BDR carnage staged to foil poll verdict, start civil war

Says prime minister

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday said the brutal killings at the BDR headquarters on February 25 was staged to foil people's verdict in the last parliamentary polls and push the country towards a "civil war".

"They [evil forces] wanted to foil the December 29 poll verdict and push the country towards a civil war by creating anarchy," she said while addressing the distribution ceremony of Bazlur Rahman Smriti Padak 2008 at the National Museum.

The Liberation War Museum honours journalists with the award after the late editor of the daily Sangbad every year for their work on the history of the Liberation War.

Sheikh Hasina asked all to remain alert about the conspirators. "They will not sit idle. They will continue to try to create conflicting situations again and again. So, remain highly alert against the plotters," she said.

The evil forces have engaged in brutal killings one after another, trying to destabilise the country, since they were defeated in the Liberation War in 1971, Hasina said. Whenever the Awami League comes in power, evil forces are busy to implement their anti-people blueprints, added the Awami League chief.

Hasina pledged to try the war criminals and eliminate militancy from the soil and build Bangladesh as the most peaceful country in South Asia.

Three journalists -- two from the print media and another from the electronic media--won this year's awards for reporting on and documenting the Liberation War.

Azizul Parvez of the daily Samakal received the award for his series reports on 1971 genocide at the grass roots level, Rukunodoullah of the daily Sangbad for his series reports on repression and genocide in Jessore, and Amjad Kabir Chowdhury of ATN Bangla for his report SEE PAGE 15 COL 3

Godwin goal gives MSC Tk 1cr win

A 21st minute goal by Nigerian midfielder John Godwin gave Mohammedan the Citycell Super Cup title with a solitary goal victory against their tradition rivals Abahani in the final at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday.

An otherwise defensive Mohammedan, who received Tk one-crore as prize money, survived the rival onslaught before a 40,000-strong crowd, which proved that football has managed to revive its past glory with the tournament worth Tk two-crore.

President Zillur Rahman was expected to attend the final as chief guest but there was surprise for the spectators as Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina witnessed the final and distributed trophies.

In a passionate but brief speech, Sheikh Hasina congratulated both the finalists.

20 hurt as Tahrir men, cops clash

Witnesses said police charged baton on Hizb ut-Tahrir activists to disperse them as they brought out a processing by blocking the road at about 1:30pm.

The Hizb ut-Tahrir activists threw brickbats at police, ensuing the clash that lasted for half an hour.

Suicide attack on Pak mosque kills 50

A suicide bomber blew himself up in a packed mosque in northwest Pakistan during Juma prayers, killing 50 people and wounding dozens in one of the deadliest attacks in the nuclear-armed nation.

The bombing took place on the weekly Muslim day of rest in the town of Jamrud in the restive Khyber tribal region, which is located on a key road used to ferry supplies to Western troops across the border in Afghanistan.

It came just hours before US President Barack Obama was to unveil a new offensive against terror havens in Afghanistan and ammunition and explosive Pakistan, aiming to deal a death blow to al-

"More than 70 people were wounded. There may be many more dead," he said.

Sharp weapons recovered from DU hall

Police recovered 12 sharp weapons including machetes, swords and knives from Mohsin Hall at Dhaka University early yesterday.

Law enforcers raided the hall at around 3:00am following a clash between two factions of Bangladesh Chhatra League (BCL), student wing of Awami League, over gaining control of Mohsin Hall, sources said.

During the two-hour-long raid police searched about 50 rooms and recovered four swords, two machetes, two knives, four other sharp weapons and 32 iron rods, sources added.

Taliban and al-Qaeda must be stopped

Says Obama

President Barack Obama yesterday ordered 4,000 more military troops into Afghanistan, vowing to "disrupt, dismantle and defeat" the Taliban and al-Qaeda.

The new troop build up he announced is aimed principally at bolstering the Afghan army and turning up the heat on terrorists that Obama said are plotting new attacks against Americans.

He called the situation in the region "increasingly perilous" more than seven years after the Taliban was removed from power in Afghanistan.

58 killed as dam bursts its banks in Indonesia

Adam burst its banks near the Indonesian capital Jakarta on Friday, drowning at least 58 people in a torrent of muddy water that flooded hundreds of homes, officials said.

Dozens remained missing after a huge wall of water broke through the manmade earthen dam as residents slept, giving them little chance to flee their lowlying homes.

> Ghufron, a 17-year-old student, said he narrowly escaped waters that crashed into his home, but an uncle was dead and three other relatives were missing.

"By the time I woke up the water was up to my nose. I climbed to the roof to save myself. I heard people screaming and shouting," he said.

Dewi Masitoh, a 40-year-old housewife, said she narrowly escaped with her husband and two daughters after they saw rising water reach the door of their

"We were on the second floor but my daughter went back downstairs when the window broke and water gushed in. My husband jumped in and pulled her out of

"I punched a hole through the roof and we all climbed up through," she said, showing cuts and scratches on her arms. Television images showed bodies

floating through the twisting streets nearby and water rushing through the breach in the dam, emptying the lake.
