Dyson slams pitch

West Indies coach John Dyson criticised the state of the Grace Road pitch after 14 wickets fell on the first day of his side's opening tour match against Leicestershire here on Monday.

The tourists finished the first day of this three-day game on 80 for four, with teenage paceman Alex Wyatt taking two for 15.

Earlier, the West Indies had bowled out upon. Leicestershire, who won the toss, for 182 with left-arm spinner Sulieman Benn taking four for 31 and promising seam bowler Andrew Richardson three for 46.

But afterwards Dyson, whose side play the Sarwan in his opening spell. first of two Tests against England starting on May 6 at Lord's, said the surface had been below standard

"I don't think it's a great pitch," said the former Australian opening batsman.

"It's an early-season wicket which looked like it was going to be a flat one but there were too many balls which rolled along the ground.

"There was variable bounce and no-one has looked comfortable batting on it - I wouldn't call it a good cricket wicket. "We had some balls today from a very early

stage that hit something and just rolled along the ground well wide of the keeper on both sides of the wicket and there were other ones that pitch in the same spot and sit up."

Dyson though was pleased with the form of Benn and Richardson.

"I thought he (Benn) bowled well today,"

"We found in the nets that the slower you bowl the more spin you got and he varied his pace well and it was good to see," added Dyson, who recently guided the West Indies to a 1-0 Test series win over England in the Caribbean.

"Our guys have had a couple of weeks off cricket and that's our first outing here in these conditions, but I'm not totally happy with the day's play. There are too many things that happened today which we need to improve

Meanwhile Leicestershire coach Tim Boon was encouraged by the form of 18-year-old pace bowler Wyatt, who in only his second firstclass appearance dismissed Ramnaresh "He's got a lot of ability, swings the ball away

from the right-hander and he's got a natural length," said Boon of Wright. "He isn't quick at the moment, but he is

Grace's bat to be auctioned

A 113-year-old bat used by WG Grace will be auctioned at Sotheby's in London next month for an expected £30,000. The legendary cricketer used the bat while bringing up his 1,000th run in Test cricket against Australia at Lord's in June 1896.

Grace subsequently gave the bat to his Australian opponent Syd Gregory, who in turn passed it on to his fellow tourist and brother-in-law Harry Donnan on their return to Australia.

"I would expect it to go for somewhere in the region of £25,000-30,000," said auctioneer Graham Budd. "From the evidence of the cording, Grace had probably used this bat for some time, culminating in his 1,000th Test run."
