

## Sanat Kar's satirical images

Sanat Kar is one of the noted figures in Indian printmaking. He has added a new dimension and given a novel look to contemporary Indian art. Kar was born

in 1935 and grew up in Calcutta (Kolkata). Bengal Gallery of Fine Arts in Dhaka has organised a solo exhibition of Sanat Kar, now on at Bengal Gallery in Dhanmondi.

During Kar's formative years in the '50s, in the Calcutta art circuit, the blossoming of Indian art was in full

swing. Kar and his comrades formed a group called 'The Artists' Circle.' Kar established himself in the contemporary printmaking medium in West Bengal. He began experimenting with etching in the early '60s and created various images with innovative thoughts.

Sanat Kar successfully projected the social and political dilemmas with his evocative and sensual lines. The lines are lyrical, expressive and animated -- denoting human figures, visage and limbs. Sometimes his characters appear witty and refer to the social anomalies in a humorous manner. Changes in the society, social injustice, crime, superstition, poverty and political instability have appeared in his works symbolically and thoughtfully.

Kar's satirical images reflect where he grew up, lives and works. He is constantly searching for fascinating characters. Flowers and vases are recurring motifs in his works. Smiling faces, overwhelmed looks, lamenting eyes frequent his images. Every face conveys an individual language and constructs a story that is often familiar. His figures are oval and round. Romance is at times featured in his works differently, as the artist delves into the couple's pain, struggles and emotions.

Kar's "Oh! Nandigram-2" depict the villagers' anguish and suffering. The work refers to the Nandigram violence that caused deaths of villagers.


Once famous for his romantic images, Kar's "Couple" at the ongoing display denotes frustration and distress in conjugal life.

All works at the exhibit are pastel on paper. Pastel is available in varying degrees of solidity and the softer varieties help to create delicate tones and lines. Kar uses both for demonstrating flexibility in his works. Red, azure, yellow, black and emerald green dominate his works.

The exhibition at Bengal Shilpalay continues till April 16.

## An imaginative portrayal of reality

A compilation of four stories, "Dinlipi" enacts some everyday incidents, mingling reality and imagination, expressed through pantomime.

Other three segments were "Niyantrak" (The Controller), which is centred on a traffic police; "Bhikkhuker Halchal" (Vagrant's Titbits), a thorough observation of a beggar's life and "Ami Bonam Ami" (Me Versus Myself), focusing on inner-conflict.

Mobashwira Ibnat Nadi, Selim of this effort which will promote this Chowdhury, Mohammad Selimuzzaman, Jamil Hossain, Mahfuz Rahaman, Nurul Afsar, Sohel Islam and others performed in "Dinlipi." Junayed Yusuf was the light designer.
