australia, beginning on February 26.

Smith returned home after the 2-1 Test series win in Australia because the elbow injury ruled him out of the following one-day contest. He will see a surgeon on Saturday to assess the problem and discuss treatment plans.

"I'll wait and see what he says. Actually I know what has to be done. My elbow will require an operation at some stage. The big problem is that the international schedule is very busy," Smith was quoted as saying on news24.co.za. "I will need 8-12 weeks to recover from the surgery and there has never been any time. As a result I'll keep on playing with the injury until it becomes unbearable." Smith said he will try to play a couple of local Twenty20 games to regain match-fitness.

Smith first suffered the injury during the Indian Premier League in April, where he was playing for the Rajasthan Royals, and it also forced him to miss the last three ODIs in England in August.

Smith has been getting his own blood injected into the tear in his elbow in order to ease the injury and will continue treatment in order to play against Australia. He also broke his hand after getting hit by a short ball during the third Test in Sydney. His estimated recovery time for that injury was six weeks.

Despite the broken hand and the tennis elbow, Smith walked out to bat at No. 11 with South Africa needing to negotiate 8.2 overs in order to draw the final Test. He batted through the pain but was the last man out with minutes left in the match.

South Africa's series victory was their first in Australia and Smith expected their opponents to regroup." Australia are hurting, and they are going to come back hard at us," he said. "I imagine Stuart Clark will be back, and they always have a very strong batting line-up.

Surprised Tait now eyes Tests

A surprised Shaun Tait has looked to the future after being picked in Australia's limited-overs squads by saying a return to Test action is "not out of the question". Tait has been hit by hamstring injuries this season, forcing him out of one-day and fourday games, but he said he was in good shape for the Twenty20 matches in Melbourne on Sunday and Brisbane on Tuesday.

"My body's the main factor for me," Tait said in the Australian. "It feels pretty good at the moment. If I can maintain it and bowl well then [Test selection is] not out of the question."

Tait, who was picked in the Twenty20 and one-day squads, had tendonitis and a slight tear in his hamstring in December, but he came back to take three wickets against New South Wales on Tuesday. Andrew Hilditch, the chairman of selectors, said Tait had gained a full medical clearance and felt it was better for him to be travelling with Australia than spending time on the domestic Twenty 20 circuit.

Cameron White is another bowler to return to the national squad following four Tests against India last year, when the team tried to turn him in to a frontline spinner.

'It all started in India'

The signs of a strained relationship between the then captain Kevin Pietersen and sacked coach Peter Moores were evident towards the end of the tour of India, England's new skipper Andrew Strauss revealed here today.

"Towards the back end of the India tour, there were signs that Kevin Pietersen and Peter Moores were not getting on well as they possibly could do," Strauss told newsmen here this evening, in his first interaction after taking over the captaincy reigns.

"When we returned to India to play the two Tests, we were concentrating on the two Test matches in two weeks after the Mumbai terror attacks. There were certain signs that indicated that their relations were strained," he said.

Asked whether he felt that the situation was so bad that both the captain and the coach had to go, Strauss said," I have never been consulted on the issue. You need a captain and a coach in good working relationship and support each other." Describing Pietersen as a world class quality player, Strauss said he has already spoken to him twice and he was quite supportive of him.

Rushed into the hot seat at a tumultuous time, Strauss said the timing was not ideal but he was confident and had full backing of his predecessor.

Strauss waits on dual role

Andrew Strauss could find out Friday whether he has been entrusted with the leadership of England's one-day team, having been unveiled as the new Test captain at a press conference at Lord's on Thursday.

Strauss was the standout choice to succeed Kevin Pietersen in the longer form of the game, but admitted that the situation regarding the one-day job remained "in a state of flux". He has not been a part of England's ODI set-up since being dropped during their ill-fated World Cup campaign in the Caribbean two years ago.

"Strauss hasn't played for a while but that's not to say he's not capable," England's national selector, Geoff Miller, told the BBC. "We've got to have the discussion, it's a difficult decision as there is no obvious case for who should be one-day captain."

In 78 ODIs to date, Strauss averages 31.98 with a strikerate of 75.82 runs per hundred balls, which compares favourably to the record of his former captain, Michael Vaughan, who averaged 27.15 from 86 matches, with a strike-rate of 68.39, as well as the current ODI opener, Ian Bell, whose average (35.47) is higher, but whose strike rate (72.36) is lower. Strauss has two ODI centuries to his name, with a highest score of 152 against Bangladeshin 2005.

The other alternative would be to revert to the split captaincy format, with Paul Collingwood the likeliest choice to resume the role he relinquished in favour of Pietersen back in August.

Matthew Hayden is clinging to his international career after being told he is not in Australia's limited-overs plans. Hayden, who had an awful Test summer of 149 runs at 16.55, was omitted as the selectors looked to players who could be part of the World Twenty20 in England in June and the 2011 World Cup.

Despite his poor returns since overcoming a long-term heel injury, Hayden has won team support to push on to the Ashes. However, Andrew Hilditch, the chairman of selectors, has softened his stance by refusing to say Hayden is a certainty for the series in South Africa starting next month.

"We are moving on," Hilditch said of the decision in Sydney. "There is no doubt our advance plans were for Matthew to go through to the Ashes. That would be our ideal outcome. We've got to sit down as a panel to make a decision whether it's still the way to go."

Hayden said he would take his time while deciding what to do next. "My immediate future is to go back home to my family and the people that love me the most and just enjoy this time, to take guard again," Hayden told the Australian. "It's been a pretty long last four months. I am going to take the time to get my mind around what the future does hold."

However, Hayden said he would play out the summer and would continue with Queensland. "When you are short of runs you have to start asking questions and they [the selectors] do that better than anyone," he said. "For my mind it's as simple as being committed to playing out the summer and then taking the time to either get back on the horse or make a decision not to. It's as clear cut as that."

Hilditch said Hayden was "not particularly happy" when told of his sacking. "I have no idea what he's going to do," Hilditch said. "My feeling is he will go and play for Queensland and make sure he gets on the South African tour."

Hayden scored 31 and 39 in the third Test victory and will have to wait until early February to learn whether he remains part of the five-day squad. Twenty20 engagements fil
