British oil company Cairn Tuesday announced withdrawal from the ments, headded. The other rejected amendment proposal demands that Cairn be allowed to sell gas directly to a third buyer, instead of offering it to the government at first. The PSC dictates that the government holds the first right to buy any oil or gas discovered in the block. Only if the government
