45 ordinances may be made law

Says law minister following review by expert panel

Law Minister Shafique Ahmed yesterday said about 45 out of the 117 ordinances promulgated by the immediate-past caretaker government would be tabled as bills in parliament to make them laws. .

A panel of experts formed by the government to review the ordinances has recommended initially ratifying 45 ordinances as laws, the minister told reporters at his office.

"All the ordinances will be tabled in the first session of the ninth parliament scheduled for January 25. Of which, about 45 ordinances will be placed as bills for ratification," he added.

He said most of the 45 ordinances are related to elections and finance. "The ordinances related to election and finance must be made laws, otherwise those will create a serious problem," he

Law enforcement agencies yesterday arrested eight people in connection with the sensational break-in at Bangladesh Railway (BR) headquarters in the capital on Saturday night.


Of them, seven are railway security guards who were suspended following the break-in.

57 survivors identified as Bangladeshis

Bangladesh government has identified at least 57 survivors rescued from Andaman coast, India, as its citizens -according to a BBC Bangla Service report.

They were abandoned on a boat in the sea with little food and water two months ago. Thai troops had seized their boat engines while cruising 'illegally' through Thailand territory.

India has started revealing the list of people headed towards Malaysia from Myanmar and Bangladesh for employment.

The Indian and Indonesian coast guards have rescued around 300 persons from the coast in the last two months.

When a polling agent was asked why he was strolling outside the polling booth at the Phulbaria Govt Primary School centre, he said, "No voter came to the booth since the voting started at 8:00am. That's why I came out of the booth."

After making the remark, he immediately returned to the booth at about 10:00am.

"It is very surprising that only 150 votes were cast in one and a half hours since voting began at this centre. Around 800 votes were cast within the same time at the polling centre in the ninth

China milk scam duo given death

A Chinese court condemned two men to death and handed a life term to a former dairy boss yesterday for their roles in the country's contaminated milk scandal, which ignited public anger and accusations of cover-ups.

The Intermediate People's Court in Shijiazhuang gave the life sentence to Tian Wenhua, 66, the former general manager and chairwoman of Sanlu Group Co., the dairy at the center of the crisis. She was the highest-ranking official charged in the food safety scandal.

At her trial in December, Tian pleaded guilty to charges of producing and selling fake or substandard products after infant formula tainted with the chemical melamine was blamed in the deaths of at least six babies and the illnesses of nearly 300,000 others.

The court sentenced Zhang Yujun, 40, to death for running a workshop that was allegedly China's largest source of melamine, said spokesman Wang Wei. Geng Jinping was also given the death penalty for producing and selling toxic food. A third man, Gao Junjie, was given a suspended death sentence, which is usually commuted to a life sentence.

Some of the relatives of the victims, who gathered outside the court in cold weather in northern China, said Tian got offlightly. SEE PAGE 2 COL 5

"Bangladesh will achieve quick improvement in the fields of curbing corruption, good governance and democracy and we will get the [MCA] fund," Finance Minister AMA Muhith told reporters at his office after a meeting with US Ambassador to Bangladesh James F Moriarty.

In reply to a question, he said Bangladesh may qualify for the fund this year.

Talking to reporters, Moriarty also said, "The minister's hope and my hope is that Bangladesh will qualify for the fund." Moriarty met the finance minister yesterday
