Over 42 percent registered candidates for SSC Education Board of Dhaka identified some and equivalent certificates dropped out this social and financial reasons for such a high rate year even before the examinations begin tomorrow, due to a plethora of social and financial obstacles.

About 5.34 lakh of a total 12.67 lakh high school students who had registered in 2007 while they had been in class IX under the country's 10 education boards, as regular candidates for this year's secondary school certificate (SSC) and equivalent examinations, ended up failing to fill the examination forms, according to the data of Combined Education Board Computer Centre.

The data also show that about 7.33 lakh regular students will take the exams this year under the eight general education boards, one madrasa board, and one technical education board while the number of irregular examinees

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BANGLABAZAR RAIDED Over 57,000 textbooks seized: 1 held

The taskforce on textbook seized over 57,000 secondary school textbooks from two publishing houses at Bangla Bazar on Thursday night and detained one of the owners.

Officials from National Curriculum and Textbook Board (NCTB), along with members of Rab and Police seized the books, most of which were not approved by the NCTB, from the warehouses of Pustak Bhaban and New Bishwa Bichitra on Pari Dasroad.

Sources said the taskforce raided three warehouses of Pustak Bhaban and four of New Bishwa Bichitra and seized 57,300 books of class VI

The books were stored there despite directives from the authorities concerned to sell all textbooks to ease the prevailing textbook crisis.

Mohanpur Police yesterday arrested two people in a case filed in connection with killing of 15 people during the Liberation War in 1971.

Police arrested Daud Hossain, 70, and Nur-e Anwar, 65, at their homes in Bamundighi Berabari of Mohanpur upazila around dawn. Daud is a Jamaat-e Islami activist while Anwar belongs to BNP, said Aminul Islam, Mougachchi union BNP organising secretary.

Irrigation water and fertiliser cost of farmers can be halved using their combined application known as fertigation, its successful trial on tomato and aubergine cultivation in the country shows.

Alongside other crops, this method can also be applied in rice cultivation that requires a large amount of both the inputs, said irrigation experts.

This revelation is important as the government sells urea at Tk 12 a kg with nearly 50 percent subsidy. It gave Tk 2.700 crore in subsidy for non-urea fertilisers during the current Boro sea-

son, Annual demand for urea is 28 lakh tonnes and non-urea 10 lakh tonnes.

Tk 5,000 an acre with diesel-run water pumps and Tk 2,000 an acre with electric pumps. Agriculturists say that over 50 per-

cent water and fertiliser gets wasted with the traditional method.

According to Bangladesh Rice Research Institute (BRRI), a kg of paddy requires 2,000 litres of water during production but in Bangladesh farmers season.

Rice cultivation on a hectare of land requires 220 to 250 kgs of urea but over 60 percent fertiliser is wasted due to excessive irrigation.

"This is because when excessive water is used dissolved fertiliser goes

beyond the reach of roots of plants," said Engineer Eftekharul Alam, head of Minor Irrigation Information System Unit at Bangladesh Agriculture Development Corporation (BADC). As a result, paddy plants fail to get

nutrients contributing to decreased yield, he said. Average paddy yield in Bangladesh is around three tonnes a hectare when it could be 5.5 tonnes.

"Fertigation has shown to enhance apply over 4,000 litres during the Boro overall plant-root activity, improve the mobility of nutritive substances, their consumption as well as reducing the contamination of surface and ground water," says a report of Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO).
