When the news first broke, Mashrafe bin Mortaza's first reaction was astonishment, which goes to explain his first words. "This is totally unexpected," said the man who has been dubbed the Narail Express by adulating fans.

"The most I thought it (the bidding price) would go is 70,000 dollars. But never in my dreams did I think I would fetch 600,000 dollars! It's unbelievable," said the excited Bangladesh fast bowler expressing his delight after a sensational bidding war in the Indian Premier League (IPL) auction in Goa saw him snapped up by Bollywood superstar Shahrukh Khan's Kolkata Knight Riders yesterday.

The man was over the moon and why not? The Bangladesh vice-captain has just landed the biggest deal in the country's sports history. And if anyone deserves it, the man known for his brave-heart attitude definitely does.

"The amount is no joke. I never thought I could earn such a big amount of money by playing cricket. But it's also a great honour. Aside from the money, just think, I will be playing under a great captain (Sourav Ganguly) and be surrounded by my favourite players like Ricky Ponting, Chris Gayle and Brendon McCullum," said Mashrafe adding with a smile: "And there is

also my favourite actor (Shahrukh Khan)."

The paceman was showered with greetings once the news broke and his parents even broke into tears of joy at their beloved son's amazing success: "My father was just crying while talking over phone from my home district (Narail)," said Mashrafe, who had showed the courage to refuse the Narail Express by adulating fans.

It was a busy day at Mashrafe's simple Mirpur apartment, which he shares with his wife. And the one question that was on everyone's lips was: is there any special plan with the huge money?

"It still feels surreal to me," the smiling Mashrafe responded.

"I want to thank my family, friends and the board because of their support throughout my injury-hit career but I must also thank Yuvraj Singh who, I think, made it possible. Nothing would have been better than if I could play in his side. However, Kolkata Knight Riders is my favourite team," he said.

"I have lots of friends and fans in India and that's why I am excited. I love being there and it is a pleasure to play in India. Kolkata is just next-door and I know how much people there admire Bangladeshi cricketers. Everything is perfect for me. And the auction is over now and my challenge is to go over there and prove my worth," he added.

England's Kevin Pietersen and Andrew Flintoff joined the Indian Premier League on Friday as its most expensive players after being auctioned for 1.55 million dollars each.

Pietersen was bought by liquor baron Vijay Mallya's Bangalore Royal Challengers at a televised auction in his popular holiday resort at Goa, while Flintoff went for the same price to Chennai Super Kings.

Both players broke the existing record of Indian captain Mahendra Singh Dhoni, who was purchased by the Chennai franchise for 1.50 million dollars last year.

Pietersen and Flintoff will however receive only half their money, as England players are available for just the first three weeks of the lucrative six-week Twenty20 tournament.

Tournament rules stipulate that payments are made on a pro-rata basis for matches played. This year's contracts are for a two-year period.

"A player like Kevin is a great buy for us," said a beaming Mallya, whose team finished

seventh out of eight teams in the inaugural edition of the tournament last year.

"He is one of the most explosive batsmen in the world and will bring a lot of class to our team."

Indian cricket board secretary N. Srinivasan, who owns the Chennai Super Kings, said he was delighted to have all-rounder Flintoff on board.

"Twenty20 cricket is a game for all-rounders and Flintoff is one of the best in the business," said Srinivasan, whose team entered last year's final where they lost to the Shane Warne-led Rajasthan Royals.

But the most dramatic sale at the auction was that of Tiger's speedster Mashrafe Bin Mortaza's. Mashrafe who was the first player up for sale from Pool F was not bid for initially but just before the hammer went down, Kolkata made an offer at his base price of \$50,000.

Kings XI Punjab entered the race, competing against Kolkata for Mashrafe. The bids spiralled slowly towards \$400,000 and when the auctioneer asked Punjab if they want to bid \$410,000, Priyanka Zinta nodded. With teams largely sticking to raises of \$10,000, the bidding went on and on and on. Kolkata finally touched the \$500,000 mark, which enticed Punjab to go

Bangladesh lose opener

Pakistan made a flying start in the Grameen Phone tri-nation women's cricket tournament beating Bangladesh by seven wickets at the Shaheed Chandu Stadium (SCS) in Bogra yesterday.

Winning the toss and electing to bowl first, the Pakistani bowlers dominated throughout the Bangladesh's innings and bowled the hosts out for a small total of 109 in 46.1 overs.

Only four Bangladeshi batters -- opener Shathira Zakir (16), skipper Salma Khatun (16), Lata Mandal (26) and Shoheli Akter (22) -- reached double digits in the face of some strict bowling by the Pakistan bowlers.

Javeria Khan claimed three wickets for 20 runs and Qanita Jalil captured two wickets for 17 runs while Almas Akram, Sana Mir, Sajida Shah and skipper Urooj Mumtaz took one apiece.

In reply, Pakistan easily reached the target in 34.4 overs for the loss of just three wickets.

Opener Nain Abidi, who was later adjudged woman of the match, top scored with 65 runs of 66 balls with 11 fours while Bismah Mahroof and Sajida Shah added 12 and 17 runs respectively.

Shuktara Rahman and Champa Chakma grabbed one wicket each for 6 and 12 runs respectively.

Bangladesh captain Salma Khatun said that her team fell in a crisis from the beginning.

"Basically our promising batters couldn't play well, which is the reason why we collapsed to such a small total," said Salma.

When asked about the gains from the match, Salma added, "We don't say that we are satisfied since we lost the match but we will have to wait for the upcoming matches and I hope our girls will do better in the next matches".

Pakistan team captain Urooj Mumtaz Khan was satisfied with her team's performance and admitted that her team worked very hard to bowl the hosts out for 109, despite dropping two catches but believed Pakistan could have won the match by a larger margin.

"Yes, it is a great rehearsal for us before the World Cup where Sri Lanka is also in the pool. Bangladesh is also a very good side and they played very well in the last Asia Cup. This is the first victory of the tournament and we will get another warm up match tomorrow with Sri Lanka and hopefully we will win," said a contented Urooj at the postmatch press conference in Bogra.
