A US-based fertility doctor claimed to have cloned 14 human embryos and transferred 11 of them into the wombs of four women in an interview published yesterday.

Panayiotis Zavos told Britain's Independent newspaper that although none of the women had had a viable pregnancy as a result, the first cloned baby could now be born within a couple of years.

Fertility doctor Waterways shrinking for lack of dredging

Reduced to 3,800km from 5,200km in dry season

The country's waterway network has been shrinking drastically due to inability of the dredging department of Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority (BIWTA) to remove increased siltation from the riverbeds, causing negative impact on overall economy, says a while about 3,800 km in dry season. BIWTA report.

The waterway routes have reduced to 3,800 km from 5,200 km in winter season, thanks to the successive governments' indifference to strengthen the dredging department of BIWTA over last three decades though the demand for dredging has been increasing gradually.

In the rainy season, the waterway network has reduced to around 6,000 km from 8,400 km due to siltation, says the report, placed before a meeting of the parliamentary standing committee on shipping ministry yesterday.

It means now the country's waterway network is about 6,000 km in the rainy season

But officials at the BIWTA said now the waterway routes might be less than that, as no survey was carried out in the recent years. They blamed acute shortage of budget to strengthen the dredging, as budgetary allocation was not increased in this regard in last five years.

Tension again along border with Myanmar

BDR jawans have taken positions at the bank of Naaf river in Palongkhali union of Ukhiya upazila as Myanmar border force Nasaka again started erecting earth embankment within 80 yards of the zero point.

The Nasaka has deployed 300 workers to build the embankment without consultation with Bangladesh government though they stopped the work yesterday following a protest from BDR. BDR officials claimed that Nasaka has stopped their work

while they blew whistle and showed red flags. But the local people yesterday said, Nasaka did not stop their work. Few days back, Nasaka built around 300 feet of the embankment, they said.

On last Tuesday, BDR and Nasaka had a company commander level flag meeting on the issue at Dekhiboniya Nasaka outpost where the BDR requested them not to erect any mbankment within the zero point.

Meanwhile, a total of 135 Rohingyas whose jail term ended have been staying in the Cox's Bazar jail while the Myanmar overnment is totally reluctant to receive them.

Jailer Anwar Hossain said there were 2,750 detainees, includng 440 Rohingyas, on Wednesday in the jail against its 440 apacity. 43 Tamil rebels killed, thousands flee war zone

Sri Lankan soldiers have pushed deep into the sole remaining Tamil rebel enclave and killed 43 guerrillas while nearly 82,000 civilians have fled the northern war zone within the last 72 hours, the military said yesterday.

Troops in recent months have ousted the rebels from all their former strongholds and hemmed them into what the government previously deemed a "no fire" zone to protect civilians. But troops entered the 20 sq km zone this week to fight remaining rebels and free civilians trapped there.

Meanwhile, thousands more civilians fled Sri Lanka's war zone Wednesday as troops pushed deeper into the Tamil Tiger rebels' sliver of remaining territory and the government vowed again that the end to the 25-year-old conflict was near.

The latest photographs released by the military showed people arriving at beaches carrying their belongings in bundles on their heads. Mothers held infants and some carried sick relatives as they disembarked from the boats they used to flee the fighting. The navy has been escorting those vessels into SEE PAGE 15 COL 7
