



Rice Tk 10 a kg never pledged

Matia responds to BNP campaign

46 killed as militants clash with Pak troops

Hundreds of foreign militants attacked Pakistani forces near the border with Afghanistan, sparking clashes that left six soldiers and 40 militants dead, the military said vesterday.

The fierce fighting began late Saturday and continued early Sunday in the lawless Mohmand tribal area in northwest Pakistan, a known Taliban and al-Qaeda stronghold, the military said in a statement.

The cross-border attack was the biggest in recent months against

Pakistan's security forces, who are battling to flush out militants in several areas of the country's restive northwest.

The rugged border area is a key battleground in the US-led "war on terror", with extremists operating on both sides and using "safe havens" in Pakistan from which they are said to launch attacks on foreign forces in Afghanistan.

Most of the insurgents came from the Afghan side of the border and were joined by local Taliban fighters. The combined force of about 600 militants then attacked a Pakistani paramilitary Frontier Corps base near the border.

The militants, armed with mortars, rocket launchers and grenades, attacked the fort at Mamad Gate -- where members of Pakistan's elite Quick Reaction Force were stationed -from several directions, officials and witnesses told AFP.

2 murdered, 2 shot in city

Two youths were hacked to death by unknown criminals in the city's Kotwali and Demra areas early yesterday amid growing incidence of crime in the last few days.

Besides, armed muggers shot two persons, including a sales representative of a cellphone company, and snatched around Tk 1 lakh from the salesman in Badda area.

One of the slain youths was identified as Wahiduzzaman alias Intu, 27, of Aga Sadeque Lane under Kotwali police station.

Family sources said criminals killed Intu at his own residence and his sister Shimu found the body in a storeroom at the top of the five-storey building at about 9:30am.

Abdur Rahman Mahbub, maternal uncle of Intu, said his nephew went out of the house around 12:30am and his body was found in the morning.

A murder pushed into oblivion

Back at home, several yards off from the spot, lives his 80year-old helpless mother Kushum. She has been living in fear for her three other sons for the last three decades and didn't comment on the matter.

"I have lifted all charges against Sarwar. If he does any harm to any of my sons again, I have none but Allah to seek justice," said widowed Kushum.

Locals say Kushum, intimidated by Sarwar, was forced to make a court statement for withdrawing the murder case

EC to seek expert opinion on polls

The Election Commission (EC) yesterday decided to seek constitution experts' opinion on whether the EC is legally bound to hold election to 45 reserved parliamentary seats for women before the inaugural session of this parliament on January 25.

The EC, claiming that it is on the right track, remains firm on its stance to hold the polls after the new parliament goes into session.

"I will consult former attorney general Mahmudul Islam and seek his opinion on the matter," Election Commissioner Muhammed Sohul Hussain told The Daily Star yesterday after a meeting at the EC which discussed the election to the reserved seats. US rejects Israel's plea for strike against Iran AFP, Washington

in Ctg; 25 hurt in Natore

A pro-BNP labourer was killed in Chittagong city Saturday night while at least 25 people were injured in a clash between the supporters of Awami League (AL) and BNP in Lalpur upazila of Natore yesterday. Our correspondent in Chittagong reports: Labourer Khokan

Majhi, 37, a Jatiyatabadi Sramik Dal activist and joint convenor of the election committee of BNP candidate Abdullah Al Noman, was beaten to death at Chhotopul of Halishahar in the port city. Local BNP leaders blamed AL cadres for the killing but police

did not find any political link with the murder. Sub-inspector Humayun Kabir, also the investigation officer, suspected that the killing might be a result of dispute between
