#### Defaulter plants face cancellation of contracts

The power ministry has decided in principle not to extend deadlines for four rental power projects totalling 155 MW capacity for their repeated failure to launch commercial operation and would ask the Power Development Board (PDB) to take action as per contracts.

It means contracts of these projects would face cancellation and penalty, sources say. The cancellation would pave the way for new decisions regarding future rental power projects, which are a temporary fast-paced power solution.

These power projects are the gas-fired Fenchuganj 50MW plant and Bogra


A 10-year-old schoolgirl was found hanging from a ceiling fan in her sister's house in Darussalam in city's Mirpur area yesterday.

Wildlife Trust of Bangladesh crew revisited Mahadebtila of Harinchhara Tea Estate in Srimangal area to investigate the habitat of the rare bird Silverbreasted Broadbill. This time they spent three days but couldn't locate any Broadbill. However, they were able to rescue a rare primate: Slow Loris (Lajjaboti Banor in Bangla). WTB member Enam Ul Haque and researcher Samiul Mohsanin bought it for Tk 500 and released it at the same place where a local had captured the primate the night before they arrived. We feel that a countrywide campaign against capturing and killing of our threatened wildlife need to be seriously addressed. Slow Loris is globally vulnerable and it is critically endangered in Bangladesh, that is at the verge of extinction.

## BDR men who fled during BPC goes for costly diesel purchase

Import of diesel at higher premium is costing Bangladesh Petroleum Corporation (BPC) dearly in this quarter--April to June, 2009.

The BPC is now importing 1.5 lakh tonnes of diesel every month from Malaysian Petronas Trading Corporation (Petco) at \$5.98 per barrel premium--for freight, insurance and other charges in addition to the fuel price.

Kuwait Petroleum Corporation (KPC) in price negotiations with BPC early last month had offered \$5.25 per barrel premium. The BPC is now importing diesel with 0.73 cents more premium per barrel.

The BPC had also agreed to a two-year deal with KPC to buy eight lakh tonnes of fuel annually including 1.30 lakh tonnes of diesel to be supplied in this quarter. The deal is yet to be signed.

BPC Chairman Anwarul Karim said KPC relaxed the conditions of opening Letter of Credit (L/C) with international banks and brought down premium to below \$5.30 from \$6.60 per barrel in early March negotiations. "At the final stage of the process of signing the agreement,

### Garment makers fear labour unrest

Shutdown of factories, deferred payment may spark instability

Garment makers fear widespread labour unrest because of shutdown of some factories and deferred payment to workers as fallout from global recession bites Bangladesh.

They said at least seven factories have already been shut down and some are in a critical situation as the number of orders from international buyers declined significantly.

The manufacturers and the leaders of the Bangladesh Garment Manufacturers and Exporters Association (BGMEA) were speaking at a meeting with the editors, chairmen and managing directors of print and electronic media at Sonargaon Hotellastnight.

At the meeting, BGMEA President Abdus Salam Murshedy said many people had earlier thought that Bangladesh would remain immune to the recession as the country mainly produces basic garment items.

But the country is now losing out the market of basic items to competing countries such as China, India and Pakistan, Murshedy said.

Referring to a string of measures taken by different countries, the BGMEA chief said China has been giving a 17 percent tax rebate to exporters, which makes the country more competitive than before.
