

PM's public programmes curtailed on security alert

Two ministers, intelligence sources say

The government a couple of days ago received information from different international intelligence agencies that Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's life is under threat from international terrorist organisations who are in league with local extremist groups.

Two ministers and intelligence sources told The Daily Star yesterday that they received information that the month of February is espe-

cially crucial. Following the threat alert, all scheduled outdoor programmes of the prime minister were immediately curtailed.

The international intelligence sources informed Commerce Minister Faruk Khan and Foreign Minister Dipu Moni about the threat. Upon receiving the information from the US, United Arab Emirates, and Pakistan, security of the prime minister were immediately strengthened, sources close to Hasina said.

"She is a target, and there is



no doubt about it," a senior official of a domestic intelligence agency said.

The official, who is involved in anti-terrorism work, said security of the prime minister will be rearranged soon, and some sophisticated security apparatus will be incorporated, especially for occasions when she will be attending outdoor events.

State Minister for Home Affairs Tanjim Ahmed Sohel Taj said they are assessing the intelligence about the threat,

Hasina likely to visit KSA this month

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina is likely to visit Saudi Arabia in the third week of this month to perform Umrah.

During her visit, she will discuss with the Saudi government on different bilateral issues and may sign an agreement aiming to enhance trade and investment between the two countries.

The prime minister may mention Awami League's main electoral pledges during her meetings with Saudi leaders and seek their support to implement those pledges, including recruitment of more manpower from Bangladesh and greater economic assistance for

PROBE REPORT ON DIPJOL ISSUE REVEALS DIG-Prisons violated code, abused power

Deputy Inspector General of Prisons (DIG-Prisons) Maj Shamsul Haider Siddique violated at least 15 clauses of the jail code and abused his power in various ways to allow special privileges for a dreaded convict, Monowar Hossain Dipjol, according to an investigation by the jail authorities.

A two-member investigating committee of the Jail Directorate submitted a 72-page report on Thursday to the acting inspector general of

prisons (IG-Prisons), finding Haider guilty on the charges, and also mentioning that the present jail superintendent of Dhaka Central Jail had no control over the prison under

Haider's supervision.

The probe committee is comprised of DIG-Headquarters Commander M Zakaria Khan, and Deputy Jailer of Dhaka Central Jail AG Mahmud.

They prepared the report by talking to 32 persons, who are DIG-Prisons Maj Haider, Dhaka Central Jail Superintendent Towhidul Islam, Jailer Mohammad Faruq, some deputy jailers, and some jailguards.

The investigation was launched after a vernacular

'72 trade accord was only renewed during Zia's rule

Says BNP refuting minister's claim

The BNP has said the bilateral trade deal with India during the rule of late president Ziaur Rahman was not a new treaty but renewal of the 1972 agreement.

The main opposition in parliament has also expressed its support for multilateral regional transit facilities under the Saarc rather than a bilateral transit treaty with India.

Dismissing the commerce minister's claim that the bilateral trade agreement was executed during Zia's rule, BNP Secretary General Khandaker Delwar Hossain yesterday said, "No new trade deal was executed during Zia's rule. It was only renewal of the 1972 agreement, article 5 of which was never implemented as it concerned the much-debated transit issue."

The trade agreement was first signed during the post-independence government of Prime Minister Sheikh Mujibur Rahman on March 28, 1972, he said.

Addressing a press conference at the party's Gulshan office, he said, "All countries of South and Central Asia, China, Myanmar and Iran will be benefited economically if multilateral regional transit facilities are expanded under the Saarc instead of a bilateral transit treaty with India."

Delwar said the BNP is in favour of extending all kinds of multilateral agreements to increase trade and investment facilities and

Boucher due today

US Assistant Secretary of State for South and Central Asian Affairs Richard A Boucher arrives today on a two-day visit to Bangladesh to hold talks with both the government and opposition leaders on trade and terrorism issues.

He is expected to arrive at the Zia International Airport in the early hours today and likely to meet opposition leader Khaleda Zia and Home Minister Sahara Khatun in the afternoon. He may hold meetings with the members of civil society on the night.

Boucher will have a hectic day tomorrow as he is scheduled to hold important talks with Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina and some other influential ministers, including Finance Minister AMA Muhith and Foreign Minister Dipu Moni.

This will be the first high-level visit by an American dignitary since the installation

Trans-Asian Railway project finally set to take off

The government is going to start work on Trans-Asian Railway (TAR) that would connect the country's railway system to a 81,000-km network stretching from Europe to East and South-East Asia.

"The prime minister has already directed me to take initiative in this regard," Communications Minister Syed Abul Hossain told The Daily Star.

The minister along with high officials of Bangladesh Railway (BR) is now visiting

Chittagong and Cox's Bazar to see the possible route of the TAR to connect Chittagong and Cox's Bazar with Myanmer.

Starting from Turkey, the TAR would link Bangladesh with six countries of East Asia including Myanmar, Thailand, Laos, Cambodia, Malaysia and Singapore, and also with Europe through Turkey.

Bangladesh signed the Inter-governmental Agreement on the TAR Network on November 9, 2007.

But Dhaka still needs to sign bilateral

agreements to make the network operable, officials said.

BR sources said the country now needs to build 128 km rail track from Dohazari in Chittagong to Teknaf in Cox's Bazar. The railway has to acquire 1,200 acres of land to build the track.

At present, there is railway link up to Dohazari.




PRIMARY EDUCATION IN A SHAMBLES-1 70pc can't read, write even after 5-yr study

The quality of the country's primary education is so substandard that around 70 percent of students who complete the five-year primary level education are unable to read, write or calculate properly.

According to a new government study, 69 percent of students who have completed primary school are not able to read news headlines in Bangla newspapers properly.

Also, 87 percent of these pupils failed to do simple mathematical calculations like addition, subtraction, multiplication and division.

The survey has also found students tremendously weak in English language.

The recently published study on 'National Assessment of Pupils of Grades three and five-2006' under the Second Primary Education Development Programme (PEDP-II) has also revealed that 72 percent of them are not able to write a short composition.

Badrul Alam Tarafdar, secretary in charge of Primary and Mass Education, admits that there

is an issue of low quality of education at primary level. He said that in order to encourage parents to send their children to schools, expanding primary education used to be the main target of the education ministry, not quality education.

"But, the time has come to focus on quality education now. At present, ensuring quality education is the main goal of the ministry because most parents are now willing, even eager, to send their children to schools," Tarafdar told The Daily Star.

Researchers and academicians have identified several causes behind the students' poor performance. The main reason they point out is that most of the primary students -- both in urban and rural areas -- pass their exams without learning 50 percent of the curriculum.

Renowned academician Prof Serajul Islam Choudhury said the scenario of low quality education in primary schools is mainly due to lack of attention by teachers, students and also parents.

"Primary education should be extended up to
