Lanka president, rebels Toy chopper sparks security vow to fight on

Sri Lanka's president rejected international appeals for ceasefire in his nation's bloody civil war Thursday, as the Tamil Tiger rebels vowed never to surrender to the advancing government forces.

The defiant declarations came in the office. face of growing calls for Sri Lanka to halt its offensive against the rebels' last stronghold in the northeast to allow an estimated 50,000 civilians to flee the war zone.

"The government is not ready to enter per. into any kind of cease fire with the terrorists," President Mahinda Rajapaksa said in his first public comments since the British and French foreign ministers wouldn't give up their fight. asked him to accept a humanitarian truce.

Rajapaksa said his government was trying to rescue the trapped civilians, and appeared impatient at the continued

demands for him to call off his forces.

'It is my duty to protect the people of this country. I don't need lectures from Western representatives," he said, according to highlights of a speech he delivered in the southeastern town of Embilipitiya that were distributed by his

Rajapaksa, the president's brother, said the war would not end until rebel leader Velupillai Prabhakaran is captured or killed, according to The Island newspa-

The rebels, meanwhile, called on the international community to work harder to stop the war while also saying they

"If any country really cares about these people, I ask that country to go beyond its 'diplomatic boundaries' for the sake of saving human lives and make Sri Lanka stop this genocidal war," rebel political

chief Balasingam Nadesan told The Associated Press in an e-mail interview from the war zone.

In recent months, government troops have forced the Tamil Tigers out of the shadow state they controlled in the north of the country and cornered them in a tiny sliver of land along the northeast coast. Defense Secretary Gotabhaya The U.N. says nearly 6,500 ethnic Tamil civilians have been killed in the offensive.

The rebels called for a cease-fire Sunday; the government demanded the separatists surrender instead. Nadesan rejected that demand.

"Surrendering and laying down our arms are out of the question. Our freedom struggle will continue until (our) legitimate aspirations are met," he said.

French Foreign Minister Bernard Kouchner and his British counterpart, David Miliband, came here Wednesday to express the EU's concern over the rising civilian death toll.



A Chinese-made toy helicopter landed in India's heavilyfortified national parliament Wednesday, sparking a scare and a high security alert, police

The remotely-operated toy whizzed over the high walls of the parliament building in New Delhi and landed in its forecourt, setting off security alarms, police officials said.

Police and federal officers launched a manhunt around the complex as the batteryoperated machine had a flying range of around 150 metres (yards), the officials said.

"The helicopter came in from the direction of the Talkatora Stadium and it was spotted by a sentry who sounded the alarm after it landed inside," a parliament security official told AFP.

Pakistan appeals for unity in fight against Taliban

Pakistan's leader has called on the nation to unite behind the armed forces as they pressed a new offensive against Taliban militants yesterday north of the capital Islamabad.

President Asif Ali Zardari said the nation was facing a "critical hour" in its fight against Islamic militants linked to al-Qaeda, and that the military offensive in the scenic Swat region was vital to protect the constitution.

"Time has come for the entire nation to give pause to their political differences and rise to the occasion and give full support to our security forces," Zardari said in a statement late Wednesday.

"This is the only way to demonstrate our will, to keep conference.

Pakistan as a moderate, modern and democratic state where the rights of all citizens are protected," he said.

Pakistani troops have this week launched a series of operations against Taliban fighters who had taken control of Lower Dir and Buner districts, only around 100 kilometres outside Islamabad.

A spokesman for Pakistan's military said Thursday that 14 militants had been killed over the last 24 hours in operations against Islamist insurgents in the country's northwest.

"As regards the ongoing operation in Buner and Dir, it's 48 hours since the operation started. During the last 24 hours, 14 militants have been killed," army spokesman Major General Athar Abbas told a news

Lanka, LTTE could face war crimes charges

Sri Lanka's government and the Tamil Tigers could face prosecution for committing war crimes in their longrunning war that appears to be ending, the New York Times said Thursday.

"Sri Lanka's leaders and the rebels must be warned that they could face prosecution for war crimes," the daily said in an editorial titled "Sri Lanka's Dirty

"Once this fighting ends, the government and the Tamils must be persuaded to pursue a serious political settlement, or this long and brutal war would certainly reignite," it said.

Human rights groups have accused both the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE) and Colombo of gross rights abuses.
