

## Booters warm up with 1-0 win

Ahead of their AFC Challenge Cup qualifiers, Bangladesh national football team managed a morale-boosting victory when they won their one-off warm-up match against Nepal Police 1-0 in Kathmandu yesterday.

Ace midfielder Arman Aziz separated the teams in front of some two-thousand spectators by capitalising on a free kick in the 19th minute on the uneven surface in the Police ground.

"All the players tried their best but failed to perform according to our head coach's (Edson Silva Dido) instructions because the ground was uneven as well as very small," informed coach Shafiqul Islam Manik adding that Bangladesh team played the match in the 4-2-3-1 format.

Brazilian coach Dido took the opportunity to give all his charges chance in the match ahead of his first assignment in the AFC Challenge Cup qualifiers which will begin from April 26 in Dhaka. Bangladesh failed to create

## Missing that vital cog

As yet another 'invasion' halted play at the Dhanmondi Cricket Stadium, a disgruntled player yelled at the intruder: "This is a serious cricket match, you're not supposed to be inside like this."

However, the man carrying his daily groceries and walking merrily had a ready reply much to the surprise of the player.

"What match is this? There are no signboards," exclaims the culprit who was clearly taking a shortcut on his way home. He then walked off the centre nonchalantly but left behind a point, however naive.

In this world where image matters so much, advertisement boards around a cricket ground does put an impression on the mind of the onlooker. One cannot deny that what happens in the middle is the substance, but a bit of garnish definitely adds to the flavour. But that garnish was missing from the Dhaka leagues this year as the sponsors went missing in the Premier League. Even the Twenty20 competition failed to draw any money from the corpo-

rate houses. Without doubt it was a disappointment since cricket is the biggest sport in Bangladesh and the Premier League its biggest drawing card in the domestic arena.

Without sponsors, the board had to provide all the finances including the large payments they make to the various clubs (according to the position), umpires, groundsman, logistics, etc. With the aid of a sponsor, the board could have augmented the facilities during the match that went badly missing this season in all league competitions.

Cricket in Bangladesh should be the easiest sport to sell but even the lure of international stars playing for big clubs was not tempting enough for the sponsors. What could be better for a sponsor's logo in Mashrafe's chest when he was smashing sixes for Abahani? Sadly, external factors have a part to play when money is involved and it was no different in the case of the sponsor-less Premier League.

According to Bangladesh Cricket Board's marketing committee chairman Aziz Al-Kaiser Tito, the time between the committee distribution after the board elections and preparation for the Premier League was too little.

"We were given the committees at a time

## ICC rejects ICL plea Boards to decide players' fate

The International Cricket Council (ICC) has rejected the Indian Cricket League's (ICL) application for official recognition and has said the status of the league's players will be decided by individual member boards.

The decision was taken by the ICC at its board meeting in Dubai on Saturday. The application had been filed last year by the ICL, which is owned by India's largest media group, Zee Telefilms, and is not recognised by the Board of Control for Cricket in India or the ICC.

A statement from the ICC said it had exam-

ined the application against existing criteria for approving such requests, including whether the home board's approval had been secured.

"The Board gave the matter careful consideration but, looking at the criteria set out in the regulations, felt the application for approval could not be granted," the ICC's chief executive, Haroon Lorgat, said.

Asked about the legal implications of the decision, Lorgat said: "If it becomes a legal action we will take it as it comes and will not make any comments on that."

"It's absolutely unfair and extremely disappointing," Kiran More, an ICL board member, told Crinfo. "We will now definitely take the legal route for resolution of this issue. We could have done that earlier but were hoping for a fair

## Sachin has first laugh IPL extravaganza underway

Sachin Tendulkar hit an unbeaten half-century as he led the Mumbai Indians to a 19-run win against the Chennai Super Kings in the opening match of the Indian Premier League (IPL) at Newlands on Saturday.

Tendulkar's 59 not out provided the foundation for Mumbai's 165 for seven after they were sent in on a blustery, grey day.

Former Australian opening batsman Matthew Hayden hit 44 and captain Mahendra Singh Dhoni 36 for Chennai but the 2008 runners-up could only manage 146 for seven.

Sri Lankan fast bowler Lasith Malinga bowled superbly to take three for 15 in four overs for Mumbai.

Mumbai's innings was anchored by Tendulkar, who largely played conventional cricket, punctuated by lofted off-drives.

Although he opened the batting he faced only 48 balls, hitting seven fours.

Tendulkar and Sri Lanka's Sanath Jayasuriya (26) put on 39 for the first wicket. He then shared a second wicket stand of 43 with Shikhar Dhawan (22).

Batting conditions were tricky under grey

skies and Mumbai were struggling at 102 for four in the 15th over before the left-handed Abhishek Nayar lashed 35 off 14 balls in a fifth wicket stand of 46 with Tendulkar.

Nayar slammed three sixes in an over from Andrew Flintoff which cost 22 runs. Flintoff, who is on a 1.55-million dollar a season contract, was the most expensive Chennai bowler, conceding 44 runs in four overs.

Flintoff made 24 in Chennai's reply as he helped Hayden put on 52 for the third wicket. He hit two fours and a six off 22 balls before he heaved a ball from Harbhajan Singh high in the air for the off-spinner to take a catch off his own bowling.

Hayden hit his 44 off 35 balls before Zaheer Khan took a stinging catch in the cover off a fierce drive against Jayasuriya's left-arm spin. Dhoni hit 36 off 26 balls before being bowled by Malinga in the final over.

## It's unjust: Pakistan

Pakistan's top cricket officials and players Saturday slammed the decision by the sport's world governing body to strip their country of its 2011 World Cup matches, saying the decision was "unjust."

"I am hugely disappointed," said Pakistan coach Intikhab Alam, who is in Dubai for the limited overs series against Australia starting Wednesday.

"Pakistan has been singled out for security, which is unjust and has hit our cricket with a big, big blow which will be hard to overcome for years," Alam told AFP.

A meeting of the International Cricket Council's (ICC) executive board Friday stripped Pakistan of its 16 matches in the 2011 World Cup after noting the country's "uncertain political situation" and growing security

concerns.

Doubts about Pakistan hosting World Cup matches intensified after the terror attacks on the Sri Lankan team bus, in Lahore on March 3. Eight people were killed, with seven Sri Lankan players and their assistant coach wounded.

The 2011 World Cup had been awarded to Pakistan, India, Sri Lanka and Bangladesh, but after Friday's decision the tournament will be played only in the latter three countries.

In Pakistan, Salim Altaf, the Pakistan Cricket Board's (PCB) chief operating officer, said the board was "devastated" by the ICC's decision.

The PCB had presented the ICC with a comprehensive security plan for the 2011 World Cup which had nevertheless failed to reassure the ICC board.

"It's disappointing to lose the hosting rights of the World Cup, we are devastated," said Altaf.

Pakistan's Sports Minister Pir Aftab Shah Jilani blamed the PCB for poor planning.

"They (PCB) have taken a security plan for

The Group A qualifiers will begin from April 26 in Dhaka and BFF has taken different initiatives to draw the public's attentions for the competition to bring them into the stadium.

"To target huge publicity, the federation has taken different initiatives ahead of the AFC Challenge Cup qualifiers," said BFF general secretary Al Musabbir Sadi yesterday.

The BFF will install five big billboards in different parts of the city, arrange a horse caravan, release 50,000 leaflets, stage street drama and televise advertisement on giant screens in different spots in the city.

Bangladesh have been drawn in Group A in the tournament along with Myanmar, Cambodia and Macau.

## KKR's point to prove Strong Daredevils raring to go

Their owner may have been the most visible presence in the pre-tournament build-up, but the Kolkata Knight Riders (KKR) will seek to show they are capable of playing good cricket when they open their Indian Premier League (IPL) campaign against the Deccan Chargers at Newlands on Sunday.

The Delhi Daredevils meet the Kings XI Punjab in the early match of the second double-header at the ground in which all eight teams were due to be in action over the first two days of the five-week tournament in South Africa.

Knight Riders owner, film star Shah Rukh Khan, admitted that his team didn't perform as well as he hoped in finishing sixth out of eight last year, although he said they were the "coolest-looking" outfit.

West Indian captain Chris Gayle will only be available for the early matches but most of the other key players, including New Zealander Brendon McCullum, will be able to play in all the games.

McCullum hit a spectacular 158 in the opening match against Bangalore last year and has been appointed captain for the 2009 season.

Other experienced players in the team include former Indian captain Sourav Ganguly, Australia's Brad Hodge and Sri Lanka's mystery spinner Ajantha Mendis, together with Indian fast bowler Ishant Sharma and left-arm spinner Murali Kartik.

If the Knight Riders were under-achievers last year, the Deccan Chargers did even worse, winning only two out of 14 games and finishing bottom of the table.

The Chargers signed a galaxy of big name, quick-scoring batsmen whose performances were erratic, while the team paid for a shortage of experienced bowlers.
