JMB man reveals in remand

Banned Islamist outfit Jama'atul Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB) "prepared to assassinate" former prime minister Khaleda Zia at an election rally in Chandina, Comilla, on December 23 last year Alleged JMB operative Masum Bin Abdul Hye, 32, admitted this yesterday during his five-day remand.

Chittagong Metropolitan Police arrested Masum on December 31 last year and he was shown arrested on February 22 in a case filed in connection with the attempted attack on Khaleda in Chandina. Debidwar police of Comilla placed him before a Comilla court seeking a 10-day remand.

Masum in his statement to Debidwar police claimed that he knew nothing about the JMB operation and he was brought to Chandina on December 22 to take part in an Islamic mehfil. He spent the night at the house of one Mostaque at Nabiabad of Debidwar upazila.

He claimed that during the night of December 22, JMB operatives Naim, 20, Abu Ansari, 22, Habib, 22, and Asad, 21, held a meting where they planned to kill Khaleda saying the country was not being ruled by Sharia law.

He said on December 23, they gave him a bag full of grenades. Masum claimed that he planned to flee from the JMB men. He said he gave the bag to Naim at Chandina Bus Stand and secretly got on a bus heading for Chittagong.



Pakistan to arm village militias to fight terror

Govt to hand 30,000 rifles, form special police

AP, Islamabad

Authorities in a Pakistani border province plan to arm villagers with 30,000 rifles and set up an elite police unit to protect a region increasingly besieged by Taliban and al-Qaeda militants, an official said Sunday.

Stiffer action in the North West Frontier Province could help offset American concern that a peace deal being negotiated in the Swat valley, a Taliban stronghold in the province, could create a haven for Islamist insurgents only 160km from the Pakistani capital.

Village militias backed by the United States have been credited with reducing violence in Iraq. Washington is paying for a similar initiative in Afghanistan.

The United States is already spending millions of dollars to train and equip Pakistani forces in the rugged region near the Afghan border but there was no sign it was involved in the militia plan. A US Embassy spokesman could not be reached for comment.Pakistani Foreign Minister Shah Mehmood Qureshi said Saturday he will try to "remove the apprehensions of the world community" about the Swat deal when he meets US officials in Washington next week, state-run media reported.

But it was unclear if Sunday's announcement had the backing of national leaders or the powerful army or if handing out more guns in an already heavily armed society was wise.

Tigers call for truce, Lanka army says no

AFP, Colombo

Sri Lanka's Tamil Tigers appealed yesterday for international action to halt a major offensive against their shrinking fiefdom, but the island's military rejected any talk of a truce.

With rebel forces cornered in the northeast of the island by a crore of its members. massive attack by government forces, the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE) urged foreign powers to step in and arrange an immediate truce.

The LTTE said the United Nations, United States, the European Union, Japan and one-time peace broker Norway had to pressure the Sri Lankan government into accepting a ceasefire "so the miseries of the Tamils... are brought to an end."

"We also wish to inform the international community that we are ready to discuss, cooperate, and work together in all their efforts to bring an immediate ceasefire and work towards a political settlement," the LTTE's political chief B. Nadesan said in a statement. But the Sri Lankan military said it would accept nothing short

of complete surrender and disarmament. "Our position is that they must lay down arms and surrender," said military spokesman Brigadier Udaya Nanayakkara. "There is no shift in our position."

The government withdrew from a Norwegian-brokered truce at the start of last year, after accusing the Tigers of using a peace process only to re-arm and consolidate their de facto mini-state in the north of the island.
