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# White Papers on graft on the cards

Documents to contain corruption during CG, BNP rule; PM rejects BNP seat demand

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday told parliament that White Papers should be published on corruption committed during the regimes of the immediate past caretaker government, and the BNP-led alliance government before that.

The government will take steps in this regard, she said replying to Awami League lawmaker Mujibul Huq during the question-answer session.

In response to another question from independent lawmaker Fazlul Azim, the premier strongly criticised BNP-led opposition lawmakers for boycotting parliament since its second day in session, demanding more seats in the front



row of the House.

She said BNP lawmakers have more seats in the front row than they deserve according to their representation ratio in the House.

Citing that Awami League (AL) lawmakers were given only six seats in the front row in the last parliament by a BNP-led alliance majority, although AL had 58 seats in the House, the premier added, "How could they demand what they had denied us when we had been the opposition?"

In reply to Mujibul Huq's question, the prime minister said, "I support the proposal for publishing White Papers on corruption. It's necessary to publish the White Papers, and the government will SEE PAGE 15 COL 4

### PM asks for recovering water bodies

Hasina made the directive at a presentation programme on Hatirjheel project held at her secretariat office in the afternoon.

Government officials and experts apprised the PM of the pros and cons of the project presenting her a layout.

She asked the authorities to implement the project without harming the poor people living within the project area.

The PM also stressed the need for dredging country's major rivers to increase their navigability which will be useful for country's overall development.

## RPCL in limbo with costly contract

Dutch firm takes \$25m for 8yr redundant service, seeks another \$28m for future

The Rural Power Company Ltd (RPCL) is faced with the dilemma of respecting a very costly and redundant 15-year power plant service contract with a Dutch company that was signed on the basis of a secret and unsolicited negotiation in 2001.

The first phase of the two-part contract ended in October 2008. As dictated by that contract, the RPCL is now considering the second phase of this deal titled Long Term Service Agreement (LTSA) with Dutch companyTTS.

As per the deal, between 2001 and 2008, Dutch company Thomassen and Turbine System (TTS) charged euro 12.036 million and \$ 9.58 million -- or around \$ 25 million in total-for inspection of RPCL's power units and provide repair services and refurbishment of parts. After October last year, TTS submitted its

proposal for the second phase of service for 2008 to 2015. It sought a cost of euro 12.66 million plus \$ 11.59 million (or around \$ 28 million in total). As the amount seemed very high, the RPCL board decided to check the market trend of LTSA and found two price offers from two other service companies -- one demanding euro 15.7 million and another euro

9.8 million. "We have not taken any decision on this matter. Our board will decide the next course of action," said a high official of the RPCL, a company owned by the Rural Electrification Board

An LTSA contractor's job is to inspect gas turbines of the power plant after 8,000 hours of operation, conduct Gas Inspection after 24000 hours and Major Inspection after 48,000 hours. In addition, the LTSA contractor will respond to any problem of the plant within 48 hours of notice.



### Rejoinder, our reply

The Bangladesh Telecommunication Regulatory Commission (BTRC) in a rejoinder on The Daily Star news headlined "Bangla Phone dying in neglect of BTRC" published February 9 differed on a number of points.

The rejoinder said that the BTRC issued a show cause notice as to Bangla Phone's laying of optical fibre network outside its licensed zone and also about leasing out of the network to other operators. The BTRC was not satisfied with its explanation and issued a second show cause notice.

Bangla Phone then filed a writ petition challenging the second show cause notice. On July 13, 2008 the High Court division gave the verdict that the phone company was allowed to establish the line outside the licensing zone, but it could not lease out the line without the BTRC permission.

The Bangla Phone did not apply to the BTRC for the permit.

Over a hundred people, including 31 policemen were injured in clashes between garment workers and law enforcers at Sripur in Ashulia yesterday.

Angry workers of Kushiara Knitwear Industries Ltd of Samad Group damaged about 30 vehicles and put barricade on Dhaka-Tangail Highway for over two hours from 3:00pm protesting delay in payment of salary.

Sources said the area turned into a battle zone as police fired over 200 shots and lobbed 80 teargas canisters to disperse the agitating workers who retaliated by hurling brickbats and stones at the law enforcers.

Sources said when the authorities of the factory owned by Awami League lawmaker Mahmud-us-Samad from Sylhet-3 said the workers' salaries for January would be given on February 18 instead of 5, about 2,000 angry workers attacked the factory building.

They damaged furniture and vandalised three private cars and two microbuses parked inside the factory.

Later, the angry workers took to the Dhaka-Tangail Highway
