Fund crunch hits GTCL gas compressor project

Power plants, upcoming power projects, large industries to suffer from gas crisis

As deteriorating gas pressure and supply crisis continues to cause huge power generation shortfall, the Gas Transmission Company Ltd's (GTCL) latest bid to install three gas compressor stations to improve gas supply has been halted due to severe fund crunch.

If this project fails to launch in time, the gas supply scenario will be grimmer within the next two years. Petrobangla sources said that the present gas supply shortfall of 100 to 200 million cubic feet of gas a day would deteriorate further and vears. due to lack of adequate gas transmission pressure, supplies to many areas will be

tender for installing the compressors in the last three years. drew two offers; ABB of Italy sought \$256 million excluding 8.5 percent tax while Hyundai of South Korea sought \$149.7 million including the tax.

While Hyundai's bid is a clear winner, GTCL says it only has \$55 million for the job. This job is part of a \$189-million project financed by the Asian Development Bank (ADB) to set up three pipelines and install these three compressor stations. The pipeline and compressors together would enhance the gas supply and pressure quality within two

The GTCL that held its first failed bid in 2006 says that it always knew that \$55 million was not adequate for the scheme Earlier this month, the GTCL's second but it had not arranged additional funds

There is no shortcut to resolving the present gas crisis and all measures to significantly increase gas supply or production will take at least two years. Installing the compressors themselves will take nearly 22 months to complete.

According to Petrobangla sources, demand for gas has spiralled over the years beyond the capacity of the existing gas delivery system.

Petrobangla is now delivering more than 1,800 million cubic feet of gas a day, while it believes that the demand is hovering between 1,900 million cubic feet and 2,000 million cubic feet of gas a day. Official documents show that Petrobangla can supply 2,042 million SEE PAGE 12 COL 6

Education to suffer as ordinance axed

The government decision not to ratify the Private University Ordinance 2008 promulgated by the immediate past caretaker government will allow continuation of imparting substandard education and sales of certificates by a section of private universities, experts believe.

The University Grants Commission (UGC) strongly persuaded the education and law ministry not to drop the ordinance but owners of private universities lobbied against the move of the UGC.

Education Minister Nurul Islam Nahid yesterday told The Daily Star that general view about the ordinance was that it would be made law but owners of the private universities are continuing to oppose the move.

"At present the ministry is not thinking about it as the expert committee formed to scrutinise ordinances did not pick the private university ordinance for placing before the parliament," he, however, said that they would work on it later, if needed.

The caretaker government promulgated the ordinance following a proposal of the UGC to bring private universities under strict discipline but the government decided not to place it before the House under the excuse of having no recommendations from the parliamentary special committee.

Japan to provide \$439m for power, infrastructure

The government yesterday signed an Exchange of Notes with Japan for a soft loan assistance worth Tk 2,981 crore (US\$ 439m) for three power and infrastructure projects.

These three projects are Haripur second phase 360 megawatt power plant at Tk 1665 cr under the Electricity Generation Company of Bangladesh (EGCB), Central Zone Power Distribution Project at Tk 728 cr under the Power Development Board (PDB) and Eastern Bangladesh Bridge Improvement Project at Tk 586 cr under the Roads and Highways Department. The loan for the Haripur project is the second round of

Japanese assistance for this project, said a press release. The 360 MW power project will be executed by the EGCB in collaboration with Rural Electrification Board and the Power
