PM forms special cell at ministry to implement projects

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday formed a special cell for the power, energy and mineral resources ministry aiming to scale up country's power and gas production.

The cell headed by the premier's adviser HT Imam will monitor the works in the sector and implement the development projects under the minis-

try in light of the new policy guidelines of the ous AL government left the power sector in a present government.

"We need more energy for development works. You must work fast and sincerely as we do not have much time in our hands to do so,' Hasina, also in-charge of the energy ministry, told a meeting at the ministry.

The meeting decided to withdraw all taxes



Israel shells UN office in Gaza

UN operations suspended; terrified residents flee as toll nears 1,100

Israeli strikes set media and UN buildings and a hospital ablaze vesterday as tanks rolled deep into Gaza cities even amid hope that the war on Hamas that has killed nearly 1,100 people may soon end.

Hundreds of terrified civilians, many gripping wailing children, fled the advancing Israeli troops inside Gaza City as warplanes pummelled the battered Palestinian enclave where half the population is under the age of 18. While battles raged on the ground, Egypt kept up Western-

backed efforts to end the 20-day-old war that was launched on the Islamist Hamas in response to rocket fire and that has killed an estimated 600 civilians. Shortly after UN chief Ban Ki-moon arrived in Israel, a raid hit

the main UN compound in Gaza, wounding three employees, setting fire to a warehouse filled with tonnes of aid, and leading the UNRWA agency to partly suspend operations.

"I have conveyed my strong protest and outrage and demanded a full explanation," Ban told reporters after holding talks with Israeli officials as part of a regional truce tour.

The UN chief, who has for weeks called for a ceasefire in Israel's deadliest offensive ever on

Govt lifts duty on solar energy tools

10pc of total power from renewables by 2020

The government has decided to withdraw all duties from solar energy equipment to encourage use of solar energy, especially in the remote and economically backward locations.

With over three lakh households already using solar energy equivalent to 15 megawatt, gazette notification. mainly in the coastal southwestern region, this withdrawal would reduce around Tk 1,500 per solar panel worth Tk 10,000. People usually go for a two-panel system that costs them Tk 20,000.

Currently, there is 15 percent VAT on renewable energy equipment.

This decision came at a meeting of Prime

Minister Sheikh Hasina, who also holds the energy portfolio, with the energy ministry officials yesterday.

This decision was made in line with the Renewable Energy Policy of Bangladesh, approved by the caretaker government on December 18 and made effective through a

The policy follows the Vision and Policy Statement, 2000 that aims at providing power to all by 2020 in phases.

The policy targets developing renewable energy resources to meet five percent of the total power demand by 2015 and 10 percent by

Sircar changes mind, won't quit politics

Fertiliser subsidy: Winding way to wealth creation

The price reduction of fertiliser has given rise to new thoughts on how the rice -- a commodity with less price elasticity -- will behave on the market, and how and whether the Tk 2,700 crore subsidy will translate into wealth cre-

On both counts, it is difficult to come to a conclusive answer, but generally any high hope of subsidy equivalent impact on rice price can

be ruled out. On the other hand, price is not a factor in wealth creation and transfer of the farmers' savings into productivity, which actually creates wealth, will depend on many other policy decisions and actions.

"If the price of rice remains constant, the reduction of fertiliser price would lead to higher savings for farmers," says Dr Sajjad Zohir of Economic Research Group. "Unfortunately, as it is a harvest time the benchmark rice
