Newly elected upazila chairmen and vicechairmen yesterday asked the government to make laws in line with Local Government (Upazila Parishad) Ordinance 2008 for better functioning of the local bodies.

They also blasted the plans to have lawmakers as advisers to the upazila councils, and said the parishads would weaken if compelled to follow 'dictates from the MPs'.

Another 14 crore to plunge into poverty, says ILO study on impact of global recession

More than 140 (14 crore) million people could be plunged into poverty and 23 (2.3 crore) million lose their jobs in Asia this year as the global financial crisis batters the region, according to an International Labour
