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## WHO helpless as swine flu spreads

Death toll rises to 152 as containment  
appears 'unfeasible'

World health officials admitted they were powerless to halt the spread of swine flu and ratcheted up their pandemic alert level as the number of affected countries rose sharply yesterday.

As Mexico, epicentre of the outbreak, said 152 people were now believed to have died from the virus, the number of known cases in the US more than doubled while six other countries said they had confirmed their first casualties.

The swine flu crisis deepened yesterday, with at least 16 countries far beyond worst-hit Mexico, including in Europe and Asia, report-

ing confirmed or suspected infections.

Authorities in Asia -- where memories of the Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS) outbreak in 2003 remain fresh -- tried to contain the spread of the virus, screening air passengers from affected areas and advising against non-essential travel to Mexico.

But the World Health Organisation (WHO) said border screenings "don't work," while the EU's health commissioner said there was no need for travel restrictions.

"Border controls do not work. Screening doesn't work," WHO spokesman Gregory Hartl said in Geneva.

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## People asked not to get panicked

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## Hot spell to continue

1 more dies; power situation improves

One person died of a heat stroke in Bhola yesterday while the diarrhoea situation continued to worsen in the capital and elsewhere in the country over the last 24 hours.

The country, however, experienced a slight fall in mercury during the period.

According to the meteorological office, temperature in Dhaka came down to 36.5 degrees Celsius yesterday from 39.6 degrees Celsius a day before, while the highest temperature was recorded in Jessore at 39.2 degrees Celsius yesterday.

The heat wave may continue for two more days, met office sources said, before an expected rainfall.

Yasin Patowary, 65, a deed writer, died of a heat stroke at Charfashion in Bhola after he fell sick at his office at Dalil Lekhok Office of Thana Road in the upazila town, reports our correspondent from Barisal.

Party insiders said Khaleda listened to Khoka but refrained from making any comments and suggested that Khoka work together to make party programmes successful and strengthen the party in the city.

While talking to The Daily Star yesterday, Khoka, however, said they only discussed organisational affairs and the rally to be held on Saturday in the city.

Meanwhile, the BNP chief had a meeting with former mayor Mirza Abbas at her cantonment residence late at night. They discussed matters relating to city BNP, said sources.

According to party leaders, the BNP leadership has decided to announce a new committee for the Dhaka city unit soon and Khoka might be appointed its chief again. But it is not clear whether the high command will announce a convening committee or a fully-fledged committee to run party activities in the city.

At present Dhaka city unit of BNP is running without any committee.

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## Melting woes of Bangladesh

Climate conference says glaciers  
melting faster than anticipated

Ice cap of the Himalayas and the heart of the Arctic ocean system are continuing to warm at a faster rate than the scientists previously anticipated, the speakers said at a conference with a call to the global leaders for acting quickly to arrest the global warming otherwise it would bring twofold difficulties in future.

Terming the glacier melting in the Himalayas and Tibetan Plateau as major global concern it was said in the conference that it might hit millions more of the world populations far sooner. Nowhere else on the Earth outside of Greenland and Antarctica is such a concentration of freshwater stored as ice and snow.

Melting glacier in the Himalayas would hit Bangladesh as almost all the water of Bangladeshi rivers comes from it while its agricultural system mostly depends on river water, speakers told the conference held yesterday.

The speakers said it at the conference titled "Melting Ice: Regional Dramas, Global Wake-Up Call" aimed at discussing the
