JOYPURHAT TRAIN-TRUCK COLLISION

Probe body identifies 7 causes behind crash

The enquiry committee formed to probe Tuesday's tragic train-truck collision in Joypurhat has identified seven causes, including unprotected level crossing, absence of speed breaker and cautionary traffic signal and allowing passengers on train engine without tickets, for the accident.

The committee in its report submitted to Joypurhat deputy commissioner on Thursday also put forward an 11-point recommendation, including posting of two gatemen round the clock at Kashiabari level crossing, construction of speed-breaker at the level crossing and putting a stop to illegal carrying of passengers on the engine and roof of trains.

At least 13 people were killed and 50 others without licences. injured when Khulna bound Rocket mail train rammed a sand-laden truck on the unprotected level crossing at Kashiabari in Sadar upazila of Joypurhat on February 17.

Following the accident, the three-member committee was formed with Additional District Magistrate Sitara Begum as its head.

According to the probe report, other causes Akkelpur in Joypurhat on July 11 in 2006. are absence of signboard with warning on both sides, callousness of the truck driver, abnormal height of the level crossing from the road which caused the truck to get stuck suddenly while crossing the railway track and

violation of rules by truck driver for not slowing down speed or stopping the vehicle or not looking around to be sure that train is not

The 11-point recommendation of the committee also includes ensuring train blowing whistles before reaching the level crossing, creating awareness among bus and truck drivers and helpers by bus, truck and motor owners associations and at government and nongovernment level about passing of level cross-

It also recommended making it mandatory for the bus or truck owners to compensate for death and injury if any accident occurs due to their fault and taking steps against automobile drivers so that they cannot drive vehicles

Joypurhat DC Shafiqul Islam said he received the enquiry report and will take steps to implement the recommendations made by the committee.

Sources in the administration and locals said 35 people were killed in a train-bus collision at the unprotected level crossing of

District administration had then formed an enquiry committee but the recommendations of the committee have not been implemented yet though over two and a half years have passed after the accident.

The High Court (HC) today will deliver orders on the bail prayers filed by some politicians convicted in absentia in the cases against them.

On February 18, after the hearings on the petitions, the HC bench of Justice Syed AB Mahmudul Huq and Justice Moyeenul Islam Chowdhury fixed February 22 as the date for orders on the matters.

Former AL lawmaker Mofazzal Hossain Chowdhury Maya and Mostafa Rashid Suja, Jatiya Party (Manju) chairman Anwar Hossain Manju, former BNP lawmaker Nadim Mostafa and former finance minister M Saifur Rahman's son Shafiur Rahman Babu, surrendered before the court and filed prayers for bails in different criminal cases in last January.

Earlier, they were convicted in absentia by the trial courts on different criminal charges.

Deputy attorney general (DAG) of the bench Motahar Hossain Saju yesterday told The Daily Star that the HC bench would pass orders today as the bench earlier held hearings on 18 bail petitions filed by 14 accused, most of them are politicians.

India to set up Ganga River Basin Authority to curb pollution

India has announced it will set up the National Ganga River Basin Authority (GRBA) to rid the river Ganga of pollution and other forms of degradation.

Minister of State for Environment and Forests Namo Narain Meena gave a statement, to this effect, in the parliament on Friday. The government will issue a notification, in this regard, he said.

The implementation of the GRBA is based on piecemeal basis and focused more on municipal sewage, Meena said adding that the problem is compounded from the inadequate flows of water.

He said, a comprehensive response is necessary to address the problem covering water quality and flow, sustainable access, prevention and control of pollution, security for sustenance, and energy security in the form of national mission by giving the Ganga the status of a national river.

Which is why the government has decided to give the Ganga the status of a national river by setting up the GRBA with the empowerment of planning, financing, monitoring and coordinating

authority for the project under the Environment (Protection) Act, 1986, the minister said. The prime minister will chair the GRBA and it

will include as its members the chief ministers of the states through which the Ganga flows-Uttarakhand, Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Jharkhand and West Bengal.

The GRBA may co-opt one or more chief ministers from any of the states having major tributaries of the river Ganga. It may also co-opt up to five members who are experts in the fields of river conservation, hydrology, environmental engineering, social mobilization and such other fields.

The GRBA, with a holistic approach, will address the problem of pollution in the Ganga. This will include water quality and other issues relevant to river ecology and management.

The GRBA is aimed to development river basin management plan and prevention, control and abatement of pollution in the Ganga to maintain its water quality and to take steps relevant to river ecology and management in the Ganga Basin states.

EXPEDITIONS TO HIMALAYAS Solo photo show begins

A six-day solo photography exhibition titled 'Icy Siren' by MA Mohit, portraying the daring expeditions by Bangladeshi youths to the Himalayan mountain range, began at Drik Gallery in the city yesterday.

Prof Syed Manzoorul Islam of English department at Dhaka University formally inaugurated the event jointly sponsored by Transcom Beverages Ltd, Dhaka Courier and UNB, a news agency.

A total of 40 photographs displayed in the show captured the serene icy beauty of the Himalaya, the effort of the climbers to conquer the peaks and the Sherpa lifestyle in the high Himalayan region.

Member of Bangla Mountaineering and Trekking Club (BMTC), Mohit is the first Bangladeshi climber to ascend 7,000 metres in the Himalayas.

He climbed three Himalayan peaks -- Chulu West, Mera and

Singu Chuli -- and attempted to climb the eighth highest peak Manaslu which is 26,758 feet

Manaslu peak is considered one of the most dangerous peaks of the world. Only 240 climbers have so far scaled the mountain successfully, while some 52 were killed in their attempts to climb up the peak until 2003.

Mohit and his friends will undertake another expedition aiming to conquer Mount Everest, the highest peak of the world, in April.

"Everest is so close to Bangladesh but we never tried to explore its beauty, while people from across the world successfully climbed its peaks," he said.

"There are no mountains in Bangladesh. The exhibition is an effort to introduce the spirit of the Himalayas to the people of Bangladesh who only know a

fewhills," he added. Pemba Dorje Sherpa, the


fastest Everest climber of the world and three-time record holder, was present at the programme as the special guest.

"Mohit captured the spirit of the Himalayas and the true lifestyle of the Sherpas quite perfectly," said Pemba who holds the speed record for climbing Everest in eight hours and 10 minutes in May 2004.

Pemba expressed his willingness to climb for Bangladesh and win a 'Bangladesh-Nepal Friendship Peak' in the Himalayas.

RU SHAHEED MINAR

Sangskritik Jote barred from holding programme

The authorities of Rajshahi University (RU) did not allow Sammilito Sangskritik Jote (SSJ) to hold 'Ekushey programme' at Central Shaheed Minar on the campus yesterday.

Earlier, the university authorities permitted Bikalpa Sahitya Sangsad (BSS), a Shibir-backed organisation, to hold programme at Central Shaheed Minar.

But Sammilito Sangskritik Jote had declared that they would hold programme on Ekushey at the Central Shaheed Minar, as Bikalpa Sahitya Sangsad does not believe in liberation war.

In this backdrop, the university authorities did not allow any organisation to hold any programme to avoid untoward situation.

Earlier on Friday night, the university authorities and police held a meeting and took the decision on imposing restriction at Central Shaheed Minar area to hold any programme except programmes scheduled by the university authorities.

Sammilito Sangskritik Jote activists went to Shaheed Minar to held programme yesterday morning, but they were not allowed to hold programme there.

Later, they hold a protest meeting and protest cultural programme on left side of the Shaheed Minar and criticised the university authorities for imposing restriction.

When contacted, Pro-VC Prof Mamnunul Keramat confirmed that they had imposed restriction to hold programmes by any organisation other than the university authorities at Shaheed Minar area.
