## Call to formulate law to end discrimination against Dalits

Soud Sarder, a leader of the Bede community in Manikganj, lives in a tent measuring 14 by 6 feet along with his family on the bank of the Louhajang river. As this community does

not have a place to make their permanent homes, its members have to move from one place to another very often whenever the locals want them to go away.

Traditionally Bedes live on boats. But as their boats have been damaged and they could not afford to repair them because of financial constraints, Soud Sarder and his community members tried to settle down on Khas lands but failed. They even cannot fight legally as they are not permanent residents of any area.

The Bedes living in Manikganj are deprived of fundamental rights to land, treatment and education, Soud Sarder said while elaborating the plight of his community at a discussion yesterday.

The National Committee to Celebrate the International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination organised the discussion at Cirdap auditorium in the city as part of its 10-day programmes marking the day.

## MJF hails HC directive

Manusher Jonno Foundation (MJF) yesterday welcomed the High Court directive to close down within two weeks all ship breaking yards operating without environmental clearance.

The foundation hoped that all relevant authorities will ensure compliance to the directives, says a press release.

It also welcomes the court order to ensure safe working conditions for workers and directives to prevent ships from entering Bangladesh territory without cleaning its hazardous material at source.

At present, approximately 30,000 workers are directly involved in ship breaking, of which 25 percent are children. MJF expressed concerned about the fate of workers of the industry and requested the authorities as well as the owners to make sure these workers do not lose their employment or sources of livelihood.

MJF also requested the authorities to remove children from this industry as this is considered hazardous labour and violates labour law 2006.

## Number of urban slum dwellers to swell over 3cr by 2020

Speakers say at meeting

About 30 percent of the country's total population live in urban areas, of which 33 percent (around 1.6 crore) people live in the slums and this figure is expected to increase to more than three crore by 2020.

The speakers said this at a meeting organised by Gazipur municipality and Practical Action, international development organisation, at Cirdap auditorium in the city yester-

The number of slum dwellers continued to increase significantly due to more secure income and employment opportunities in urban areas, they said, adding a decrease in the number in rural areas due to river erosion, low productivity and lack of social security.

Presiding over the meeting, acting mayor of the municipality Abdul Karim said fund mobilisation and proper execution are the key challenges in reducing urban

He underscored the need for more funds to implement the slum improvement plan that is carried out the municipality to achieve sustainable urban poverty reduction in phases.

Speaking as the chief guest, AKM Mozammel Haque said the slum improvement plan would be the milestone for the urban poverty reduction across the country.

He underscored the need for strengthening the local government for the overall development of the country.

"Local government should have to be a self-governed institution to fulfil people's demands," he said, adding: "It wouldn't be possible to reach our desired goal to build poverty-free Bangladesh unless we free local government from national government."

About scanty budgetary allocation for local body, he said only two percent of the

national budget is spent by the local government, while other countries expend 40 percent of the national budget to meet

the demands." Mansoor Ali, urban project manager of Practical Action,

underlined the importance of poverty. taking a comprehensive policy to get more effective results to develop every sector like and other challenge to reduce Action.

## Father seeks help to diagnose son's disease

A two-month-old baby born with severe respiratory distress has been put on supplemental oxygen since his birth, but the



doctors are yet to find out the cause of his disease.

The entire body of the baby boy turned blue soon after his birth at Ibne Sina Hospital on January 19. He is now undergoing treatment at Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University Hospital under the supervision of Prof

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Shahidullah.

His father Dr Abid Imtiaz, a young nuclear scientist, has appealed to medical experts, donor agencies and charity organisations at home and abroad to help diagnose the disease of the boy.

the disease," said Dr Imtiaz, senior scientific officer at Nuclear Energy Division of Bangladesh Atomic Energy Commission. The causes of central cyanosis in the baby are yet to be known, Prof Shahidullah said,

adding that the patient is not stable enough to undergo CT/ MRI/USG of brain. Prof Shahidullah sought support of any national or international team of medical professionals to address this

problem. So, the boy's father urged medical experts and various agencies from home and abroad to help save the life of his son.
