

# Exporters to get recession package

Govt to announce decision within a month

STAFF CORRESPONDENT

The government will announce a combined incentive package within a month for different industries including readymade garments to stave off the fallout of the global recession.

It will also revise the present list of the beneficiaries under different programmes including social security network and elderly citizens' allowances.

Finance Minister AMA Muhith said this to reporters yesterday after a meeting with Bangladesh Finished Leather, Leather Goods and Footwear Exporters Association.

Two separate meetings were held yesterday with the finance minister in the chair to discuss the incentive package.

During the meeting the association leaders said the demand for leather in the world market including the USA and UK had dropped due to world economic recession. As a result they have unsold leather worth about Tk 2500 crore.

The plan to transport the huge cache of sophisticated arms and ammunition, seized at Chittagong Urea Fertiliser Factory jetty on April 2 2004, was made at Bankapi Royal Rose Hotel in Bangkok.

A number of top leaders of secessionist organisations active in India's north-western states frequented the three-star Bankapi Royal Rose Hotel in the somewhat quiet suburbs of the Thai

capital. Anthony Davis, journalist of internationallyreputed Jane's Intelligence Review, made an extensive investigation into the incident of seizure of huge cache of arms and ammunition in Chittagong. #### Wasa asked to resolve water crisis STAFF CORRESPONDENT

State Minister for LGRD and Cooperatives Jahangir Kabir Nanak yesterday directed high officials of Dhaka Water Supply and Sewerage Authority (Wasa) to have more field visits to problem areas to end the city's existing water crisis.

The state minister made a sudden visit to Wasa office and expressed his dissatisfaction over the poor number of field visits made by its high officials, Wasa sources said.

He suggested that the Wasa involves all lawmakers of Dhaka city to deal with the crisis.

Nanak said the lawmakers will inform Wasa about water crisis in their constituencies and help select locations for setting up new deep tube wells.

Sources said the state minister's visit was intended to step up Wasa activities in order to end the existing water crisis and eradicate the bad

## DSE's new policy to prevent GP from listing

The Dhaka Stock Exchange (DSE) yesterday decided not to list any securities with a face value of Tk 1, a decision that will prevent Grameenphone's listing with the stock exchange.

The prospectus of Grameenphone's \$65 million (Tk 449 crore) initial public offering (IPO) is awaiting the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) approval. The face value of each of Grameenphone's share has been fixed at Tk 1, excluding pre-

Experts anticipate that such a decision will discourage other large companies, which are waiting to see the outcome of Grameenphone's listing, to come to the market.

"The unrealistic decision will not be helpful for the market," Salahuddin Ahmed Khan, professor of finance department of Dhaka University, told The Daily Star yesterday.

He said if the listing of Grameenphone is delayed or it does not happen at all, big companies including multinational ones

will think twice before entering the stock market. DSE President Rakibur Rahman after a board meeting told journalists, "From now on we will discourage those companies" listings whose shares have a face value of Tk 1. The minimum face value of a share will have to be Tk 10 to get listed on the stock

exchange." The listing rules will be amended to implement the decision

made by the DSE board, Rakibur said. Citing the example of AIMS First Mutual Fund with shares
