Lee unfit for Dubai ODIs

Fast bowler Brett Lee has been deemed unfit to return to international cricket after failing to recover from an ankle injury. Doug Bollinger, the left-arm fast bowler, has been added to the Australian one-day squad as cover for the forthcoming limited-overs series against Pakistan in the UAE. Lee, part of the squad currently in South Africa, will remain in the country to continue his rehabilitation.

"The National Selection Panel (NSP) has been advised by Cricket Australia medical staff that Brett Lee is not yet fit enough to resume international cricket," Andrew Hilditch, the chairman of selectors, said. "While it's disappointing for Brett to miss the start of the VB Pakistan series, the NSP wants to take a careful approach to his return to the Australian team."

Lee, who last played during the Boxing Day Test in Melbourne before surgery, was fast-tracked into the one-day squad currently in South Africa, hoping to make an early comeback but couldn't play any of the four games so far. However he has a chance of joining the squad in the UAE provided he makes a speedy recovery.

"Brett's ankle has recovered well from surgery in January this year," Alex Kountouris, the team physiotherapist, said. "However, the rehabilitation process is ongoing and, to date, Brett has not bowled sufficiently to allow him to be fit to resume playing cricket."

He said Lee would remain in South Africa to continue the rehabilitation program and gradually increase his bowling volume and intensity. "I will be monitoring Brett's progress to assess his availability for any part of the VB series against Pakistan in the UAE."

Bollinger made his Australia debut in the Sydney Test against South Africa but is yet to play a one-day international. "Doug was probably a bit disappointed not to get a run during the Test series in South Africa, but this is an opportunity for him to impress at one-day level for Australia and I'm sure it's an opportunity he'll be keen to make the most of," Hilditch said.

The first ODI against Pakistan is on April 22 in Dubai.

Booters off to Nepal

Bangladesh football team will leave for Kathmandu today to play a practice match against Nepal Police on April 18.

The Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF) has announced a 20-member squad for the tour, which has been arranged as part of the build up for the AFC Challenge Cup qualifiers that begins in Dhaka on April 26.

Brazilian coach Edson Silva Dido picked up the squad from a preliminary list of 25. And out of the five not touring to the Himalayan Kingdom are prolific strikers Emily and Robin and winger Zahid, who have been left behind to nurse their injuries. Goalkeeper Himel has been asked to stay back and Brothers defender Ariful was dropped due to a lack of progress in his performance.

The absence of Emily and Robin would make the Bangladesh attack susceptible. But it will give the new striking pair of Mithun Chowdhury and Enamul Haq a chance to show their abilities.

Prior to the departure of the team, coach Dido said that even though the training camp for the Challenge Cup started four weeks ago, his boys have yet to make any noticeable progress.

"Four weeks of training is not enough for a national side when you want to change things completely and therefore we have not made any significant progress, but the players have started realising what I want from them now," said the Brazilian.

Dido also emphasised on the importance of playing a tour match as compared to a local match ahead of a tough international fixture.

"I preferred playing a tour match to a local match because the psychological pressures are different when you are travelling and playing. If you lose a match at home it has a pretty bad effect on the players and fans so it was better for us to play abroad", he said.

The booters will play the match against the police outfit after having just one day of practice in the Nepalese capital, which is situated at 4383 ft above the sea level and it seemed coach Dido was a bit apprehensive about the altitude.

"I don't know much about the opponents and I can't tell you whether we are going to win

Bloodshed in cricket

In another shameful episode in the country's cricket, a local coach punched an umpire during an age-level match in the city yesterday.

The assault took place at the Mohakhali T&T ground during a Standard Chartered Bank Under-16 National Cricket Championship match between Discovery Cricket Academy and Jubo Kishore Cricket Academy.

During the match's second innings, Discovery coach Shahjahan Shaju reportedly went inside the ground to umpire Alamgir Siddiqui following a dispute over the use of a 12th man. According to a Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) source, the Discovery

coach stomped into the field and started an argument with the umpire. Suddenly, Shaju threw his fist at the umpire who suffered a bleeding nose and fell to the ground.

The umpires have already reported the incident to the board, which could ban the offending coach for a minimum of one year.

This is not the first time that such clashes have occurred on the cricket field this season. First it was the Bangladesh Boys official Ziaur Rahman Topu who abused the umpires at the City Club ground back in February during a First Division game. He was subsequently fined Tk 20,000 and suspended for three matches. Then it was the



Ground reality

From the moment a cricketer turns professional, he is expected to go out and perform in all conditions. All the player has to do is turn up on every match-day morning with a positive frame of mind and without any qualms on what lies ahead.

Usually the player only has to worry about the pitch, the opposition and the umpires but when it comes to the cricket circuit in Dhaka, a few other variables are thrown in.

Chief among these is the cricket ground and the basic facilities, or the lack of it. Out of eight venues with natural turf wickets, only three are deemed good enough to hold Premier League matches while the rest are for the First Division. When the First Division ends, mats are laid on the centre wicket for Second and Third Division matches.

Only the venues used for the Premier League have a semblance of normality about them with grassy outfields, proper practice areas, dressing rooms and a clean environment. Sadly, the ones that

are thrust upon the lower leagues are nothing short of repulsive, i.e., the Dhaka University Ground. It is hard to find a grassy patch on the outfield while the sightcreens are torn in parts. The dressing rooms, with stinky marquee, are placed square of the wicket and it is a 10-minute walk to reach the nearest toilet. It is hard to find a team that enters or leaves the ground with a happy face whether they won or not.

For the first time in domestic cricket history, no Premier League matches were held at the Dhanmondi Cricket Stadium because of the danger it poses on and off the field. To start off with, there is no electricity supply in the dressing rooms, which are already insalubrious. Keep your bags there but you don't open even a water bottle inside.

You take a walk into the middle but you have just gone past a mirage that is the whole outfield. Laden by sand, the upper layer is green but try diving on the surface and you are bound to get up with a bad bruise.

A joke runs in the cricketing circle that whatever grass you find in 'Abahani field' is completely bogus. It rings true when you take a look at three of the pitches

where the five groundsmen have left a bit of greenery right in the centre of the wicket. Makes no sense to anyone.

The basic problem at the Dhanmondi Cricket Stadium, a ground steeped in cricketing tradition of Bangladesh cricket, is a lack of water to treat the outfield, according to one of the groundsmen. "We (the groundsmen) were twelve but now most of us have been relocated in smaller grounds. So now we are just five left to take care of many things," said the groundsmen who declined to be named.

So understaffed that when there's rain it obviously takes more time to pitch in the covers and take them off. Another reason for a lack of grass in the outfield is due to the constant use of the field. It begins at 5.00am when the footballers arrive and then the procession of tape-tennis players from nearby areas with stumps all over the ground. The same happens after the match ends in the evening.

The Jahangirnagar University ground also throws up its own set of challenges, namely the square-of-the-wicket dressing rooms, the unstable sightcreens and lately a goalpost placed 15 metres inside

Blues survive a thriller Face Barcelona in semifinals

Chelsea survived one of the most dramatic matches in Champions League history to reach the semifinals with a 4-4 draw against Liverpool in Tuesday's quarterfinal second leg for a 7-5 aggregate victory.

Guus Hiddink's side, who will face Barcelona in the last four, came agonisingly close to squandering their 3-1 first leg lead as Liverpool twice pulled within one goal of a remarkable victory at Stamford Bridge.

The great escape looked on when Fabio Aurelio's freekick and a Xabi Alonso penalty put Liverpool two goals ahead by half-time.

Chelsea staged a superb second half revival as an own goal by Jose Reina was followed by strikes from Alex and Frank Lampard to seemingly put the Blues in control.

But Liverpool had no intention of going out quietly and Lucas and Dirk Kuyt struck to set up a nerve-jangling finish. If the Reds scored again they would go through on away goals, but Lampard finally settled the tie with a minute to play.

For the second successive season, Chelsea have knocked their Premier League rivals out of Europe's elite club competition, but the nerves of every Chelsea player and fan inside Stamford Bridge must have been completely shredded before the Blues finally emerged victorious.

Liverpool, who were without injured captain Steven Gerrard, needed the kind of heroic display they produced to turn a three-goal deficit into Champions League final victory against AC Milan in 2005.

They started as if inspired by the spirit of Istanbul and Fernando Torres surged onto Yossi Benayoun's backheel, only to lose his composure and scuff tamely wide.

The Blues were wary of committing too many players forward and Liverpool, dominating possession as a result, took the lead in

remarkable fashion after 19 minutes.

There was no apparent danger when Aurelio lined up a freekick wide on the wing 35 yards from goal. But Petr Cech clearly expected the Brazilian to send in a cross and put just one man in the defensive wall before taking up a position on the far side of his goal.

Aurelio noticed the gaping hole at Cech's near-post and took full advantage with a cheeky low shot that left the Chelsea keeper rooted to the spot.

Hiddink's team looked devoid of any idea how to defend their lead. Liverpool were tormented by Chelsea's corners in the first leg but now it was their turn to cause chaos from set pieces and they scored again in the 28th minute.

Spanish referee Luis Medina Cantelejo ruled that Branislav Ivanovic had pulled down Alonso in the penalty area as the players challenged for another Aurelio freekick.

Ivanovic, Chelsea's two-goal hero from the first leg, was now the villain as Alonso picked himself up to dispatch the penalty past Cech.

The Blues were shell-shocked and Hiddink responded by hauling off Salomon Kalou, with Nicolas Anelka replacing the Ivorian.

Hiddink sent his players out early before the start of the second half and Chelsea, finally attacking with some urgency, punished a blunder by Reina to go back in front on aggregate in the 52nd minute.

Anelka surged away from two defenders on the right wing and whipped in a low cross that Didier Drogba nudged goalwards. Reina got his hand to the ball but the Spaniard's feeble attempted save only succeeded in pushing it into his own net.

Another goal for Liverpool would still force extra-time but Hiddink's team-talk had done its job.

Chelsea were transformed and they scored again in the 57th minute when Alex hammered a ferocious, swerving freekick past Reina from long-range.

Nimbus accepts it

The Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) on Wednesday convinced the visiting Nimbus official about the outstanding dues that he denied during the break of the marathon meeting.

The board claimed that it had pending dues of a staggering 5.3 million dollars to Nimbus until March this year. But Nimbus vice-president Yannick Colaco dismissed the claim while talking to the reporters during the break of the meeting at Hotel Sheraton yesterday. However, at the end of the meeting, which concluded with a pledge of finding new avenues to raise the revenue, BCB's media committee chairman Jalal Yunus said that the financial ledger has buried any misunderstanding between the two parties.

"It's true they paid the minimum guaranteed money but they were also supposed to pay our share of the profit above the minimum guarantee clause. We showed the accounts to him (Yannick) and he could understand our points and said that it will be solved," said Yunus after the meeting.

Under the deal, BCB and Nimbus will share 80 and 20 percent of the earnings, respectively, when returns exceed the tendered (agreed) amount.

"We had talked about a number of issues mostly regarding the audit and accounts and we pointed out many things

'Cool Riders need foreign band'

Kolkata Knight Riders owner Shah Rukh Khan is confident increased availability of international players will make the team more competitive in the second edition of the Indian Premier League (IPL).

The franchise finished sixth in the inaugural IPL when they struggled to build momentum with various departures and arrivals of non-Indian players, whose participation was cut short by international commitments.

But while Australia captain Ricky Ponting has ruled himself out of this season's glitz-and-glamour Twenty20 spectacular to rest, Khan believes the presence of other foreign stars will boost the Knight Riders.

"Internationally, I think the players will be more available, so we have the whole team to begin with," he told a media conference at a five-star hotel
