Tricksters thrive on textbook crisis

Low quality books being printed, marketed outside Dhaka

Many unscrupulous traders capitalising on the current crisis of textbooks for secondary school students are marketing pirated books in substandard newsprints in a bid to make brisk business much to the chagrin of students and

These dishonest and unauthorised dealers are not only making a dent in the pockets of parents of students of classes VI to IX, they are also depriving the National Curriculum & Textbook Board (NCTB) of its royalty.

Station and Babu Bazar under Kotwali Police Station are involved in bringing out such textbooks in low-graded papers.

Dhaka; rather they sell them in district towns, especially remote areas, to avert being caught as people in those areas are gullible and can easily be trapped.

Printing cost of Bangla textbook for class VIII

authorised by NCTB is Tk 39 while a pirated book costs only Tk 17.

The government has set a subsidised price of TK 35.20 for this book but students have to spend as much as Tk 10 to Tk 15 more to buy both pirated and NCTB authorised books.


As the problem persists with the supply of inadequate number of textbooks in the market printed by authorised publishers, dishonest traders are taking the advantage of the crisis, sources said.

Our Chittagong correspondent confirmed that students are buying pirated books, taking Printers at Loharpool under Sutrapur Police them for original ones, for extra Tk 10 to 15.

"Many wholesalers are marketing pirated books with the help of the latest computer technology in substandard paper and making The wholesalers do not sell these books in lucrative business," an authorised printer told The Daily Star, adding that they cannot compete with such cheap products.

"These unscrupulous traders are so powerful that we cannot do anything about them," he



Says Sri Lankan army chief

Sri Lankan troops yesterday overran the last town controlled by Tamil rebels, army chief Lieutenant General Sarath Fonseka said, striking a major blow in Asia's longest-running ethnic conflict. "We have completely captured Mullaittivu," the army chief

said in a televised address to the nation. The fall of Mullaittivu is a huge loss to the Tiger rebels, who were dislodged three weeks ago from their political capital of

Kilinochchi, where they had the trappings of a separate state. Since July 2007, the Tigers have been steadily losing territory and are now confined to a 300-square-kilometre (115-squaremile) area of jungle along the northeastern coast, Fonseka said.

"We have cleared 95 percent of the work (to defeat the Tigers)," Fonseka said. "The end of terrorism is near and we will definitely win. The Tiger garrison of Mullaittivu was destroyed today."

He said troops fought their way through 40 kilometres

Pakistan urges Obama to halt missile attacks

Troops kill 8 militants in Swat valley

Pakistan urged President Barack Obama to halt US missile strikes on al-Qaeda strongholds near the Afghan border, saying Saturday that civilians were killed the previous day in the first attacks since Obama's inauguration.

Earlier Pakistani security forces on Sunday killed eight militants in the northwest Swat valley, where the army is battling extremists waging a violent campaign for Islamic law, officials

Troops launched a pre-dawn operation against a militant hideout in the town of Ningolai, a military spokesman said.

"The clash left eight militants dead including their commander Nur Bakhtiar," said the spokesman, who requested

Heavy arms and ammunition were recovered from the hide-

out, he added. Pakistan's military is battling extremists loyal to radical cleric Maulana Fazlullah who have launched a violent campaign to introduce Islamic Sharia law.

Pakistani security officials said eight suspected foreign militants, including an Egyptian al-Qaeda operative, were among 22 people killed in Friday's twin strikes in the Waziristan region.

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
