'This Ireland is greatest ever'

Manager Roy Torrens on Monday hailed the Ireland team that won the 2011 Cricket World Cup Qualifier tournament in South Africa as the best to represent the country.

"They are even better than the side that shocked Pakistan and Bangladesh at the last World Cup," said the man involved for 40 years with the national team as a player, selector, official and manager.

So serious were Ireland that the players readily accepted a ban on alcohol and carbonated drinks during the 19-day tournament and there were daily breathalyzer tests on the team bus en route to matches and training.

"Not one player failed a test. All they drank from the start of the tournament until after the final was still water and it obviously worked wonders," Torrens told AFP.

Ireland finished the five-match first phase of the Qualifier with a 100 per cent record, topped the second-stage Super 8 table, and crushed Canada by nine wickets in the final on Sunday.

The Irish were also the first country to clinch a ticket to the World Cup in Bangladesh, India and Sri Lanka with Canada, Netherlands and Kenya following 48 hours later.

Torrens said there was no secret behind the "green machine" success, just 100 per cent commitment from the 15 players, West Indian coach Phil Simmons and the back-up staff.

As the last winter approached in Ireland and temperatures plummeted, the 10 part-time squad members vowed to leave their families and friends each weekend and attend two-day camps.

Irish triumph

William Porterfield and Trent Johnston shone as Ireland crushed Canada by nine wickets in the 2011 Cricket World Cup Qualifier tournament final on Sunday.

Opener and skipper Porterfield finished unbeaten on 104 after a 164-minute stand at Centurion Park as Ireland made 188 for the loss of only one wicket after Canada were all out for 185 six balls short of their allotted 50 overs.

Seamer Johnston delivered a career-best 5-14 in a 10-over spell that included four maidens to set up a second victory for Ireland over Canada after winning a first-round clash by six wickets two weeks ago.

"We were beaten in the final by Scotland four years ago and wanted to go one step further this time. The way the guys have played over the past 19 days has been fantastic," said Porterfield.

"When Trent came on he was magnificent. He has been a great performer for us, not just over the last few weeks but for years now, and deserves all the plaudits he gets.

"He had a niggly coming into this match and was in pain after a couple of overs, but the way he fought through that and bowled as well as he did was inspirational."

Imtiaz and AFC's administrator of Vision Asia Department Yogesh Desai are on a two-day visit to Dhaka to restart the VB programme which was first planned to be launched in 2002.

Canada struggled from the start with the bat at the Test venue between Pretoria and Johannesburg and were starting humiliation at 92-7 before Umar Bhatti and Havir Baidwan added 39 runs.

After Baidwan (14) was trapped leg before, Bhatti found an even more prolific partner in Khurram Chohan and they added 54 runs to spare some Canadian blushes.

Bhatti was run out for 46 and Chohan made 26 while Boyd Rankin also impressed with the ball for Ireland, claiming 2-34 in his 10 overs that included three maidens.

Porterfield has been an inspirational leader during the final qualifying tournament for the World Cup in Bangladesh, India and Sri Lanka and punished Canadian bowling and fielding that left much to be desired.

His half-century came up in 80 balls and with able support from Gary Wilson (38) and Niall O'Brien (38 not out) the outcome was never in doubt on a hot, clear autumn day.

Netherlands defeated Kenya by six wickets to finish third, Afghanistan won by 89 runs against Scotland to claim fifth spot and United Arab Emirates triumphed by five wickets against Namibia to come seventh.

Ireland, Canada, Netherlands and Kenya qualify for the World Cup and the quartet plus Afghanistan and Scotland earn ODI status for the next four years and automatic places in the 2009-2010 Intercontinental Cup.

Full Pak tour in NZ unlikely

New Zealand is unlikely to host a full cricket series against Pakistan at the end of the year to replace a scheduled tour of the country, New Zealand Cricket chief executive Justin Vaughan said Monday.

However, it would be keen to host a Test series in December, with one-day matches being rescheduled to another time, Vaughan told the New Zealand Press Association.

New Zealand does not want to go ahead with the planned tour to Pakistan in November and December after the terror attack on the Sri Lankan team in Lahore early last month, which killed eight Pakistanis and injured seven members of the touring squad.

Pakistan Cricket Board chairman Ijaz Butt said Sunday after meeting Vaughan in Dubai that New Zealand was offering to host the series.

"We have discussed the series but have yet to reach a final decision on it," Butt told AFP.

"At the moment New Zealand are averse to touring Pakistan. So among the options available, the best is to play in New Zealand."

Vaughan said likely weather.

problems in November would mean it would be difficult to host a full tour of three Tests and five one-day internationals.

New Zealand would ideally host the tests in December, ahead of Pakistan's Test series in Australia.

While Vaughan said the one-day matches could be played in the United Arab Emirates in November, he added that the one-dayers and Test matches did not necessarily have to be played together.

"Pakistan and New Zealand both have relatively uncluttered schedules over the next year or two, so the one-dayers could be deferred until a later stage, if that was necessary to play it in the ideal venue," he said.

Safina sits on top

Dinara Safina officially took over the top ranking on the WTA Tour on Monday, making her and older sibling Marat Safin the only brother-sister duo to have been No. 1 in professional tennis.

Safina, who has yet to win a Grand Slam title but twice reached a major final, is the 19th woman to top the rankings since they were introduced in 1975. She is also only the second Russian woman after Maria Sharapova to reach No. 1.

Safina replaced Serena Williams at the top, even though the American beat her in the Australian Open final this year. Last year, Safina lost to Ana Ivanovic in the French Open final.

In the latest standings the 22-year-old Safina moves up to 8951 points, with Williams in second on 8272.

Marat Safin was ranked No. 1 on the men's tour in 2000, the same year he won the first of two Grand Slam singles titles.

"He has two Grand Slams," Safina said of her brother in a video posted on the WTA's Web site. "He's still much better than me, so I have to catch him."

Safina won four titles last year.

MGH Infocomm Ltd has urged Bangladeshi TV viewers to watch the Indian Premier League (IPL) live and exclusively on "SetMax".

MGH Infocomm is a sister concern of leading business house MGH Group, who are the only authorised nationwide legal distributor of Sony and SetMax networks.

Sony Entertainment Television earned the broadcasting rights of the Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) backed IPL for 10 years starting from April 2008, winning the bid for 1.026 billion dollars.

MGH Infocomm Ltd is expected to make IPL coverage available up to 65-70 per cent Bangladeshi TV viewers through its authorised 170 cable operators.

"As legal distributor of Sony and SetMax, Discovery and the Star Group, we are paying taxes to the government treasury regularly so we request the country's cricket lovers to watch IPL live only through the legal cable operators," said MGH Group marketing manager Farhan Rashid at a press conference on Sunday.

The second edition of the IPL, covering 34 days of exciting cricket with eight teams playing 56 matches, began on Saturday in Cape Town, South Africa with top international cricketers from across the world participating in it.

IPL '09 loses viewership!

The much-hyped Indian Premier League's (IPL) second season is struggling to attract eyeballs, with viewership tracking agencies reporting lesser numbers this year as it tries to overcome rain-curtailed and low scoring matches, over and above competition from elections.

According to viewership research agency aMap, the first match of IPL managed only 3.6 per cent ratings against 4.3 per cent last year. However, it reported better viewership on the second day at 3.9 per cent and 3.5 per cent as against 2.9 and 3.4 last year.

Similarly, according to another viewership rating agency TAM, the TRP for the two matches on the first day of IPL II was at 5.55 per cent and 5.54 per cent, as against 8.21 per cent last year (only one match was played on day one of IPL 2008).

"There could be two-three factors why the rating has gone down. There are lots of other activities like the general election happening besides the IPL. This to an extent distracts the audience. Apart from that, there was novelty value of the first season," aMap CEO Amit Verma told PTI.

A TAM official, however, said it is too early to say why the rating has gone down.

Clarke happy to be playing Pakistan

Australian captain Michael Clarke said Sunday his team was looking forward to facing Pakistan in the forthcoming limited-over series, to be played in the United Arab Emirates for security concerns.

"All of us are very happy to be playing Pakistan," Clarke told a news conference after his team arrived for the series of five one-day and one Twenty20 match, to be played in Dubai and Abu Dhabi.

"We are playing Pakistan after all, after a long time, so we want to make the most of this opportunity on a wonderful ground here," said Clarke of Dubai Sports City's stadium, where the first one-day will be played Wednesday.

The second match will also be played here, on Friday, before the teams move to Abu Dhabi for three ODI matches, on April 27, May 1 and 3. The only Twenty20 match will be played in Dubai on May 7.

Younis full of hope

Just days after another sad chapter pushed them further into the margins of the cricket world, Pakistan glimpse a rare opportunity to make a significant on-field statement. They take on Australia in a five-match ODI series followed by two Twenty20 internationals in Dubai and Abu Dhabi from Wednesday, a contest captain Younis Khan believes offers Pakistan the chance to begin another era on a brighter note.

As an indication of just how much Pakistan have faded away off the field in recent years -- and Australia's reluctance to tour Pakistan -- Wednesday's game will be the first ODI between the two sides since February 2005. In fact, the two sides have only met once in any format since then: at the World Twenty20 in September 2007, when Pakistan trumped them on the way to the final.

Much has changed since then -- four players from each side remain -- not least the fortunes of both sides, but Younis believed that good performances here may well lead to a repeat of Pakistan's last successful era, which began around the time the two sides last met.

"This is a very big series for several reasons," Younis told Cricinfo. "If we play well -- not necessarily win -- but play well then we can become like Inzi [Inzamam-ul-Haq] and Bob Woolmer's sides in 2005 and 2006," he said. "If

Australia have not played Pakistan in a one-day international since February 2005 and the two sides have since met only in the Twenty20 World Cup in South Africa two years ago.

Australia have not toured Pakistan since 1998 and forced Pakistan to play their Test and one-day series on neutral venues in Kenya, Sri Lanka and Sharjah in 2002.

They were scheduled to tour Pakistan in March 2008 but pulled out due to security fears. Australia rescheduled the tour -- for one-dayers in 2009 and for Tests in 2010 -- and forced Pakistan to play in the UAE.

The 28-year-old Clarke is standing in for regular captain Ricky Ponting, who is being rested for this series along with batsman Michael Hussey and paceman Mitchell Johnson.

Clarke said Australia remained formidable without the missing trio, adding that "it's a great honour to lead Australia and I look forward to this challenge."

After playing Pakistan, Australia next play in England, in the Twenty20 World Cup tournament next month and in the Ashes tournament against the host nation, starting in July.

we perform well -- and win -- then people will have to take notice because it is Australia. I want to see good moments... after the series I want to be able to look back and pinpoint 7-10 moments where we did really well, with a bowling spell, a bit of fielding, some batting. That will be an achievement."

Pakistan's squad is neither inexperienced nor raw, but undercooked and rusty: since April 2007, Australia have played 45 ODIs against top-flight nations and Pakistan just over half, with 24. But for the players, says Younis, the series is a golden opportunity. "Any guy who takes the opportunity here and does well, it'll be a massive break for them internationally. This is how I am looking at it personally and trying to instill in the team. I am fairly sure they are aware of it. If as a player you take off in this series, nobody will be able to bring you down."

The time to do that, some might argue, is ripe. This remains a transitional period for Australia as ODI losses to South Africa and a shared home series with New Zealand indicates. The absence of Ricky Ponting, Michael Hussey, Mitchell Johnson and Brett Lee will be felt but this is, according to Younis, still Australia.

"They are still very balanced and the style of play and their motivation doesn't ever change," he said. "They are the only team in the world where players come in and go out and it makes very little difference. They are still a top side. If we do well, play to our potential and win a few matches, then I really think we can start getting out of this phase and move on."

Oldies have their days too

Anil Kumble, the Bangalore Royal Challengers leg-spinner, feels that this year's team is "different" from the outfit that finished second last in 2008 and that the "intense" and "spot-on" preparations in South Africa have helped immensely. Bangalore opened their Indian Premier League (IPL) campaign with a resounding win on Saturday, dismissing the defending champions Rajasthan Royals for 58.

"Let me make it clear that this is a different group and we have set out to achieve something and I daresay the result of our opening match is ample evidence of my claim," Kumble wrote in his column for the Hindu. "I would be the first to admit that a few things were missing last year. But this time our preparation hasn't just been intense but also spot on. Spending nearly two weeks in Johannesburg and playing as many as five prac-

tice matches -- two against the local Lions and three among ourselves -- gave us a good feel of the local conditions."

Bangalore revamped their squad after last season's failure, the most significant additions being Jesse Ryder and a new captain in Kevin Pietersen, who replaced Rahul Dravid. It was Dravid, however, who played the most crucial role in Bangalore's victory, scoring 66 of 48 balls in testing conditions.

"The Twenty20 game may not be for the oldies but as Sachin [Tendulkar] and Rahul also showed, we can have our days too," Kumble wrote. "Individually too, Rahul had a point or two to prove. On pitches with bounce and movement, it is technique not flashiness that helps. Believe me, if not for Rahul's technique, the Rajasthan bowlers would have looked far more effective than they did."

"I am also glad to see Rahul among the runs because that means that if any two other batsmen among the likes of Jesse, Ross [Taylor], Kevin and

Robin [Uthappa] click, we are looking at setting a serious target. And with our fast bowling looking twice as good while bowling in South Africa, as compared to India, we are on our way."

Kumble also had a successful game against Rajasthan. He picked up 5 for 5 and said he was "intrigued" by his performance. "I am coming off a long break and may have retired but the moment I am back on the cricket field, ball in hand, the feeling is the same as always. And in any format, a five-wicket haul sure makes one feel one is in the thick of things." Bangalore's second game is against Chennai Super Kings in Port Elizabeth on Monday.
