## FIFA to earn \$2.7b from WC TV rights

AFP, Johannesburg

World football's governing body FIFA will earn 25 billion rands (2.7 billion dollars, 2.1 billion euros) on television rights to broadcast the 2010 World Cup in South Africa, the organisation said on Monday.

The announcement was made by FIFA TV director Niclas Ericson (EDS: correct) during a press conference in Johannesburg, according to the SAPA news agency.

FIFA will also broadcast the games to hundreds of millions of cell phones worldwide, and has entered special agreements with African TV networks across the continent, he added.

"We have entered an agreement with the African Union of Broadcasters to place the TV rights in 41 sub-Saharan countries before the end of 2009, Ericson said.

"The dream would be for an African team to reach the final, which would boost TV viewership," said Ericson.

FIFA will spend 1.5 billion rand on their TV production of the world's biggest sporting tournament - with over 26 billion worldwide spectators.

It will be the first time that the World Cup is held in Africa.

### Cannavaro in Juve talks

Cannavaro's contract at Real is up at the end of the season and it is widely thought he will return to Italy.

He spent two years at Juve before leaving to join the Spaniards when the Old Lady of Turin were relegated to Serie B for match-fixing.

But according to Gaetano Fedele a reunion is on the cards.

"Juve have made an interesting offer, exactly what he's been looking for," said Fedele in an interview with website calciomercato.it.

"It's a good offer and it's being evaluated. Juventus's bosses could be more clear, though. This week will probably be decisive.

"Interest from a big club such as Juve can only make Fabio happy. He wants to continue his glorious career and signing for a top level club is his wish.

#### Becks launches anti-malaria campaign

The trio have pledged their backing to Malaria No More UK, a charity launched in a bid to prevent millions of deaths from the disease worldwide.

England and AC Milan midfielder Beckham said: "It's truly incredible to think we can stop this killer disease

forever and it's such a simple thing to do. "For less than the cost of a football you can protect a family from dying. I urge the UK public to get behind the

Malaria No More UK campaign to save a life and make malaria no more." Malaria, despite being treatable, threatens half the


world's population and pregnant women and children are particularly at risk.

Murray, fresh from reaching the semifinals of the Monte Carlo Masters tournament at the weekend, said: "This is the first global charity I've been involved with in this capacity and it was an easy decision.

"Malaria is completely preventable and stoppable but yet it still kills more children in Africa than any other single disease. 

### Platini tough on racism

UEFA boss Michel Platini revealed on Tuesday that European football bosses are considering suspending matches for 10 minutes if fans take part in racist chanting.

Platini was speaking in Rome where the Champions League trophy was officially handed over by current holders Manchester United to the city that will stage the final next month.

Racism in football has been brought to the fore following taunts aimed at Inter Milan's Mario Balotelli during the 1-1 draw at Juventus on Saturday.

Italian under-21 international Balotelli is of Ghanaian origin and was targeted by small sections of the crowd.

"It would take courage but the decision of UEFA would be to stop the match for 10 minutes if there is racist chanting and to call it off altogether if it continued," he said.

That was a view partially supported by Italian Referees Association (Aia) president Marcello Nicchi.

Nicchi believes stopping a match is an option although he said it should not be up to the referee.

"Suspending a match for five minutes if there is racist chanting could be an idea but calling off a match which thousands of fans have come to watch could cause problems,' he said.

The referee has enough on his plate trying to manage and follow a match and hence he can't be aware of everything going on off the pitch as well."

The Wales captain, who arrived from West Ham in January's transfer window, has missed the last three matches after suffering a knee injury during the UEFA Cup quarterfinal first-leg defeat at Hamburg.

City manager Mark Hughes told the club's website: "Craig has got to have complete rest for two weeks then he comes back for strength work.

"Hopefully he might get the last couple of games, but the probability is that he won't."

City are tenth in the English top flight but they are only four points behind West Ham, who are currently occupy seventh place, which is likely to be the final qualifying spot for next season's Europa League, the successor to the UEFA Cup.
