

# 1.5 lakh families in Bhola outside cyclone shelter coverage

Many offshore islands have no shelter

Several lakh people living in the coastal areas of Bhola district are highly vulnerable to cyclones and tidal surges as the shelters constructed for the purpose are too inadequate to accommodate the large number of people during natural disasters.

Around 1.5 lakh families living in chars (island) of high-risk coastal areas in seven upazilas under Bhola district are outside cyclone shelter coverage, said sources at Cyclone Preparedness Programme office in Barisal.

After super cyclone 'Sidr' wreaked havoc in the southern region of the country in November 2007, the government took an initiative to build 20 cyclone shelter-cum schools in seven upazilas of Bhola district but it is too inadequate to meet the requirement.

According to the report of a survey conducted by district Red Crescent Society, there are no shelter centres in Ramdaspur, Ramdevpur, Gameshpur, Char Sitaram, Baraipur, Char Pangashia, Char Chakrimara, Char Shyampur, Char Hossain, Gazir Char under Sadar upazila.

The same is the situation in Madanpur Char, Togbi, Medua, Neyamatpur, Bhavanipur, Hajipur under Daulatkhan upazila, Char Patila, Char Rizvi, Char Shamsuddin under Borhanuddin upazila, Char Nasrin, Char Mozammel, Char Tozammel, Char Luxmi under Tamjuddin upazila, Char Hasina, Char Alam, Char Ashraf, Char Sikender under Char Fashion upazila, Kalatolir Char and Dalchar under Monpura upazila.

Other char areas without cyclone shelters include Dhal Char, Char Kukri Mukri, Char Motahar, Char Sakuchia and Char Zahiruddin.

On an average, about 5,000 families live in each of the chars.

There are shelter centres at Char Zahiruddin under Tajumuddin upazila, Char Nizam under Monpura upazila, Char Kukurim, Dalchar and Char Patila under Char Fashion upazila but their accommodation capacity is much less than the population.

Char Nizam has one cyclone shelter for six thousand people and Nijhum Dwip has four cyclone shelters for 20 thousand people.

For 1,04,000 inhabitants of Monpura upazila of island district Bhola, there are only 28 cyclone shelters and two matir kella (multi-storyed mud houses) to accommodate only 22,400 people.

In Char Fashion upazila of the same district, only 15 cyclone shelters and 18 mud houses are available for

its 4,15,520 residents.

According to Cyclone Preparedness Programme office, a typical cyclone shelter can accommodate around 800 people but as many as 3,000 people huddle in a centre when faced with the menace.

In absence of adequate cyclone shelters, the people in the coastal areas including Bhola district pass their days amid panic when there is warning for natural disasters like cyclone and tidal surge.

The situation is even worse in remote islands off the coast.

Construction of a large number of shelter centres is needed to save the large number of people from the menace.

Md Ershad Ali, an official at district Relief and Rehabilitation Office, said the department had not got any sanction for construction of more cyclone shelters in the coastal island areas.

## Movement for ensuring war criminals' trial to continue

Pledge on Jhathibhangha massacre day

Freedom fighters and different political and social organisations in Thakurgaon district yesterday observed

Jhathibhangha mass killing day with a renewed pledge to continue movement for ensuring trial of war criminals.

On this day in 1971, thousands of people from Jagannathpur, Gorea, Shuknokhori, and Balia unions under Sadar upazila left their homes to go to India to save their lives from the Pakistani occupation army and their local collaborators, Razakars.

As they gathered at Jhathibhangha village in Sadar upazila, Pakistani soldiers, informed by Razakars and Al Badrs, rushed to the spot and killed about 3,500 people including women and children and buried them at a mass grave there.

After a silent procession and placing floral wreaths at the monument built in memory of the martyrs at Jhathibhangha, the participants took oath to continue their movement for ensuring trial of war criminals including the perpetrators of Jhathibhangha massacre.

College teacher Jufiqar Ali Bhutto, the main initiator for observance of the day, led the oath.

Later a discussion was held on the monument premises with Azizar Rashid in the chair.

"On the day, Pakistani

occupation army and their local collaborators beheaded many people in the area. All my family members were killed before my eyes. They also hacked me on the neck and back. As I laid down, the criminals left me for dead," Sapandranath, 65, of Jhathibhangha village, who luckily survived the horrific massacre, said at the discussion.

"After 38 years of independence, this is first time that we are observing the day formally at Jhathibhangha village. As the criminals who led the massacre remained as influential people in the area, no one dared to take initiative for observing the day here," he said.

Among others, district Awami League Organising Secretary advocate Fazlu, freedom fighter Abdul Karim and union Awami League leader Abul Hossain addressed the meeting.

On the same day in 1971, Razakars and Al Badrs killed about 100 people in Pirganj municipality, Kosharanganj, Khongaon and Sindhurai unions of Pirganj upazila when they were on the way to India.

Golam Mostafa, principal of Pirganj College, and Dr Sujat Ali, president of Pirganj upazila Awami League, were among the martyrs.

## Earthen seal with ancient inscription found

Archaeologists recently found a broken clay seal with illegible ancient inscriptions during excavation at "Paharpur Buddhist Monastery" site in Naogaon district.

They also dug out other artefacts including unknown earthen pots from the world heritage site. The Department of Archeology carried out the month-long excavation at the site that ended on April 16.

Naheed Sultana, a member of the excavation team, said most of the artefacts have been found during excavation from 50cm to 3.50m under the existing ground level on the north, east and west sides of the temple.

A huge number of broken and intact unknown earthen pots have been found under 2.5m from the existing ground level

along with other cultural accumulation including ash, charcoal and several cultural materials, Naheed said.

She said two lines of illegible ancient inscriptions are most probably Proto-Bengali" style. A thick sand layer has been found during excavation, she added.

Last year, the archaeologists found ancient brick-built structures of Gupta Dynasty under the basement of the main temple on the northeastern side, said Md Mahabub-ul-Alam, a member of the team.

"Recently found artefacts, especially earthen pots, show that there was a habitation in the site before Gupta Dynasty," he said.

Two lines of inscriptions in the two parts were found just below the Buddhist image. "Once it was a big size clay seal", said Mahabub.

## 6 state-owned mills get Tk 2.65cr to buy raw jute

They also put up a barricade on the Khulna-Jessore highway disrupting traffic for an hour from 10:00am.

Meanwhile, the 17-day agitation programme launched by the workers of the state-owned jute mills to press home their 17-point demand ended yesterday with a threat to paralyse the jute mills if 16 other demands are not met by April 30.
