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Govt to implement CHT accord fully Land commission to be recast

The government is going to fully implement the Chittagong Hill Tracts (CHT) Peace Accord which remains shelved for the last seven years during the BNP-Jamaat and caretaker rule.

The accord was signed between Parbatya Chattagram Jana Sanghati Samity (PCJSS) and the government on December 2 1997 ending two decades of bush war in the region.

The government's one of the first steps in this regard would be reforming the CHT Land Commission, said sources in the CHT affairs ministry.

State Minister for CHT affairs Dipangkar Talukder after a meeting at the ministry told newspersons: "The government is going to implement the peace accord soon." He however did not mention any specific date.

The CHT Regional Council was formed in 1999 following the peace accord but no other major initiatives came in accordance with the agreement.

Jyotirindra Bodhipriya Larma, popularly known as Santu Larma, chairman of the Council and also chief of PCJSS, was present at the meeting.

The Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) has recommended that the government amend the ACC Act 2004 to make the commission a party in petitions filed by graft accused with the High Court (HC) seeking bail or order for staying case proceedings. ACC officials said the commission's bitter experience last

year about the graft accused obtaining bail en masse without allowing the ACC to be a party in their appeals prompted it to make the recommendation. The government, which was made a party in those appeals,

took a while to collect necessary papers from the commission to move against the petition. By then many graft accused had already got released obtaining bail from the court. In another recommendation, the ACC sought the authority to

GLOBAL RECESSION

200m workers may become extreme poor, fears ILO

Some 200 million workers, mostly in developing economies, could be pushed into extreme poverty because of increased unemployment as fallout of global economic recession, said International Labour Organisation (ILO).

The annual ILO report titled Global Employment Trends released from Geneva on Wednesday said global economic crisis is expected to lead to a dramatic increase in the number of people joining the ranks of the unemployed, working poor and those in vulnerable employment.

Based on new developments in the labour market and depending on the timeliness and effectiveness of recovery efforts, the report says global unemployment in 2009 could increase over that in 2007 by a range of 18 million to 30 million workers, and more than 50 million if the situation continues to deteriorate.

"The ILO message is realistic, not alarmist. We are now facing a global jobs crisis. Many governments are aware and acting, but

Design deal signed for Padma Bridge

The government yesterday signed an agreement with the New Zealand-based consultant firm Maunsell AECOM Ltd for preparing the design of the Padma Bridge.

The first major contract signed by the Awami League-led government after three weeks of taking office is also a significant step towards fulfilling the long-awaited desire of the people of 19 southwestern districts to get connected with the capital.

The 5.58km long and 25m wide bridge on the Padma will connect the country's southwest with Dhaka at Mawa in Munshiganj and Janjira in Madaripur. The construction of the , bridge with four lanes and a railroad in the middle is expected to start in 2011 and complete within 2014.

According to the agreement, Maunsell will start working on the design in 28 days and finish within the next 22 months.

As per experts' estimate Tk 10,161 crore will be spent to build the bridge, of which around Tk 131 core just to complete the design. Environmental impact of the bridge will be assessed during preparation of the design.

Greg Klamus, director (infrastructure) of Maunsell AECOM, and Md Rafiqul Islam, director of Padma Multipurpose Bridge Project, signed the agreement at the office of the Bridge Division. Communications Minister Syed Abul Hossain and representatives from World Bank, Asian Development Bank (ADB) and Japan Bank for International Cooperation were pres-

After the signing ceremony, Communications Minister Syed Abul Hossain told reporters that the gross domestic product (GDP) of the southwest region will increase by 2 percent once the bridge is constructed and it will add 1.2 percent to the national GDP.
