DOHS, BKSP win thrillers

Old DOHS maintained their impressive run in the Premier Cricket League when they snatched a five-run win against Surjo Torun in the second round yesterday while BKSP and Cricket Coaching School (CCS) both recorded their first wins in the competition.

Although spring had started smiling weeks ago, a sudden rain and chill on the final day of winter shortened all three matches.

Like the DOHS-Torun match, BKSP also stole a last-over thriller by one-wicket against Victoria but newcomers CCS cruised to an eight-wicket win over all-losers City Club. DOHS-SURJOTORUN

Surjo Torun captain Khaled Mashud asked the opposition to bat in a 37-overs match at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur, where fireworks from Imtiaz Hossain led DOHS to 183 for nine in the stipulated overs, enough for their second successive win.

The DOHS opener smashed five boundaries and three sixes in his 63-ball 58 while Mahmudullah Riyad notched a quickfire 35 off 33 balls with four fours.

Rajin Saleh was the pick of the Surjo Torun

attack with his part-time leg-breaks, taking 4-28 while Delwar Hossain topped and tailed to grab three for 37.

Despite a rollicking start, Surjo Torun lost their way towards the end, managing 178-7 for their first defeat. Indian batsman Sandeep Sharma, who hit half-dozen boundaries in his 58 off 88 balls, put on 45 with fellow opener Junaid Siddique (23 off 25 balls) in less than eight overs.

Hannan Sarkar (24 off 23), Rajin (24 off 36) and Anisur Rahman (22 off 25) all got fine starts but Sharma's dismissal after reaching 121-2 in the middle of the 27th over seemed to bring bad luck.


After Sharma holed out to Fazle Rabbi at longon off Mehrab Hossain's left-arm spin and Rajin was run out, Abul Bashar came back for a fiery second spell to swing the match DOHS's way.

The pacer, adjudged man-of-the-match, sent back Anisur, Delwar Hossain and Mashud in quick succession to put pressure on the Surjo Torun tail, which -- needing 20 from the last two overs -- managed just 15 runs.

England aim to level Antigua Test starts today

England seek to draw level in a Test series that they were favoured to win when they face West Indies in the second Test, starting on Friday at the Vivian Richards Cricket Ground.

England were upset in the opening Test at Kingston. where they were bowled out for 51 in their second innings and crashed to an innings and 23-run defeat inside four days to hand West Indies a 1-0 lead in the four-Test series.

The visitors face a crucial challenge in the match. Another defeat for England would give West Indies an unassailable lead in the series and end their nine-year spell of Test series defeats against

But there are reasons for England to be hopeful about a reversal from their sensational demolition last Saturday at Sabina Park.

Barring back-to-back wins over Bangladesh, West Indies have not won consecutive matches in the last 10 years.

England should also recall that West Indies also outplayed South Africa in Port Elizabeth two Decembers ago, and they still lost a four-Test series 2-1.

The visitors also remember that the last time they crumbled in a Test in the Caribbean, when Michael Atherton's side were bowled out for 46 at Port of Spain, their predecessors rebounded with a 208-run victory in Barbados which was highlighted by hundreds in each innings from Alec Stewart.

"If there were massive divisions in the side, I would be worried, but I do not think they are," England captain Andrew Strauss said.

"I think there were some as well quality performances in the first Test, so it's not all doom for us to do, but we have got to and gloom, but given what remain calm and hopeful. We happened, we need to get

overit.

"We will need to reformulate some of the plans in terms of how we play the West Indies' bowling, and also some of our plans for their batsmen | February 3 instead 6.


The winners, who have now won all their games, are through to the final on February 12 in Dhaka while Pakistan must secure a win against Bangladesh on Saturday to confirm their place.

India's batting superstar Sachin Tendulkar on Thursday said it would be a challenge for the inexperienced Indian side to cope with the conditions during the upcoming tour of New Zealand.

"We have a fairly new team and the challenge is definitely there," he told reporters here. "Playing in New Zealand, where the conditions are going to be tough, is a completely different experience."

The Indians are set to leave for New Zealand on February 20 to play three Tests, five one-day internationals and two Twenty20 matches.

Tendulkar, 35, has toured the country on six previous occasions but it will be a first for most of the other members of the squad, led by the young Mahendra Singh Dhoni.

The Indian squad for the one-dayers and Twenty20 internationals will be named on

Messi steals the show

Diego Maradona milked the adulation of the home fans beforehand but it was Lionel Messi who stole the show, capping a virtuoso performance with a goal as Argentina beat France 2-0 at Marseille's Stade Velodrome on Wednesday.

Having reminisced earlier in the week about how he almost joined Marseille from Napoli in 1989, Maradona was given a rapturous reception from the French fans, who were far less cordial towards their own handler Raymond Domenech, architect of their first-round exit at Euro 2008.

And the majority of the sellout 60,000 crowd will have recognised that the French were deservedly beaten as the 'albiceleste' won with an opener four minutes before half-time from Jonas Gutierrez and then a Messi special eight minutes before the end.

"My lads played really well," Maradona told French television as he commiserated with Domenech.

"I am really happy with their performance. "The record is now very positive," he beamed, having seen off Scotland in his debut as coach in November.

"I think this group are (playing) at a very high level. After 20 minutes they found their feet, getting a good grip on possession which enabled us to develop our game."

Domenech, told TF1 television that the

as Argentine shot-stopper Juan Pablo Carrizo rushed out smartly to close down the advancing Anelka before parrying a Henry snapshot on the half-hour. He then smothered a half-hit shot on the turn from the industrious Ribery.
