US moves to confiscate Koko's stashed money

Forfeiture action sought against Koko's accounts in Singapore

The US Department of Justice has moved to confiscate nearly \$3 million from bank accounts in Singapore, which are allegedly linked to a bribery scandal in Bangladesh, involving Arafat Rahman Koko, younger son of former prime minister Khaleda Zia.

The justice department is seeking a forfeiture action against the accounts that are alleged to be the proceeds of a wide-ranging conspiracy to bribe public officials in Bangladesh and their family members, in connection with various public works projects, said Acting Assistant Attorney General

Washington DC.

The forfeiture action against the funds, held by multiple account holders, was filed on Thursday in a US district court in the District of Columbia.

The complaint relates primarily to alleged bribes paid to Koko, in connection with public works projects awarded by the

government of Bangladesh to Siemens AG, a German industrial conglomerate, and China Harbour Engineering Company.

The complaint said at least one payment to each of the purported consultants was paid from a US bank account.

Koko was arrested in Bangladesh along with his mother Khaleda Zia on Sept 3, 2007 after a bribery case had been filed by the country's Anti-corruption Commission (ACC). He was however later released on parole on grounds of ill health, and is now reportedly undergoing treatment in Bangkok. The ACC on December 18 of last year dis-

closed that Koko has foreign currencies worth

Matthew Friedrich of the Criminal Division on Friday in around Tk 11.43 crore deposited in a Singapore bank. With help from the Singapore government, the ACC of Bangladesh unearthed information that Koko has 20.61 lakh Singaporean dollars and 2.61 lakh US dollars.

The Singapore government also froze the account and sent necessary documents to the ACC.

EC sits on election of 45 women MPs

JS may go into session without lawmakers elected to reserved seats

The ninth parliament may convene without the 45 women lawmakers in reserved seats as the Election Commission (EC) does not seem to have any plans to hold election to the seats before the inaugural session on January 25.

It means the new legislature might have to go into session before its full formation.

According to the constitution, parliament shall consist of lawmakers elected both directly and indirectly.

Citing a High Court (HC) ruling and constitutional provisions, legal experts said the establishment of parliament is never complete without members in the seats earmarked for women. They argue that sittings of the assembly should not commence before the election to reserved seats.

Speaking in return for anonymity, a noted jurist yesterday told The Daily Star that the EC

should immediately hold election to the seats to avoid legal crisis in future.

Since restoration of parliamentary democracy in 1991, all parliaments excepting the eighth opened with the women lawmakers in reserved seats.

The eighth parliament had to begin without women lawmakers as operation of the constitutional provision for reserved seats had expired with dissolution of the seventh.

However, a constitutional amendment in 2004 set aside 45 seats for women for the next 10 years and soon as many lawmakers joined the national assembly.

As per the constitution, parliament shall consist of 300 members to be elected in direct vote from single territorial constituencies and 45 reserved seats to be allotted to the political parties on the basis of their proportional representation in parliament.

EC sits today to finalise upazila polls security

The Election Commission (EC) will hold a high-level meeting today to finalise steps to ensure law and order during the January 22 upazila parishad election.

Chiefs of police, Bangladesh Rifles (BDR), Rapid Action Battalion (Rab), Ansar and representatives of the Armed Forces Division will attend the meeting to be chaired by Chief Election Commissioner ATM Shamsul Huda.

The meeting to be held at 11 am at the National Economic Council Auditorium at Sher-e-Bangla Nagar in the city will also finalise other essential prerequisites to successfully hold the election to 481 upazila parishads in a free, fair and credible manner.

The meeting will review the law and order situation in the a run up to the election and take necessary steps to maintain it during the post-election period by cracking down on criminals, musclemen and extortionists.

Gaza-blitz on

UN chief disappointed at Israel offensives; 15 militants, 22 civilians killed in fighting, airstrikes

Israeli forces pounded rocket-launching sites and smuggling tunnels in Gaza yesterday and planes dropped leaflets warning of an escalation in attacks, as Palestinian militants fired at least 10 more rockets at Israel.

Egypt hosted talks aimed at ending the violence.

Flames and smoke rose over Gaza City amid the heavy fighting. The Israeli threat to launch a "new phase" in its two-weekold offensive that has already killed more than 800 Palestinians came in defiance of international calls for a ceasefire.

Israeli planes sent a cloud of white leaflets fluttering across the Gaza City skyline warning residents it would soon step up its war on Hamas and other militant groups.

The airforce also carried out more than 40 air strikes overnight and into Saturday, targeting arms manufacturing sites, weapons depots and smuggling tunnels, the army said.

And ground troops, who entered Gaza a week ago, continued

to clash with Palestinian fighters across the territory. In the day's bloodiest incident, an Israeli tank shell killed nine people in a garden outside a home in the northern Gaza town of Jebaliya. Separately, a woman was killed by tank fire in the nearby town of Beit Lahiya.

Sultana was rushed to the control. Metropolitan Hospital and released after receiving first aid.


When the rumour of death of a college student spread on Titumir College campus, angry students took to the street and Police said Shamima Sultana, a first went on a rampage at Chairmanbari,
