75pc complaints see no results

Reveals CAB survey on Wasa clients

Seventy-five percent clients of Wasa in four divisional cities say that they did not get results after lodging complaints with the authorities concerned.

This was revealed in a Consumer Association of Bangladesh (CAB) survey on 400 Wasa clients in Rajshahi, Khulna, Barisal, and Chittagong divisional cities. Eighty percent of them

complained that they do not get supply water round the clock and in many cases supply water is unavailable 12 to 15 hours a day. A staggering 37 percent

Destruction in Mymensingh, road barricade in Ctg against new exam rules

Students of Chittagong and Mymensingh polytechnic institutes staged demonstrations yesterday demanding cancellation of the new rules for unsuccessful students to take fresh examina-

The protesters at Mymensingh Polytechnic Institute vandalised windowpanes of several rooms including the rooms of the principal and vice principal while the students of Chittagong Polytechnic Institute put up barricade on the city's Bayezid Bostamiroad.

Bangladesh Technical Education Board (BTEB), however, in a statement yesterday said discontent among students arose due to the rumour about their referred examination system.

Australian wildfire

Death toll stands at 135

Police declared incinerated towns crime scenes Monday, and Australia's prime minister spoke of mass murder after investigators said arsonists may have set some of the country's worst wildfires in history. The death toll rose to 135. The scale of the carnage, growing daily, has shocked a nation

that endures deadly firestorms every few years. There were no quick answers, but officials said panic and the freight-train speed of the firefront probably accounted for the unusually high toll. Prime Minister Kevin Rudd, visibly upset during a television interview, reflected the country's disgust at the idea that arson-

ists may have set some of the 400 fires that devastated Victoria state, or helped them jump containment lines. "What do you say about anyone like that?" Rudd said.

"There's no words to describe it, other than it's mass murder." The country's top law officer, Attorney General Robert McClelland, said that people found to have deliberately set fires could face murder charges. Murder can carry a life sentence.

More than one dozen fires still burned uncontrollably across the state, though conditions were much cooler than on Saturday, which saw record-high heat and winds of up to 60 mph (100 kph). At least 750 homes were destroyed on Saturday, the Victoria Country Fire Service said. Some 850 square miles (2,200 kilo-

metres) of land were burned out. Officials said both the tolls of human life and property would

'Arsonists' behind 28 die as Tiger bomber blows off herself in SL

A suspected rebel suicide bomber killed 20 soldiers and eight civilians when she blew herself up yesterday at a facility where government forces were processing Sri Lankans fleeing the northern war zone, the military said.

The bombing was the first major suicide attack in Sri Lanka in more than a month and led to fears the Tamil Tiger separatists boxed in by the military and on the verge of defeat will increasingly turn to guerrilla warfare in their battle against government forces. Following a string of victories, the military

backed the rebels into a small strip of land on the northeastern coast, where the Red Cross estimates 250,000 civilians are also trapped. The military has accused the rebels of hold-

ing the civilians as human shields and called for noncombatants to flee to governmentcontrolled areas. The rebels have accused the government of indiscriminately shelling the ing. war zone, leading to increasing civilian casual-

On Monday morning, more than 800 civilians had crossed the front lines and were being searched by soldiers before being sent to camps farther south, military spokesman Brig. Udaya

Nanayakkara said.

When the attacker was frisked, she set off the bomb she was wearing, killing 28 people, he said. The blast also wounded 24 troops and 40 civilians, he said.

Footage run on state television showed a child in a purple checked dress lying lifeless on the ground. Other civilians lay dead nearby. Plastic chairs they were apparently sitting in as they waited to be processed were overturned. and blood stained the ground.

"The LTTE is now desperate because they don't have any control over the civilians now, Nanayakkara said, calling the rebels by the initials of their formal name, the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam. "They wanted to stop these people coming in."

Confirmation of the attack was not available because independent journalists were barred from the war zone.

The United Nations condemned the bomb-

"We deplore the loss of civilian life in this targeted killing. It's a blow for people who have suffered so much," UN resident coordinator Neil Buhne said.

The attack appeared aimed at one of the




