

Two Ctg fertiliser units Khatib leads prayers amid limp for faulty design

Produce only one-third their capacity

Diammonium Phosphate Fertiliser falling short by almost two-thirds their capacity due to faulty factory design and not having their own power plant opera-

tional. The Dap-1 and Dap-2 factories were launched on September 12, 2006 to produce the composite fertiliser for the first

time in Bangladesh.

Located near Chittagong Urea At a time when the government halved Fertiliser Ltd (CUFL) complex at fertiliser prices to boost agricultural Laldiarchar of Anwara on the Karnaphuli, production, the two factories of each of the two factories were built to have a daily production capacity of 800 Company Ltd (Dap) in Chittagong are tonnes. Together they are supposed to produce around 5.28 lakh tonnes of the fertiliser annually.

The use of diammonium phosphate, which meets requirements of triple superphosphate (TSP) and urea in soil--is supposed to ensure a balanced use of chemical fertiliser as farmers tend to use

urea excessively. The two factories were expected to reduce the import of TSP and urea by five lakh tonnes and two lakh tonnes and save a huge amount of foreign currencies of the government, sources in the factories and Bangladesh Chemical Industries Corporation (BCIC) said.

None of the factories ever reached full production capacity due to technical problems and the factories not having their own power generation source.

According to sources, Dap-1 and Dap-2 require 5 megawatt (MW) of power a day

Devotees yesterday were barred from entering the mosque with shoes for the first time as authorities imposed ban on entry along with shoes to avert recurrence of hurling shoes that had vitiated the sanctity of the holy mosque.

Witnesses said most of the devotees entered the mosque keeping their shoes in shoeboxes outside the mosque.

3 illegal arms CCC plans to house 2 girls' schools in commercial complex

Move sparks protests

Students and guardians of city's two reputed girls schools and civil society members expressed resentment at Chittagong City Corporation's (CCC) plan to demolish the schools and construct a 16-storey multipurpose building to house the schools along with other commercial establishments.

The schools -- Aparna Charan City Corporation Girls' High School and Krishna Kumari City Corporation Girls' High School -are over 80 years old and have over 2,000 students at present.

They say that the proposed construction of the building would destroy the academic environment of the schools that produced person-

alities like anti-British revolutionary Pritilata Waddedar (first headmistress of Aparna Charan School) and former Indian Congress president Neli Sen Gupta.

The buildings of the aging schools are in poor condition and they lack proper ventilation systems, which caused many students to faint inside classrooms in recent years.

Responding to an appeal of the school authorities, the caretaker government last year took the initiative to construct two six-storey buildings for the schools. Chittagong Development Authority (CDA) also prepared a project outline for this. The Education Engineering Department (EED) was supposed to implement the project.

India to allow more items from Bangladesh

India is ready to cut down more items from its negative list with regard to Bangladesh to expand trade with the neighbouring country, said a senior commerce ministry official yesterday.

Last year, India shortened its sensitive list from 744 to 480.

"We are open, we are prepared to review our negative list and take it further down,' Joint Secretary in the Ministry of Commerce Rajeev Kher said at a CII function.

Rohingya not recognised as ethnic group

Says Myanmar on boat people

Myanmar said the Rohingya boat people found adrift in the Andaman Sea last week could not have come from its shores because they are not among its recognised ethnic groups, state media reported yesterday.

Myanmar's response could complicate efforts to repatriate the Rohingyas, 66 of whom were convicted this week by a court in Thailand of illegally entering the country.

The Myanmar Ahlin, a state-controlled newspaper in Myanmar, said that foreign media had suggested that the hundreds of Rohingya found off Thailand's coast came from Myanmar. That was not


